Sermon - Gifts of Grace - Prophecy - Romans 12:3-8

Today I am starting a new sermon series that I have entitled "Gifts of Grace" and is based on Romans chapter 12 verses 3 through 8. I normally consider it bad practice to preach from the middle (or in this case, three quarters of the way through a book of the Bible), because we miss out on the context of the passage. In this case, as we heard the reading earlier, we hear what Paul is exhorting us to do, but we don't really hear why. Romans 12:3-8 is one application of the gospel message that Paul has been explaining in the previous 11 chapters. If we were to just do the what without understanding the why, then we could end us as extremely unbalanced Christians.

The book of Romans had been described as "the chief part of the New Testament and is truly the purest gospel," by Martin Luther, while John Calvin stated that, "When any one understands this Epistle, he has a passage opened to him to the understanding of the whole Scripture". Other powerful quotes include J.I. Packer's "All roads in the Bible lead to Romans..." and John Piper's description of it as "the most important theological, Christian work ever written."

To counter the potential imbalance somewhat, I am going to start this sermon with a bit of a summary of Romans, noting that I will try to summarise in a few minutes that which Martin Lloyd Jones, a mid twentieth century Welsh preacher, took 13 years to preach, taking a week or more to preach on each of the 433 verses.

Romans can be divided into four sections: righteousness needed, how every human being fails to meet God's standard and will suffer his wrath for our unrighteousness (1:18-3:20); how righteousness is provided through, and only through faith in Jesus's death and resurrection for both Jews (or God's chosen people) and gentiles(3:21-8:39). That righteousness to Jew and Gentile is shown as vindicated in chapters 9:1-11:36, and shown how to be practiced now the church comprises both Jew and Gentiles in chapters 12 through to the end. Since we are looking at chapter 12, we are looking at how to practise the righteousness whose necessity, provision and vindication is explained in chapters 1 through 11.

The difference between Jew and gentile is a big issue for Paul, and particularly for the church where Jews who felt they were born into their salvation, and gentiles who are grafted in need to live and work together as one in Christ. This is key to practising righteousness in chapter 12.

Since many churches today are entirely made up of Gentiles, in the context of today's church, one way of looking at this is how second or later generational Christians (those brought up in Christians families) correspond to Jews) do church with new converts (who correspond to Gentiles).

As I mentioned, Romans 12 teaches how we do church as Jews and Gentiles, or new converts and later generational Christians. It gives us different gifts we should exercise to smoothly do church comprising second generational and new Christians, and it specifically mentions prophesying, serving, teaching,

encouraging, giving, leading and showing mercy. Both new and second generational Christians can do these things equally well and easily in the power of the Holy Spirit. I will look at 5 of these gifts over the next five weeks, and today we look at prophesying. However, before we look at what Paul is saying about prophesying in the early church, it helps to look at prophecy in the Old Testament.

In the Old testament, there were people specifically called by God to prophesy: the prophets. Essentially the prophets told people what God had told the prophet. Often the prophecies were about what was in the hearers' future, and so included an element of prediction - foretelling the future. This is not surprising since only God fully knows the future, and true prophets related the messages of God. However, prediction was not the key attribute of the message. The important thing about the prophet's message was that it was the word of God, whether it concerned the future, the present or the past.

It is also important that according to Deuteronomy 13, there are two signs of a true prophet. First, he must not direct people to follow other gods. Second, whenever the prophet says something about future events, those events must come to pass. If the prophet promotes the worship of false gods, or if his predictions fail to come to pass, then he is a false prophet. Sometimes these false prophets were called soothsayers or seers, particularly when they were associated with false gods.

Incidentally the last of the Old Testament prophets is actually found in the New Testament. In Matthew's gospel, which we read this morning, Jesus says that John the Baptist is the last and greatest of the OId Testament prophets, because he prophesied before Jesus was crucified and was resurrected. Prior to John, there hadn't been any Old Testament prophets for about 460 years since the prophet Malachi.

After Jesus's crucifixion, resurrection, ascension and Pentecost, the early church was established. It needed people with certain gifts in order to run effectively. Ephesians 4 says God gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, 12 to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the church, the body of Christ,

Many people argue that apostles in particular, and sometimes prophets as well, were only appointed by God for the early church, and no longer required once the early church was established, which happened around the time the original apostles like Peter, Andrew, James, John, as well as Paul died, Herod's temple was destroyed in AD70, or perhaps once all the books of the New Testament were written. It also seems that miracles such as miraculous healings and true speaking in miraculous tongues also finished, or at least became less prominent around the same time. If this is the case, particularly with prophecy, what is our passage of Romans telling us? Is it encouraging prophecy, but only in the nascent church?

That could be the case if we consider prophecy to be miraculous predictions of the future as some do. Some people disagree and say that these still continue, particularly if they claim to have a prophetic ministry of this nature. The internet has numerous examples of people claiming this gift of miraculous prediction, as well of those claiming to be modern day apostles, but I would suggest that most of them are not pointing people to God but to themselves, and that their predictions do not come true, or are so vague that they cannot be tested.

Whether miraculous gifts of prediction did cease in the early church, it is clear that there is a modern prophetic function that continues today. I said that prophesying was telling God's message, and not just prediction, and at the very least speaking messages from God that those prophesying have discerned from God's word, the Bible, does continue. That is exactly what we still do every Sunday morning from this pulpit, to proclaim God's message from his word, and that's what I pray every pulpit in every church around the world is doing - exercising prophetic ministries by preaching God's word. This may include a predictive element, such as eternal life for those who believe in Jesus, but it isn't strictly necessary.

It is not to preachers or even speaking from church pulpits. It happens in personal conversations, on the internet and television and any context where people share God's word one to one or with small or large groups. Paul said "If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith" which I take it means that any Christian may have the gift of prophecy and should therefore prophesy in accordance with their faith. Paul also says that every Christian should eagerly desire the gift of prophecy, but he also makes it clear that not everyone has the gift of prophesy, although I recognise that not everyone has the gift.

You may be asking what does prophesying sound like? A key verse is 1 Corinthians 14:3 says that "the one who prophesies speaks to people for their strengthening, encouraging and comfort."

I pray that everyone at Cooma Anglican with the gift would strengthen, encourage and comfort each other with God's message, that each of us would strive to exercise a prophetic ministry.

We should seek to strengthen each other with God's message. As we see each other struggling with the challenges of everyday life. In Acts 15:32 (NIV) 32 Judas and Silas, who themselves were prophets, said much to encourage and strengthen the believers. We too can do this, perhaps by reminding each other of passages like 2 Thessalonians 3:3 (NIV) "But the Lord is faithful, and he will strengthen you and protect you from the evil one." We can remind each of the of the reality and role of the Holy Spirit in strengthening the faith of believers, and even biblical examples of how disciples and early believers were strengthened through their faith through the incredible hardships that they suffered. We have to be careful to avoid too closely linking our situations with theirs, because we may not necessarily be strengthened in the same ways, but

God's message certainly can strengthen us in our faith, strengthening us to pray and to persevere.

Sharing God's message will also encourage our Christian brothers and sisters, again like Judas and Silas did. Paul encourages the Thessalonians who were worried that Jesus hadn't returned yet with instruction about Jesus's return 1 Thessalonians 4:16 (NIV) that "the dead in Christ will rise first. 17 After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever." Paul also is always at pains to encourage the churches in his letters, sometimes the disheartened, sometimes specific groups, like young men who need to be self controlled. He always encourages with sound doctrine. Similarly, we should encourage each other in our faith, with sound doctrine from the word of God.

God's message also comforts, and in our prophetic ministry, we also should comfort our brothers and sisters from his message. In 2 Corinthians 1:3-7 (NIV) Paul "praises the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, 4 and reminds the Corinthians that he comforts us in all our troubles." We can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God through his Word. "For just as Paul shared abundantly in the sufferings of Christ, so also our comfort abounds through Christ. 6 If we are distressed, it is for your comfort and salvation; if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which produces in you patient endurance of the same sufferings we suffer." An Paul's and our hope is firm, because we know that just as we share in our sufferings, so also we share in our comfort."

There are many other situations which God's word can speak into, and we all should desire to exercise a prophetic ministry. We can debate whether the office of prophet continues in the sense of miraculous predictions, but there is no doubt that God has given us his word not only for ourselves, but also to strengthen, encourage and comfort others of his people. God intended is to bring his message to those he wants to hear it, which I take is everyone, even though some will not listen.

That message may predict future events, such as Jesus's return, judgement and eternal life, which we can be sure from his Word will come about. He also says we cannot be sure of details like dates and times, so these should never form part of our prophecies.

But God does promise that his message, the message from his Word, will strengthen, encourage and comfort his people. My prayer is that everyone in this church, and in fact every Christian will seek to exercise this gift of prophesying, and as a consequence, that this church, and in fact the world wide church of all believers will be edified - will be built up in the knowledge and love of Christ and persevere to eternal life through Jesus's death and resurrection paying the ransom for all our sin.

Will you all strive to share in this ministry of prophesying God's word?
