The fourth Sunday of Advent, the Sunday of Love.

What is love? Its another of these things which we initially think of as an emotion or something we feel but so much more, so much

deeper and enduring than a simple emotion. In English we can say, I love ice-cream, I love my garden, I love my spouse and my family, and I love God but mean fractionally different things in every statement. The Greeks had 7 different words for love, 4 of which are used in the Bible which we can roughly define but the reality is that in many instances they used them interchangeably so we should not get too attached to the definitions.

Eros is Greek for sensual or romantic love. When the glow of Eros love fades a little is when some couples break up. Within marriage, eros love is to be celebrated and enjoyed as a beautiful blessing from God. Often, if we make the decision to let it, eros loves grows into

something deeper: family love, friendship, and unconditional love.

Storge describes family love, the affectionate bond that develops naturally between parents and children, and brothers and sisters.

Christians are members of God's family. Our lives are knit together by something stronger than physical ties—the bonds of the Spirit. God calls his children to love each other with the deep affection of storge love.

Philia is the type of intimate love in the Bible that most Christians practice toward each other. This Greek term describes the powerful emotional bond seen in deep friendships.

Philia is the most general type of love in Scripture, encompassing love for fellow humans, care, respect, and compassion for people in need. The concept of brotherly love that unites believers is unique to Christianity. Jesus said philia would be an identifier of his followers: "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples if you love one another."



Agape is the highest of the four types of love in the Bible. This term defines God's immeasurable, incomparable love for humankind. It is the divine love that comes from God. Agape love is perfect, unconditional, sacrificial, and pure. Jesus Christ demonstrated this kind of divine love to his Father and to all

humanity in the way he lived and died.

Love is one of the most powerful emotions humans can experience. For Christian believers, love is the truest test of genuine faith. Through the Bible, we discover how to experience love in its many forms and to share it with others as God intended.

In our gospel reading today at last, we have something we associate with the Christmas story.



So, we all know the story, Zachariah and Elizabeth were an older couple who had never had children until one day Zachariah was taking his turn in the temple as priest when God sends a heavenly messenger

to tell him that they are going to have a baby who will prepare the way of the Lord: John the Baptist. Zachariah takes a moment to understand and believe so the Lord gives him a sign - he can't speak until the baby is born.

A few months later the angel comes to Mary to tell her that she is going to be the mother of the Messiah and as an aside tells her that Elizabeth is pregnant. Mary sets off to visit her beloved cousin and our reading today is the result.



You have to wonder if Mary was having a rough time at home, perhaps even her family were a little unsure of this angel story and like any small town I'm sure the tongues were wagging, but

Mary had someone who loved her, trusted her, and believed her, someone who had also seen the Lord at work in her own life and could help and support her. To be chosen by God often means at one and the same time a crown of joy and the cross of sorrow. The piercing truth is that God does not choose a person for ease and comfort but for a task that will take all that head and heart and hand can bring to it but through that time he also brings others to support us.

Mary's visit to Elizabeth is a wonderful human portrait of the older woman, pregnant at last after hope had gone and the younger woman, pregnant far sooner than she had expected. We don't need to define whether this was family or friendship love, it was love and exactly the support that Mary needed.



The meeting of the women is greeted by a sign: The child in Elizabeth's womb leaps for Joy and Elizabeth is filled with the Holy Spirit and speaks words of prophecy.

There was no way for Elizabeth to have know that Mary was pregnant, the implication is that this news was given to her by the spirit. She does not bless Mary but recognised that Mary was already blessed because Mary is the 'mother of my Lord'. Elizabeth has already recognised that this unborn child is her Messiah and Lord.

The angel had promised Zechariah that he would have joy and now joy has come to Elizabeth through the visitation of Mary. The unborn John has already begun to fulfil his calling as one who would declare the Lord's coming and prepare a place for him.



Elizabeth also pronounces a beatitude on Mary for her faith that the promise to her would be fulfilled. We know it is true because we know the story of the Angel coming to Mary and Mary's response. Blessing always comes from trusting that God's word will be fulfilled.

Mary and Elizabeth, like so many Jews of their time, searched the scriptures, soaked themselves in the Psalms and prophetic writings which spoke of mercy, hope, joy and love and God coming to the rescue at last.



The Song of Mary which we had as our Psalm today is the continuation of our reading from Luke. When my grandchildren are very happy, they sometimes burst into song. Its usually something


they have made up on the spot but also reflects what they have been listening to lately. This is exactly what Mary did. Her song is her own, but it also reflects on scripture especially the Song of Hannah from 1 Samuel.



She starts with praise and identifies herself with the lowly but do notice that she is talking in the present tense, this is not something which will happen eventually but what has already begun. More than

predictions, the Magnificat praises God for the goodness of God's nature and the redemption that Israel and the church have experienced. It makes clear the pattern of God's activity. Every line echoes other scriptures.

Notice that she rightly says that God is our saviour. We often refer to Jesus as our saviour but in fact the whole Godhead is our saviour. All that Jesus does during his life on earth to effect salvation - calling for repentance, forgiving sinners, healing the sick, casting out demons, eating with outcasts and dying a redemptive death, he does according to purpose and intent. He himself said "Very truly I tell you, the Son can do nothing by himself; he can do only what he sees his Father doing, because whatever the Father does the Son also does.



The whole basis of our trust, hope, peace, joy, and love should be clear: God is our saviour.

Underneath everything that both Elizabeth and Mary said is a celebration of God and his love. God has taken the initiative - God the Lord, the saviour, the powerful one, the Holy one, the faithful one. God is the ultimate reason to celebrate. God is unconditional love.
