Hearing of this, the crowds followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴ When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them and healed those who were ill. ¹⁵ As evening approached, the disciples came to him and said, 'This is a remote place, and it's already getting late. Send the crowds away, so that they can go to the villages and buy themselves some food.' ¹⁶ Jesus replied, 'They do not need to go away. You give them something to eat.' ¹⁷ 'We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish,' they answered. ¹⁸ 'Bring them here to me,' he said. ¹⁹ And he told the people to sit down on the grass. Sermon

Apostles' Creed

In our prayer of the day today, we referred to Jesus as the one who meets 'all our needs', I wonder if that is really the way you see him? Does Jesus meet all your needs? Nowadays people sometimes refer to Maslow's hierarchy of needs, which is often depicted as ranked stages. From the bottom of the pyramid upwards the needs are physical, safety, love and belonging, esteem and self-actualization. Needs lower down in the hierarchy must be satisfied before individuals can attend to higher needs.

In our gospel passage today is a story which we know very well: Jesus feeding the five thousand. There are actually six stories of Jesus feeding crowds in our bible, each gospel has at least one and Mark and Matthew each record two events. Obviously, all the gospel writers thought it was important for their readers to know about, so we need to listen and think about this event.



What Jesus had just heard is that John the Baptist has been killed by

Herod. Jesus is in danger and also grieving so he withdraws in a boat, to a lonely place. If Herod has killed John the Baptist, there is real danger for Jesus and his disciples and Jesus knows that there is more work to be done before his time, so he meets their need for safety.

The people had needs, not just physical needs but the need to understand their lives and know what God was doing and they realised that Jesus spoke words of life, so they followed the boat by running around the shore until they found where Jesus had landed. Jesus recognised their needs and healed those who were ill and taught them. At first glance Jesus is obviously meeting the needs of the crowd for food, the most basic of all human needs but there are other things happening in this story as well.



As the day was coming to an end the disciples were worried about the basic needs of all these people, they would need to eat so they made their recommendation to Jesus that he should sent them away so that

they could find food. This was thoughtful of the disciples, but Jesus had an even better plan. Jesus took what the disciples had and multiplied it to provide that basic need for all the people.

In our lives we very rarely even think of our need for basic things like food, water, and shelter because we live in a country where for most people those things are just a given. For someone who is very poor it might be an issue, not like in third world countries but real enough. There was a time when I was trying to feed myself and my young children on a small income and every time, I went to the supermarket what I needed was on special and I knew that God was meeting my needs. He also provided for me and my kids in so many other creative ways.



The great messianic banquet that is to take place at the end of the

age is a recurring theme in the teaching of Jesus. Clearly in this feeding of the multitude Jesus acts out that anticipated feast. The early church associated this gathering with the feast that was to come at the end time, and even more importantly saw an early echo of the last supper. Did you notice as we read the gospel that Jesus took the food 'and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to the disciples.'

And 'the disciples gave them to the people'. What a picture for us to follow, Jesus provides in abundance, and then we give that provision to the people. The twelve baskets full (one for each disciple) are a promise that Jesus always give more than enough, he gives abundantly. Many years after I was so poor, I was delighted to be able to run a Food Pantry to help people in a similar situation. I knew what it was like, so I was able to identify with them and pass on Jesus' blessing to them.



On that day Jesus met the needs of the people, in food, healing and purpose and we can receive those same blessings but sometimes our needs are different, does he meet those needs too? The Psalmist

certainly thought so: ⁷ Show me the wonders of your steadfast love, O saviour of those who come to you for refuge: who by your right hand deliver them from those that rise up against them. There are so many passages in the bible where people through the ages can attest that God has saved them in dire circumstances, from their enemies, from circumstances beyond their control and physical, mental and emotional dangers of every kind.

We are rarely in danger physically, in fact Maslow's hierarchy specifies 'job security' as an example of the need for safety but we know that God can be trusted in all circumstances of life: if we are in a car accident, if we loose our job, or our life seems to be falling apart in any way, we know that God is still in control and as we read in Romans last week God brings all things for good for those who love him and walk according to his purposes. As Christians we have the ultimate security.



Jews always knew that they belonged to God because they were part of Israel, God's chosen race. Jews retold the story of Israel beginning

with Abraham, showing the whole sequence of God's actions in their history. This is what Paul was doing in our reading from Roman's today, he is explaining what God had in mind all along. From the very beginning God seems to have decided to work his purposes not only by choosing on family from the beginning but by continuing to choose from within that family. It was never enough just to be descended from the patriarchs you also had to live like the patriarchs trusting God. Jacob was in that line of patriarchs, chosen by God from birth to live according to his will, while his twin brother Esau was not chosen and as we read today wrestled with God but came out obedient and dedicated with a new name that became the name of his descendants. Israel.



We are chosen, the children of the promise, not because we come from a wonderful line of faithful Anglicans but because God chose us, each one to live a life according to his plan. We belong and can never

be kicked out. In the world you can belong in a group of friends, in a club and your family but it is possible that someone will take offence at you and kick you out and then you no longer belong. But in the body of Christ even if you make a mistake, even if someone doesn't like you, God never lets you go you always belong.

However, be very wary, the thrust is not, you are special so you can sit back and take it easy. It is always you are special, so why are you taking God for granted, failing to honour him, and ignoring your call to carry forward his purposes? God's choice never results in easy arrogant, automatic superiority. Much is expected of those to whom much is given. Paul was grieved because the people of whom he had been a part his whole life were rejecting God's chosen messiah and were not part of the new Israel.

In the same way, when we walk with God, we don't need to receive respect and recognition from other people because our worth is totally

tied up in what God sees in us. We are created by God, loved by God, chosen by God, filled with God's love and joy, able to do all things through him who strengths us. He calls us his friends and there is no greater honour.

You never need to compare yourself with others, saying they're better than me, because you are exactly the person God created you to be and that is what matters.

The highest need in life is to be the best person that you can be, and who better than the one who created you is going to know how to achieve that? When we follow Jesus, he leads us in the best paths for us, he walks with us through all the valleys and brings us to the mountain top again.

Sometimes it is hard work following Jesus, but he knows us so well and he meets all our needs. Not just physical but emotional, and spiritual as well.

The lord of the Universe created you and knows exactly what you need, trust him with all your needs and he will bless you abundantly.

And they all ate and were satisfied. Amen
