Reading 1 - Luke 2:1-15

¹ In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. ² (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) ³ And everyone went to their own town to register.

⁴ So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. ⁵ He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. ⁶ While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, ⁷ and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

¹⁵ When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

¹⁶ So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. ¹⁷ When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, ¹⁸ and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. ¹⁹ But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰ The

shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.

²¹ On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise the child, he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him before he was conceived.

Cooma Anglican Christmas 2025 Sermon shepherds and angels -

Luke 2:1-21

This morning I want to talk about two groups of witnesses of the baby Jesus, shepherds and angels.

Our passage says the group of shepherds was living in the fields looking after their sheep. I presume this meant that they were not particularly well off. Sleeping in the fields looking after sheep does not strike me as the most lucrative of occupations, and not something people are likely to do when there are easier alternatives.

I understand that first-century shepherds lived a rugged, nomadic life, constantly moving flocks to pasture, sleeping outdoors in sheepfolds (which were usually caves or stone pens) to guard against wolves and thieves, and enduring harsh weather (scorching sun, cold nights). It is likely many were social outcasts with low status, and were often considered dishonest, though they were essential for providing sheep for the temple sacrifices. Many would not even own the sheep they shepherded, but herded sheep for a wealthy owner, who required them to make good any losses to predators, the weather or thieves. Their days were spent leading sheep to grass and water, and nights involved watchful shifts, relying on simple tools like a staff, rod, and sling for protection.

As I mentioned earlier, there were some well known shepherds in the Bible, most prominently king David, but also Rachel and the prophet Amos. Perhaps most well known, although we don't know their names or anything else about them, were the shepherds who visited the baby Jesus not long after he was born.

I often wondered why God chose the shepherds to be the first, after Mary and Joseph, to see the incarnate Jesus. Why did God choose social outcasts with low status, and who were often considered dishonest? It seems these reasons include:

Inclusion of the Poor: God chose the socially outcast and poor shepherds, rather than powerful rulers, to announce the Saviour, highlighting that the Gospel is for "all the people," not just the influential.

Foreshadowing Jesus as the Good Shepherd: Their occupation as protectors of sheep foreshadowed Jesus' future role as the "Good Shepherd" who cares for His flock (God's people).

First Witnesses & Evangelists: They were the first human witnesses to the Christ child, immediately believing and then spreading the miraculous news,

becoming the first to proclaim the gospel, rather than the intellectuals or scholars you might expect.

Universal Message: The shepherds, representing the common people, receiving the news alongside the later visit of the Gentile Magi (wise men). This symbolizes the Christian message extending to the entire world.

Transformation from Fear to Joy: The angelic announcement replaced the shepherds' terror with overwhelming joy and wonder. This is a core theme of the Christmas message, and led them to praise God.

In essence, the shepherds' visit established Jesus' mission from the start: a humble Savior for everyone, a message of hope that begins with the overlooked and spreads outward to the whole world.

Jumping ahead for a moment, once the shepherds had heard what the angels were telling them, they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. They spread the word concerning what had been told them by the angels about this child,¹⁸ and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told. The shepherds responded in the most natural way possible to these extraordinary circumstances - they told everyone they could, and they glorified and praised God.

Our familiarity with the story of Jesus's birth often blinds us to what God was doing, but the simple shepherds, personally experiencing it, grasped the enormity of what God was doing, and they praised and worshiped Him, as was only right!

I now want to move on to the second group from our passage, the angels.

First the angel Gabriel alone appears to the shepherds, and then they see a great multitude. But what is an angel?

At the very least, an angel is a messenger of God. Angel simply means messenger, but angels in the Bible are usually powerful spiritual beings. The letter to Colossians tells us they are created by God and are part of created order. As creatures with a special relationship to God, Angels worship God, praising Him for his glory as they see it far more clearly than humans.

Often in the Old Testament, and sometimes in the New, angels look just like normal human beings, but sometimes they take on non-human form, sometimes with wings. When they appeared to the shepherds in Luke, the glory of the Lord shone from them around the shepherds. Their appearance often makes their

witnesses afraid, and the shepherds were indeed terrified. On 5 or so visitations in the Bible, the first thing the angels tell their witnesses is not to be afraid, and a few others explicitly stated the witnesses were terrified.

As I said, the most important thing is that they are God's messengers. Their specific message to the shepherds was *good news that will cause great joy for all the people.*¹¹ *Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.*¹² *This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.*

Breaking this down, the town of David was Bethlehem, a small town about 8km south of Jerusalem, and the birthplace of King David. The prophet Micah had prophesied:² "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are 'from of old', from ancient times." Micah 5:2

The angel said a saviour had been born there on that day. We don't know what the shepherds understood by saviour - perhaps they thought that the one born would save Israel from their Roman occupiers, or perhaps they thought he would save mankind from sin and death. This latter is why Jesus came.

They also described the child as the Messiah - the anointed, or chosen one. Messiah is the Hebrew word, and it translates to Christ in Greek. Christ isn't Jesus's surname, it's a title or description. The Old Testament includes numerous prophecies about the Messiah who was to come to save God's people. However, prior to Jesus, it was difficult to see, prior to Jesus, how they all came together, but they do in Jesus.

The child is also described as the Lord. This also could have different meanings or implications. It can just mean "Lord and Master" - someone who has authority over you. However the Jews also used the term Lord to refer to God. They didn't want to use God's personal name that he told Moses to avoid the risk of misusing it, so whenever God's name, Yahweh, came up in their Bibles, they would substitute "The Lord". In our Old Testaments you will often see LORD written in all capitals, and this indicates where the Hebrew says Yahweh, God's name.

Gabriel said that the shepherds would recognise the one they were talking about because he would be wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger. The cloths simply meant that he was a new born infant, but a manger was an animal's food trough, which was a lot less usual. No one who had a choice would put their newborn to bed in a food trough, but since there was no proper accommodation

for Mary and Joseph, Jesus's earthly parents, this would uniquely identify Jesus to the Shepherds.

After saying this, suddenly a great company of the heavenly host (that is angels) appeared with the angel Gabriel, praising God and saying,¹⁴ "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." As I mentioned, angels worship God, and as they recognised what God was doing by sending his Son Jesus into the world as Saviour of his people - those on whom his favour rests, they cannot help themselves but praise and worship him.

So, Luke tells us of both ends of creation - humble shepherds and glorious angels, both praising and worshiping God for what on the outside simply seemed to be another human baby being born into impoverished circumstances, lying in an animal's food trough - not even an inn, and well short of the palace they should have expected.

Jesus has come to save all who would put their trust in him, from the poor to the most influential. By appearing to protectors of sheep he foreshadowed his role as the "Good Shepherd" who cares for His flock (for God's people). The shepherds were the first human witnesses to the Christ child and immediately believed and were the first to proclaim the gospel, and the angelic announcement replaced the shepherds' terror with overwhelming joy and wonder, leading them to praise and worship God.

This Christmas, we should recognise what the shepherds and the angels recognised, that God was doing what was truly wondrous and remarkable. Not only has it been prophesied hundreds of years before in the Old Testament, but by sending his own Son, truly God and truly human, to the world to save it from our sin and death, we too should praise God. As Jesus he and we come to see how he heals the sick, feeds the multitudes and ultimately dies on the cross to take the punishment we deserve for our sins, we, like the angels and the shepherds need to put our trust in him, to praise him and proclaim this, the greatest news possible, to all who will hear.

Will you do that this Christmas?
