
Dear Beloved,

## Genesis 24.34-38, 42-49, 58-67

- <sup>34</sup> So he said, 'I am Abraham's servant. <sup>35</sup> The Lord has blessed my master abundantly, and he has become wealthy. He has given him sheep and cattle, silver and gold, male and female servants, and camels and donkeys. <sup>36</sup> My master's wife Sarah has borne him a son in her old age, and he has given him everything he owns. <sup>37</sup> And my master made me swear an oath, and said, "You must not get a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live, <sup>38</sup> but go to my father's family and to my own clan, and get a wife for my son."
- <sup>42</sup> 'When I came to the spring today, I said, "Lord, God of my master Abraham, if you will, please grant success to the journey on which I have come. <sup>43</sup> See, I am standing beside this spring. If a young woman comes out to draw water and I say to her, 'Please let me drink a little water from your jar,' <sup>44</sup> and if she says to me, 'Drink, and I'll draw water for your camels too,' let her be the one the Lord has chosen for my master's son." <sup>45</sup> 'Before I finished praying in my heart, Rebekah came out, with her jar on her shoulder. ### Sermon

#### Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. Do you ever feel like a beast of burden, just doing each day what is obligatory, ploughing through the days and weeks, just because that is required? Life gets like that sometimes, with nothing to look forward to. The worst part of loosing Phil is all those shared moments, having a cuppa together, laughing at a joke together or admiring something beautiful together that will never happen again. The Lord has been telling me recently to 'seek joy' so I have been trying, I've been making an effort to see my friends, spend time with my family, go out to dinner with my brother and accepting invitations.

Did you know that a yoke made perfectly for an animal so that it fits and is comfortable makes the work they do quite easy. A badly fitted yoke rubs and pulls on the wrong places and makes life much harder for the animal. In Jesus' day it was common to refer to servitude or obedience as a yoke and rabbis spoke of the yoke of the Torah. Servitude or obedience to a boss who is uncaring can often be like a badly fitted yoke and certainly obeying the law or Torah was a heavy burden that chafed and vexed the ordinary people, but Jesus said, 'my yoke is easy, and my burden is light'.

The religious leaders of Jesus' time were becoming more and more opposed to him and his work. On the one hand John the Baptist had led a life of self-denial. There had been rumours against him because they found it hard to take, including that a demon might have got into him. Then Jesus came celebrating the kingdom of heaven with all and sundry, having parties which spoke of God's lavish, generous love and forgiveness so people accused him of being a rebel, a son who didn't behave, even a false prophet.

Moses had warned the people against false prophets who would lead them away from following Yahweh, and there were strict rules about how to accuse a rebel son in Deuteronomy (21: 18-21) 'This son of ours is stubborn and rebellious, he will not obey us. He is a glutton and a drunkard'. They were not just being rude, they are accusing him of being a rebellious son and maybe, is the implication, therefore also a false prophet and worthy to be stoned.

People, especially those who see their status threatened don't like a challenge, neither someone who points them to a different sort of life, and lives more conscientiously than them, or of someone who shows God's love breaking into the world in new ways.

Jesus came in meekness, announcing the peaceable kingdom of unconditional love and forgiveness and celebrating the goodness of life for all, and he was rejected as not 'spiritual' enough. The authorities suggest that Jesus is a rebellious Israelite who should be executed in order to purge evil from the midst of the covenant community. They eventually succeed but not until it was God's time.

In the verses we skipped in our gospel reading, Jesus was condemning those who have refused to believe his message. He condemned the town and villages that he knew best, where he had lived, where he had done miracle after miracle, but his message of repentance had gone unheeded. He is not pronouncing judgement but calling them once again to repentance. Their vision of the kingdom was all about revolution: love your neighbour, hate your enemy.

Jesus was offering a last chance to embrace a different kingdom vision. He's outlined it in his sermons and the teaching he was giving in towns and villages all over Galilee. He was living it out in the streets and in houses filled with laughter and friendship. He was showing how powerful it was with his healings, but they didn't want it and they were ready to use any excuse to avoid it.

**Then Jesus prays to his Father**, 'I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and learned and

revealed them to little children.' Which is a very interesting prayer because of the two ways of approaching God; The first way is to be wise. There was a wonderful tradition within Judaism of wisdom teachings. Wisdom is often personified as a woman, most particularly in Proverbs but in many places in both the Old Testament and Jewish writings. Jews believed that God gave wisdom to those who feared him and studied his word. For the average Jew, 'wisdom' was about as far out of reach as being a brain surgeon is for most people today.

Jesus said, no you don't need all that: 'You just need to be a little child' which is the second way to learn about God mentioned in this prayer. Jesus had come to know his Father while he was on earth, the way a son does; not by studying books about him but by living in his presence, listening for his voice, and learning from him, by watching and imitating. Jesus had lady wisdom, also known as the Holy Spirit, dwelling in him. The 'little people' the poor, the sinners, the tax collectors, ordinary folk discovered more of God, simply by following Jesus, than the learned specialists.



Jesus became a reflection of his Father. He had the gift and the task of drawing back the curtain and unveiling the truth about God. Jesus was, and is, the light of the world. The only way to really know God is

**through Jesus.** 'No one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.'

Because Jesus knew the Father, as his own father, he could show the little people, ordinary people, people like you and me what the father is like and draw them to him. People recognise him not by their superior spiritual status but by revelation, as a gift from God. God's 'little people' are people without religious learning or status to whom the divine revelation is given as pure grace.

'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Jesus speaks as the embodiment of divine wisdom; Jesus invitation extends to all who are burdened. Unlike the heavy and uncomfortable burden that the Pharisees sought to put upon the people Jesus offered a different 'yoke' which, because it came from his mercy and love was easy to bear.

The way to train a young animal in a yoke is to put them with an older animal who will show them how to do it. When we bear Jesus' yoke, we are yoked with him, and he shows us how to carry the load. Jesus offers 'rest' which is not mere relaxation but includes: salvation, the kingdom of God, eternal life, unconditional love, and purpose. The welcome Jesus offers, is the welcome God offers through him. This is the invitation which lets us see who the Father really is and encourages us to come into his loving, welcoming presence.

Can following Jesus really be easy? Didn't he say that people had to be prepared to leave behind family, possessions, and their very lives? Yes, he did. But the ease and the joy, the rest and refreshment which he offers all spring from his own character. His gentleness and warmth are for all who turn to him, weighed down by moral, physical, emotional, financial, or whatever burdens. Jesus makes our own yoke for each of us personally and it fits so perfectly that we are happier in that yoke than we have ever been trying to find happiness for ourselves.

Some people think that going to a party is fun but next morning not so much. Some people live for their work but don't know how to live if they get made redundant or have to retire. Some people love hobbies or travel but what do you do with your stuff and all the photos? But talking to people God brings into your life brings joy and fulfillment. Working for God makes everything you do worthwhile, and you never have to retire, he just keeps changing the job description to fit you. And many people have found the joy of creation for God's kingdom or travelling for his purposes totally fulfilling.

Like 'rest' the 'easy yoke' of Jesus is not an invitation to a life of ease but of deliverance from the artificial burdens of human religion. There is work to be done but when we are walking yoked with Jesus, we do not notice the work. He shoulders the burden, and we just walk with him.

The passage closes with that invitation from the one who is himself meek and lowly, an invitation to all who know themselves to be burdened and in need of salvation or joy, an invitation to learn and become Jesus' disciples. Those who hear the invitation will answer the call, and when they do, they will praise God, who has given them this gift of revelation and they will welcome all who come looking for that revelation.
