Choose Your Own Adventure

A while ago now there were a lot of children's books published with the theme of Choose your own Adventure. Publishers allowed the purchaser to insert their child's name as the main character in the story. Throughout the books there were moments of decision where the reader would have to decide what course of action to take. Depending on the decision, the reader would skip to a specified page and continue the narrative from there until the next decision point. The intention was that these stories helped children to learn that choices have consequences and equipped them to make sound choices in life.

Similarly, today's story of healing in John's Gospel is another example where we can read ourselves into the narrative taking the role of the cripple who was healed and ask ourselves some deep questions.

We have all been crippled or harmed as we journeyed through life. How are you afflicted? Physical limitation? Mental illness? Betrayed by those you should have been able to trust and now you are unable to trust people? You didn't have the education opportunities or opportunity to become what you dreamed you would be? An unfortunate accident changed your life? Social convention forced you into a lifestyle you didn't want? Abusive parents or spouse? Something else?

Do you really want to get better? Are you content in your misery? What are you trusting in to get better? Win Lotto? Meet the right person? Own the right stuff? Have an ideal job? Not be in a job? Better home or garden? Something else?

Who or What gets in your way? Social conventions? Imposed gender roles? An abusive person in your childhood who squashed your hopes and dreams? Influential or powerful people who block your way? Your own sense of defeat? Something else?

Jesus picks your out from the crowd, are you pleased? Want to hide? don't believe that he really wants you? Prefer to stay as you are? Confused? Something else?

How does that make you feel? Are you grateful for someone in your life? Are you upset, is there someone you need to forgive? Should you forgive yourself? Pause here and honestly ask God for the grace to be Grateful and/or Forgiving.

What About Me?

Moving Pictures released the song What About Me in 1981 and it went to number 1 on the Australian charts and was the highest selling single in 1982. The song obviously struck a chord with a lot of people. I have included the lyrics on page 1. This song is a Little Person's Anthem, was it a song which resonated with you? For me the first verse was my life story. Bullied, belittled, intimidated, not getting a fair go, no real sense of self-worth, disempowered to make a go of life.

The second verse reminds me of being in the Disney shop in Paris, I waited to buy a tee shirt with a picture of the dwarf named Grumpy with the text "Just call me Grumpy". An angry Frenchman was shouting at a young shop assistant who was valiantly doing her job, but to his indignant dissatisfaction. I wished I had the words to put him in his place.

The third verse asks who is really important in the world, the high and mighty, or the little people who by their hard work support the prominent people in their ivory towers? The song calls the little people to stand up and make a difference.

The fourth verse expresses a feeling of emptiness, powerlessness to effect positive change. Wanting things to be better, but frustrated.

Which verse describes your life situation? This song is a fair commentary on the way of this world which favours the already privileged more so than the ordinary people.

Contemplating by the Pool

Ponder your response to the song and then ask what back story do you bring into the story of the cripple by the pool? Each of us will bring a different shade of meaning, a different understanding of the characters in the story and the dynamics of what is going on. Each insight is valid, each one carries meaning for each of us in our unique life story. Each of us will have our own insight to share with another.

The theologian Bruce Milne does not perceive the cripple as being a likeable person, before or after his healing. Though my perception differs from his, I accept his insight and learn from it. A key idea is that even the unlikeable and socially incompetent are loved and welcome to come for healing.

For me I am on side with the cripple, his description of the situation is not a whinge or complaint, but a straight relating of the facts. One of those facts is that those in least need of healing barge in, pushing the more needy aside so they get the benefits. Like him I was knocked down, ignored, in despair, beaten before I began life properly.

Theologian William Barclay asks did the cripple really want to be healed? A beggar could make a good living in first century Jerusalem. Some people are happy in their misery, they will grumble but not do anything positive to help themselves, or seek a way out. This is also a fair question and the cripple's answer has some vigour to it. In wanting to be put in the water, he does not want a namby-pamby being led down the steps lest he stub his toe. Rather he wants to be dumped in, he wants a bodily one-two-three-chuck into the water.

Therefore, what is it that cripples you? A physical problem/illness? Mental illness? Trauma long ago, or recently? Betrayal by a trusted person? An intractable habit? Or?

Do you really want to get better? Is there something you've been putting off? Do you need to accept a wise suggestion by someone? Do you need to swallow pride and ask for help? Do you have to forgive someone and let go of festering resentment? Or?

Who or what hinders you? An addiction? An unhelpful relationship? Letting go of the lies others made you believe about yourself? Do you need to try one more time, and another? Or?

Jesus picks you out from the crowd. Dare you trust him? What are you really trusting in? Chemicals: drugs tobacco alcohol? Accumulating the stuff and clutter and fashions of this world? Superstitious rituals and dodgy religion? Or?

Spend time praying at each step, be honest with God and he will be honest with you. Expect an answer, but it may not be what you expect. Your perceived need may differ from your most critical need. In singling out the cripple in the story, Jesus knew the man, what he really needed and his potential.

Wholly Healed to be Holy and Healed

Consider our cripple, he is healed in body, mind and soul.

In Body: he is able to immediately do the impossible, stand, walk and carry. No corrective surgery, no protracted Physiotherapy visits, or big medical bills. This is a picture of Jesus' Kingdom of God in which we are ultimately fully sound and capable to do whatever we need to do.

In Mind: he is no longer cowed and put down. He has found his voice and confidently and boldly answers the questions of the Jews about carrying his bed on the Sabbath. He doesn't yet know who his healer is, but is convinced that his healer is greater than the religious heavies, and the myth of the pool. In the Kingdom of God we look forward to growing in godly confidence and readiness to speak up gently, boldly challenging the status quo.

In Soul: Jesus finds him again in the Temple, the house of God, among the godly, no longer attached the superstition of the water in the pool, but is instead in the presence of the living God and His worshippers. Jesus challenges him to continue in a new life of holiness. In the Kingdom of God we are likewise trusted and expected to grow in the knowledge of God and His ways, to live a holier life, to have a hope beyond what we see to long for something far better and enduring.

Today you stand at a decision point in your own Choose Your Own Adventure. Where do you go from here? What new priority should you take up? What challenge should you grapple with? What must you let go of so you can live more truly? Will you put your hand in the hand of the man from Galilee and walk with him?
