Sermon

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Through Christ, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name.

The Prayers

Grant that they may impartially administer justice, restrain wickedness and vice, and uphold integrity and truth.

We beseech you to inspire continually the universal Church with the spirit of truth, unity, and concord; and grant that all who confess your holy name may agree in the truth of your holy word, and live in unity and godly love.

Give grace, heavenly Father, to all bishops and other ministers (especially N our bishop and...), that, by their life and doctrine, they may set forth your true, life-giving word, and rightly and duly administer your holy sacraments. And to all your people give your heavenly grace, and especially to this congregation here present, that they may receive your word with meek hearts and due reverence and serve you in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life.

We ask you of your goodness, Lord, to comfort and sustain all who in this transitory life are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness, or any other adversity.

We also bless your holy name for all your servants who have died in the faith of Christ. Give us grace to follow their good examples, that with them we may be partakers of your heavenly kingdom. Grant this, Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only mediator and advocate. **Amen**

Brothers and sisters in Christ, we who would come to the holy communion of the body and blood of our Saviour Christ must consider how St Paul exhorts us to examine ourselves before presuming to eat of that bread and drink of that cup.

For the benefit is great, if with a penitent heart and lively faith we receive that holy sacrament. We then spiritually eat the flesh of Christ and drink his blood; we dwell in Christ and he in us; we are one with Christ and Christ with us.

Yet also the danger is great, if we receive the bread and cup unworthily. Judge yourselves therefore, that you be not judged of the Lord. Repent truly of your sins, having a steadfast faith in Christ our Saviour. Amend your lives and love your neighbour.

Above all, give hearty thanks to God for the redemption of the world by the death and passion of our Saviour Christ, truly God and truly human, who humbled himself to death on the cross for us sinners, that he might make us childrenof God, and raise us to eternal life.

Confession

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, maker of all things, judge of all people, we acknowledge with shame the sins we have committed, by thought, word, and deed, against your divine majesty, provoking most justly your wrath and indignation against us.

We earnestly repent, and are heartily sorry for all our misdoings.

On the second Sunday of Lent we start by looking at the Journey to Jerusalem and what would happened there. As our readings progress through Lent so will we hear more about that Journey

In today's reading some of the moderate Pharisees come to Jesus and warn him that Herod wants to kill him. We know that this is no idle threat because Herod has already killed John the Baptist. However, Jesus knows his destiny and he knows that Herod will be only a bit player in the drama of the crucifixion, so he dismisses that old fox and talks about his mission to the people that God loves.

It will not be literally three days until he gets to Jerusalem but a figurative three days, three days are a symbolic amount because Jesus needs to do his mission and then complete it on the third day. As we all remember Jesus was in the temple when he was twelve for three days and he will be in the tomb three days, it is all drawing attention to that perfect number 3. The trinity.



It is common for mother hens to protect their chicks by covering them with their wings. Anytime there is danger the mother hen calls her chicks, and they are safe. Sometimes the mother hen dies from fire or

other danger, but the chicks emerge safe at the end. This is what makes this analogy so apt, Jesus knows quite well that he is about to die for the people.

Jesus loves his people even more than a hen loves her chicks, but the people of his time would not, could not recognise the danger and would not come to Jesus to be saved.

In hindsight we can see what Jesus' journey to Jerusalem is going to mean. Israel's greatest crisis is coming upon her, and Jesus is offering an urgent summons to repent, to come to his kingdom-way, his way of peace.



Jesus' intention, in obedience to his vocation, is to go to Jerusalem, that city that stones the prophets, and like the hen with her chicks to take upon himself the full force of

that disaster. He will give himself on behalf of the many.

During Lent we prepare ourselves for Easter when we remember that Jesus did die for us and rise again. You could say we are on a journey to Easter as we follow Jesus on his journey.

Jesus knew all along what his destiny was going to be, he lived his whole ministry blessing, healing and comforting people, telling them the good news, and all that knowing that he was going to die for them and for us. In some sense Jesus carried his cross his whole ministry.

"Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord." Is a phrase from Psalm 118 which is a processional hymn sung by the pilgrims as they approach the temple. So, Jesus is saying that they will not see him again until they recognise who he truly is. Although his disciples chanted this Psalm on Palm Sunday the authorities never recognized Him on this earth.

For all the state of the state

Our reading from Corinthians is mostly a warning not to behave like those people who rejected Jesus but ends with this promise.

¹³ No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it. Whenever we are tempted to behave like those people, God will give us the strength to resist because He is Faithful.

Jesus was faithful on earth and fulfilled his destiny to die for us. God is faithful and he will walk with us through every trial and temptation, every testing.

God is faithful. We know He loves us with an everlasting love and wants to bless us in every way and yet there are times when things happen in our lives, and we think 'it has all gone wrong, what is God doing?'



This week I have been at Clergy Retreat at Galong. I don't know if you know it but it is a beautiful old monastery beyond Yass. Lovely countryside. Nice rooms, great food, and a labyrinth. Whenever I am there, I try to walk the labyrinth every day.

With COVID they have had to cut down on ground staff so this year the labyrinth had a few weeds. Each day I pulled a couple out. A labyrinth is a journey in itself. You follow the path and sometimes, you are so close to the centre, you could just step over the few rocks and be there, sometimes you are back at the very edge, sometimes you are almost back where you started but you just keep following he path. Sometimes the path stretches ahead of you and you feel like your really making progress, then suddenly the path takes a U turn, sometimes the path is short and then you take another turn.



But the whole time you just trust the path maker and unlike a maze, there are no dead ends, no false paths and finally you arrive at the centre.

I love labyrinths, I see so many parallels with life and with our journey through Lent.

In my life God has taken me to places that were my idea of heaven and then taken me away again, there have been paths that seemed to be endless delight which have turned suddenly to nothing, and paths which seemed to be very short which have opened to wonderful times. U turns and times when I thought I might soon arrive, and times when the path seemed to be leading in totally the wrong direction but also my Lord has led me on and I know that I will never reach my destination in this life but I know that I can totally trust the path maker and he will lead me through many wonderful places but eventually home.

Wherever you are in your life right now, God is a loving God and he will look after you, he will take you to those places of blessing in his time. You don't have to understand you only have to trust.

As we read in Isaiah: For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts. Says the Lord.

Just as Jesus turned his face to Jerusalem so too in Lent we turn our face to look at our sins and anything which is holding us back from walking the path that Jesus is calling us to walk. Sometimes things that have no vice in them at all are just not right for us at this time. It was traditional to give up things for lent but it was never dsigned to punish us but as a way to cut oursleves off from things which are holding us back.

One year I gave up a computer game which was taking way to much of my time. I was sneeking off to play it whenever I could find five minutes. It was not a good use of my time so I gave it up for lent and never went back to it. Most years I give up chocolate and or wine and go back to them after Easter but when I go back to them I am not bound to them, I enjoy them but I know that I don't need them, they have no power over me.

So this Lent as you walk the path with our Lord, do notice if he points out any weeds you need to remove, and trust him to lead you to the place where you need to be.
