³⁶ In Joppa there was a disciple named Tabitha (in Greek her name is Dorcas); she was always doing good and helping the poor. ³⁷ About that time she became ill and died, and her body was washed and placed in an upstairs room.

³⁸ Lydda was near Joppa; so when the disciples heard that Peter was in Lydda, they sent two men to him and urged him, 'Please come at once!'

³⁹ Peter went with them, and when he arrived, he was taken upstairs to the room. All the widows stood round him, crying, and showing him the robes and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was still with them.

Sermon

Creed

Blessing

The God of peace, who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you what is pleasing in his sight; and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**



Our gospel reading was the feast of Hanukkah or Dedication. Why is that significant?

Let me tell you a little history: In between the Old and New Testament yet another tyrant had taken over Israel and desecrated the Temple, then a hero called Judas Maccabaeus led a rebellion, defeated the tyrant, rededicated the temple and became king. The people are praising God that they can worship in their temple but also thinking about rebellions and kings, so they ask Jesus if he is the Messiah.

It is a very dangerous question, and in talking about sheep Jesus is skimming very close to danger because in Jewish Theology Kings are always also Shepherds. The Good Shepherd is a metaphor for the restored rule of God throughout the Old Testament and so it always has messianic implications.



We tend to think of the Good Shepherd analogy as a nice, serene picture with the sheep peacefully grazing in the field and the shepherd just watching over them, when a shepherd does his true

work when danger strikes, in the form of a lion or a bear. The image of the Good Shepherd is really all about power and rule, about God's kingdom and the world's kingdoms, about God appointing a true king, not in a place where there is a vacant throne but where there have been too many kings all of them grasping for power and ready to strike out at anyone trying to stake a new claim.

So, Jesus returns to the shepherd, sheep theme with a glorious and spectacular promise to his sheep. He promises that those who recognise his voice, his sheep, will be safe for ever. He will look after them, and even death itself, the last enemy, cannot ultimately harm them. The reason Jesus can be so confident of this is that the guarantee in his own unbreakable bond of love with the father, and the fact that his sheep are the ones the father has given him.



This underscores the fact that Jesus and the Father do the same work; what is true of the work of one is true of the work of the other. Jesus gives explicit expression to this inseparable unity when he says, 'The Father and I are one".

He is saying that he and the Father are united in the work they do. It is impossible to distinguish Jesus' work from the Father's work. Yes, he is the Messiah but both more than, and other than, the traditional expectations for the Messiah, His power is not that of a political liberator who will restore Israel; it is the very power of God, the Father shares with Jesus his redemptive power over life, death and judgement.



In our reading from Revelation the metaphor shifts a little, The Risen Christ is no longer pictured as a human Shepherd but as a lamb. The lamb who sits upon the throne beside his Father. This is the lamb that was slain, the

Passover Lamb who died for our failures. We are his people, and he became a man so that he could be exactly like us and die for us. Or if we are speaking metaphorically: We are his sheep, and he became a sheep so that he could be exactly like us and die for us.

As Paul said in 2 Corinthians (8:9) For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich.



Some people are a little worried by the Book of Revelation, they are not sure how to interpret it but the whole book was written by John in his old age to the early church. The early church is

about to face terrible persecution and they must be ready for it. What he is telling them here is part of his continuing vision; a vision of the heavenly reality which is the truth against which their earthy nightmare must be measured. This he is saying, is the ultimate reality of the situation, and you must hold on to it for dear life as the nightmare unfolds. The reality is that the creator God and the lamb have already won the victory which means that those who follow the lamb are rescued from harm.

This reality is still true today: people who claim the lamb's protection may well have to come through a time of suffering, very few people have a charmed life, but they will eventually find themselves in the true reality, God's throne room, worshipping and serving him day and night with great, abundant exuberant joy.



We will join with the heavenly chorus in worshipping God saying: 'Amen! Praise and glory and wisdom and thanks and honour and

power and strength be to our God for ever and ever. Amen! Recognizing with joy that everything good, noble, powerful, and wise comes from God himself. This is not a bare, dry theology acknowledging that there is only one God but the uninhibited shout of praise to the God from whom all blessings flow.

One of those incredible blessings is that all of us who have lived the nightmare that is often the reality of life on earth will wear clothes of white. This is not because we necessarily lived lives of total holiness and purity but because the blood of the lamb Jesus himself, has rescued us from slavery and made us able to stand in the very presence of the living God.

For the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd, the metaphor has returned to the shepherd, and we are reminded of the wonderful 23rd Psalm.



The Lord will be our Shepherd in this life and the next, God the Father is our Shepherd, Jesus, the risen lamb, is our Shepherd. Sounds rather like what Jesus said in our gospel reading. Jesus and

the Father do the same work; what is true of the work of one is true of the work of the other. 'The Father and I are one". They work in total unity to ensure that we lack nothing and all those other blessings.

God will protect his people from the elements, and from hunger and thirst and God himself will wipe every tear from their eyes. Isn't that such an intimate and loving promise, that tells us so much about God's love. This is the God we worship, not some faceless uncaring official who wants all the rules followed but our loving shepherd who walks with us every day.

That does not mean that we will have everything we want. Our heavenly Father is not a sugar Daddy who will spoil us with all sorts of things that we want in the moment but in the long term would not be good for us.



What it does mean is that even when we go through tough times, he will be there with us and whether we see it or not he will be protecting us from stuff even scarier than lions and he will lead us through until at last we come to the table spread before us and know that we are home.

The Psalm and Revelation are telling us the same truth, God doesn't just allow us into his presence, he welcomes us and shelters us, literally he will pitch his tent over us, and just like the Israelites travelling with God's tent of the Tabernacle travelling through the wilderness we will receive all the blessing of his presence.



And we can each say:

Surely your goodness and loving-kindness will follow me all the days of my life: and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord for ever
