Acts 9.1-20

¹ Meanwhile, Saul was still breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples. He went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues in Damascus, so that if he found any there who belonged to the Way, whether men or women, he might take them as prisoners to Jerusalem.

³ As he neared Damascus on his journey, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴ He fell to the ground and heard a voice say to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?'

⁵ 'Who are you, Lord?' Saul asked. 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting,' he replied. ⁶ 'Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do.'

⁷ The men travelling with Saul stood there speechless; they heard the sound but did not see anyone. ⁸ Saul got up from the ground, but when he opened his eyes, he could see nothing. So, they led him by the hand into Damascus. ⁹ For three days he was blind and did not eat or drink anything.

¹⁰ In Damascus there was a disciple named Ananias. The Lord called to him in a vision, 'Ananias!' 'Yes, Lord,' he answered. ¹¹ The Lord told him, 'Go to the house of Judas on Straight Street and ask for a man from Tarsus named Saul, for he is praying. ¹² In a vision he has seen a man named Ananias come and place his hands on him to restore his sight.'

¹³ 'Lord,' Ananias answered, 'I have heard many reports about this man and all the harm he has done to your holy people in Jerusalem. ¹⁴ And he has come here with authority from the chief priests to arrest all who call on your name.'

¹⁵ But the Lord said to Ananias, 'Go! This man is my chosen instrument to proclaim my name to the Gentiles and their kings and to the people of Israel. ¹⁶ I will show him how much he must suffer for my name.'

¹⁷ Then Ananias went to the house and entered it. Placing his hands on Saul, he said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord – Jesus, who appeared to you on the road as you were coming here – has sent me so that you may see again and be filled with the Holy Spirit.'

¹⁸ Immediately, something like scales fell from Saul's eyes, and he could see again.

He got up and was baptised, ¹⁹ and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

Saul spent several days with the disciples in Damascus.²⁰ At once he began to preach in the synagogues that Jesus is the Son of God.

- and have not suffered my foes to triumph over me.
- ² O Lord my God, I cried to you: and you have made me whole.

- can the dust give you thanks, or declare your faithfulness? ¹⁰ 'Hear, O Lord, and be merciful: O Lord, be my helper.'

- you have put off my sackcloth and girded me with joy,
- ¹² That my heart may sing your praise and never be silent:
 - O Lord my God, I will give you thanks for ever.

Revelation 5.6-14

⁶ Then I saw a Lamb, looking as if it had been slain, standing at the centre of the throne, encircled by the four living creatures and the elders. The Lamb had seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth.

⁷ He went and took the scroll from the right hand of him who sat on the throne. ⁸ And when he had taken it, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell down before the Lamb. Each one had a harp and they were holding golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of God's people. ⁹ And they sang a new song, saying: 'You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, because you were slain, and with your blood you purchased for God persons from every tribe and language and people and nation. ¹⁰ You have made them to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God, and they will reign on the earth.'

¹¹ Then I looked and heard the voice of many angels, numbering thousands upon thousands, and ten thousand times ten thousand. They encircled the throne and the living creatures and the elders. ¹² In a loud voice they were saying: 'Worthy is the Lamb, who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honour and glory and praise!'

¹³ Then I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and on the sea, and all that is in them, saying: 'To him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb be praise and honour and glory and power, for ever and ever!' ¹⁴ The four living creatures said, 'Amen', and the elders fell down and worshipped.

John 21.1-19

¹ Afterwards Jesus appeared again to his disciples, by the Sea of Galilee. It happened this way: ² Simon Peter, Thomas (also known as Didymus), Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two other disciples were together. ³ 'I'm going out to fish,' Simon Peter told them, and they said, 'We'll go with you.' So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

⁴ Early in the morning, Jesus stood on the shore, but the disciples did not realise that it was Jesus. ⁵ He called out to them, 'Friends, haven't you any fish?' 'No,' they answered.

⁶ He said, 'Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some.' When they did, they were unable to haul the net in because of the large number of fish.

⁷ Then the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' As soon as Simon Peter heard him say, 'It is the Lord,' he wrapped his outer garment round him (for he had taken it off) and jumped into the water.

⁸ The other disciples followed in the boat, towing the net full of fish, for they were not far from shore, about a hundred metres.

⁹ When they landed, they saw a fire of burning coals there with fish on it, and some bread. ¹⁰ Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish you have just caught.'

¹¹ So Simon Peter climbed back into the boat and dragged the net ashore. It was full of large fish, 153, but even with so many the net was not torn.

¹² Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' None of the disciples dared ask him, 'Who are you?' They knew it was the Lord.

¹³ Jesus came, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. ¹⁴ This was now the third time Jesus appeared to his disciples after he was raised from the dead.

¹⁵ When they had finished eating, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' 'Yes, Lord,' he said, 'you know that I love you.' Jesus said, 'Feed my lambs.'

¹⁶ Again Jesus said, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He answered, 'Yes, Lord, you know that I love you.' Jesus said, 'Take care of my sheep.'

¹⁷ The third time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter was hurt because Jesus asked him the third time, 'Do you love me?' He said, 'Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you.' Jesus said, 'Feed my sheep.

¹⁸ Very truly I tell you, when you were younger you dressed yourself and went where you wanted; but when you are old you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go.' ¹⁹ Jesus said this to indicate the kind of death by which Peter would glorify God.

Then he said to him, 'Follow me!'

Sermon

The creed

Blessing

So, the disciples have seen the risen Lord, he has told them that he is sending them, as his Father had sent him, but they are not really sure what all this means, so rather than just hang around, they go fishing. Sometimes when we don't

really know what the Lord wants us to do it is much better to do something that at least looks possible rather than sit around doing nothing. I'm sure you have heard the expression "it is easier to steer a moving ship'. It is easier for the Lord to say 'no' or move us a little towards the right direction if we are doing something than if we are just waiting.

Fishing is what they know how to do and at worst will help feed their families, but they work all night and catch nothing. Even their old skills have left them, the sun is rising, it is time to go home and get some sleep but a figure on the shore calls out to them.



The figure tells them to let down their nets on the other side and as they haul in a stunning catch, they realise that the figure is the risen Lord.

There is significance in the time of day when all this happens.

Dawn is a time full of beauty and possibility and at that moment Jesus appears to them, just as the sun appears over the horizon and brings light to a new day so Jesus the son of God appears at the end of our darkness and brings a new beginning.

When Jesus saw them before, he had commissioned them to work for him, he breathed on them to be filled with God's spirit and sent them into the world to do his work in the world. If they try to do it their own way, they will fail. They will toil all night and take nothing. The only way is for them to admit defeat, listen afresh to Jesus' voice and do what he says. Then there is no knowing what they will achieve.



Peter, who longed to see Jesus and clearly had unfinished business with him, in his usual style, cannot wait for the boat to come to shore and leaps out and goes to Jesus.

At the last supper Peter has insisted that he would remain loyal to Jesus no matter what, in fact he insists that he would die for his Lord. Throughout that dreadful night of Jesus' arrest Peter had followed but it all went horribly wrong. Then instead of leaving after the first mistake he stays and gets it wrong twice more. Three times he denies that he is one of Jesus' followers and then the cock crows. And those denials happened beside a charcoal fire. As he ran away, realising what he had done, the smell of that fire would have lingered in his nostrils, that smell would be a trigger to remind him that Jesus knew what he had done, his friend the beloved disciple knew, and God knew. Not the resurrection, not even Jesus saying 'peace be with you' would really get rid of that memory.



As he came to the beach where Jesus was waiting, the smoke from another charcoals fire would have filled his nostrils and brought it all back.

Jesus does not address Peter's painful memory but asks the disciples to bring some of the fish they have just caught. Jesus is already cooking fish and bread on his charcoal fire. He doesn't need their catch. He is well capable of looking after himself and them. John is not telling us these details to fill in time, he wants us to understand the way Jesus works.



Sometimes we get the impression that if we don't do God's work in the world it just won't get done. As if somehow God cannot do anything without us physically participating. That is ridiculous: God is God he made the world and everything in it all without any help from us and he continues to run the

universe and speak into people's lives every day whether or not we contribute.

Who guides us to think and pray and love and hope? Who is the Lord of the World? We have been given the Holy Spirit to enable us to work for Jesus; but neither the institution of the church nor any individual member can upstage God. Jesus asks for and welcomes Peter's catch, but he doesn't need it.

Of course, we are to work hard. Of course, we are to be organised, there is no excuse for laziness, sloppiness, or half-heartedness in the Kingdom of God. If its God work, we are doing, we must do it with all our might, but it is God's work, Jesus remains sovereign and whatever we do, we are joining in his work. It has a certain similarity to when a small grandchild makes cookies at Gramma's place. We know who really did the work but we encourage the child anyway.



So, when they had eaten breakfast Jesus spoke to Peter. The most remarkable thing about this interchange, is that by way of forgiveness, Jesus gives Peter a job to do. When Peter professes

his love, Jesus doesn't say, "Well, that's alight then.' He says, 'Feed my lambs.'

The three questions correspond to Peter's three denials. Three for completeness, yes but also three for reminder. The smell of the charcoal fire lingers. Peter's night of agony, Jesus' night of agony hovers in the background. But because of Jesus's night of agony Peter's failure can be dealt with. Jesus is the passover Lamb who takes away the sins of the world, Peter's botch up, and our mistakes and failures.



We all have done things that we regret, things that need to be dealt with before we can operate the way God meant us to operate. Just as he dealt with Peter, Jesus goes to where the pain is. Yes, it hurts to touch but as we let him deal with it, he can heal, restore, and forgive.

Different words are used in the questions, but these differences are not important. What matters is that the question is asked and answered. And each time the response earns the command. Time to learn to be a shepherd. Jesus is sharing his own work, his own ministry with Peter.



It is, after all Jesus who is the good shepherd. It is Jesus who leads and feeds his sheep and lambs, guids them to and from pasture, keeps them safe. He knows them and they know him. He has now given his life for them. When Jesus said, 'As the Father sent me, so I'm sending you'. He

meant it. He meant it for Peter, for all the disciples and for everyone who has followed him since.

This is the basic of all Christian Ministry, yours, and mine, lay and ordained, It's the secret of everything from being a quiet member of a small prayer group to being a speaker at huge rallies. If you are going to do anything, as a follower of Jesus, it has to be built on his love

There is nothing you can do to earn the forgiveness of Jesus. Nothing can do that. It is grace from start to finish. Everything we do we do out of joy and relief that we are already forgiven. Things we are given to do precisely as the sign that we are forgiven,



Peter did it, Peter went from strength to strength, he still made mistakes, but he became a shepherd. He loved Jesus and looked after his sheep.

We can do it too, no matter what is in our past, God can and will forgive and heal and give us new tasks to

do, it might not be leading the church in our time, but it will be looking after his sheep in whatever way he has equipped us to serve.
