## Jeremiah 4.11-12, 4.22-28

<sup>11</sup> At that time this people and Jerusalem will be told, 'A scorching wind from the barren heights in the desert blows towards my people, but not to winnow or cleanse; <sup>12</sup> a wind too strong for that comes from me. Now I pronounce my judgments against them.' <sup>22</sup> 'My people are fools; they do not know me. They are senseless children; they have no understanding. ## Luke 15.1-10

<sup>1</sup> Now the tax collectors and sinners were all gathering round to hear Jesus. <sup>2</sup> But the Pharisees and the teachers of the law muttered, 'This man welcomes sinners, and eats with them.' <sup>3</sup> Then Jesus told them this parable: <sup>4</sup> 'Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? <sup>5</sup> And when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders <sup>6</sup> and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbours together and says, "Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep." <sup>7</sup> I tell you that in the same way there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who do not need to repent. <sup>8</sup> 'Or suppose a woman has ten silver coins and loses one. Doesn't she light a lamp, sweep the house and search carefully until she finds it? <sup>9</sup> And when she finds it, she calls her friends and neighbours together and says, "Rejoice with me; I have found my lost coin." <sup>10</sup> In the same way, I tell you, there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.'

How would we feel if someone we had long despised for their way of life turned up at church and declared that they were a

Christian? There might be a few questions. How much of their lifestyle would we expect them to change before we would accept them? Or would we say how marvellous and leave it to God to do what he wanted in their lives.

The pharisees were the 'good people' of their time, they worked really hard to know what the law said, what it meant and to apply it in their own lives. Just the sort of people we would welcome in our church. Their problem was that they had come to assume that God approved of them because they followed the law and they despised everyone who didn't measure up to their standards. They followed every little detail but managed to forget that God had made the Israelites a special people so that they could tell the rest of the world how much he loved them.



The Pharisees had a list of people who they considered the very lowest, tax collectors, camel drivers, sailors, gamblers dyers and shepherds. Just above them were the ordinary poor people, those

who had to work hard just to survive and had no time to study the law and sometimes needed to do things that were not quite acceptable.

It is quite ironic that shepherds were considered shiftless, thieving and trespassers although the Old Testament is full of images of God as the shepherd of his people and religious leaders were supposed to be shepherds under God of their local flock. One of the reasons Jesus told the parable of the lost sheep was to remind them of this image of God as the Good shepherd.



The scandal for the Pharisees was that Jesus received such outcasts, shared table fellowship, and even played host to them. By accepting

sinners and eating with them Jesus is indicating God's gracious spirit towards the very people held in contempt by the Pharisees and scribes: The celebration of the coming of the kingdom was taking place in Jesus' table fellowship with the outcasts, but because the Pharisees righteousness had become a barrier separating them from the outcasts, the Pharisees were missing it.

The whole point of the parable of the lost sheep that the only difference about this sheep is that it is lost. Imagine the impact of this on the repentant sinners who heard the stories, they didn't have to earn God's love or Jesus' respect. He loved coming looking for them and celebrated finding them. And what Jesus did - this is the deepest point of these parables and the ultimate reason why the pharisees objected to them - was what God was doing. Jesus actions on earth corresponded exactly to God's love in the heavenly realm.



The woman with a small saving or dowry, probably kept as a headdress, would search tirelessly before accepting the loss of a single coin. Her house is typical of a poor house at the time, with a

dirt floor, a small door, and no window. She lights a lamp, sweeps the house and searches carefully. When she finds the coin, she rejoices and calls her female friends to celebrate with her.

In both parables, rejoicing calls for celebration. Neither sheep nor coins can repent, but the parable aims not at calling the 'sinners' to repentance but at calling the 'righteous' to join the celebration. The god who showed mercy to the renegade Israelites in the wilderness rejoices over the salvation of every lost person like a shepherd rejoices over the recovery of a lost sheep or a woman rejoices over the finding of a lost coin. The question posed by the parables is whether we will join in the celebration - to celebrate with God one must also share in God's mercy.

Jesus is <u>not</u> saying that such people were simply accepted as they stand, Sinners must repent, the lost sheep and the lost coin are found. But Jesus had a different idea of what 'repentance' means. For the Pharisees, nothing short of adopting their standards of purity and lawobservance would do. For Jesus, when people follow him and his way, his law of love, that is true repentance. The Pharisees and legal experts themselves need to repent in that way. When Jesus says 'righteous persons who don't need to repent' he is being a little tongue-in-cheek. Anyone who sees themselves as better than others needs to repent.



A person who repents and follows Jesus does not become perfect immediately, some of the things that the church has frowned on in the last decade or two are never mentioned in the bible, but new Christians experience a lot of peer pressure to immediately confirm

to the standards of "Christianity'.

I have known lovely Christians who still smoke but feel very guilty about it and they go away and hide when they need a smoke. God has a more important agenda for these people, he wants their heart to be right much more than their lungs. When the time is right, he will work with them to give up the habit, but his plan is totally different to what we would devise. In the same way whatever external things we might notice about a new Christian it is the internal things which show their, or our, growth in the Lord. Do they love their family better, are they kinder to their neighbours, can you see the fruit of the spirit growing in their lives?



The point of the parables is clear. That is why there is a party going on: all heaven is having a party; the angels are joining in and if we don't have one as well, we'll be out of tune with God's reality.

In the stories of the sheep and the coin, the punch line in each case depends on the Jewish belief that the two halves of God's creation, heaven, and earth, were meant to fit together and be in harmony with each other. If you discover what's going on in heaven, you'll discover how things are meant to be on earth. That, after all, is the point of praying that God's kingdom will come 'on earth as in heaven'.

As far as the legal experts were concerned, the closest you could get to heaven was in the temple; the temple required strict purity from the priests; and the closest that non-priest could come to copying heaven was to maintain a similarly strict purity in aspect of life. But now Jesus was declaring that heaven was having a great noisy party every time a single sinner saw the light and began to follow god's way. If earth dwellers wanted to copy the life of heaven, they'd have a party too. That is what Jesus is doing.



Imagine the party when Paul saw the light, on the road and then a few days later, when the Lord opened his eyes. Paul had been persecuting the church, but he immediately turned his life around and followed Jesus in every way. In our reading today he is writing to Timothy his protégé to give him advice about working for the kingdom as a pastor, but he gets a little sidetracked and can't help but have his own little party as he celebrates God's mercy to him. I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who has given me strength, that he considered me trustworthy, appointing me to his service. The grace of our Lord was poured out on me abundantly, along with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. <sup>15</sup> Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners.

The Pharisees tried to please God by being moral, but Jesus came into the world to save sinners. The world often sees us very like the Pharisees, they see us as 'good,' as rule keepers, they do not see us partying because a sinner was saved. The gospel is good news especially for those who find life difficult-let us share the good news without refusing anyone.



Each one of us has received God's mercy and love, through no credit of our own. We are the lost sheep, or the lost coin and our loving God

came and found us and brought us home. The party continues as we bring more lost sheep into his fold.

Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honour and glory for ever and ever. Amen.
