Exodus 12.1–14

¹ The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in Egypt, ² 'This month is to be for you the first month, the first month of your year. ³ Tell the whole community of Israel that on the tenth day of this month each man is to take a lamb for his family, one for each household. ⁴ If any household is too small for a whole lamb, they must share one with their nearest neighbour, having taken into account the number of people there are. You are to determine the amount of lamb needed in accordance with what each person will eat. ⁵ The animals you choose must be year-old males without defect, and you may take them from the sheep or the goats. ⁶ Take care of them until the fourteenth day of the month, when all the members of the community of Israel must slaughter them at twilight. ⁷ Then they are to take some of the blood and put it on the sides and tops of the doorframes of the houses where they eat the lambs.

⁸ That same night they are to eat the meat roasted over the fire, along with bitter herbs, and bread made without yeast. ⁹ Do not eat the meat raw or boiled in water, but roast it over a fire – with the head, legs and internal organs. ¹⁰ Do not leave any of it till morning; if some is left till morning, you must burn it. ¹¹ This is how you are to eat it: with your cloak tucked into your belt, your sandals on your feet and your staff in your hand. Eat it in haste; it is the Lord 's Passover. ¹² 'On that same night I will pass through Egypt and strike down every firstborn of both people and animals, and I will bring judgment on all the gods of Egypt. I am the Lord. ¹³ The blood will be a sign for you on the houses where you are, and when I see the blood, I will pass over you. No destructive plague will touch you when I strike Egypt. ¹⁴ 'This is a day you are to commemorate; for the generations to come you shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord – a lasting ordinance.

Psalm 149

¹ O praise the Lord, and sing to the Lord a new song: O praise him in the assembly of the faithful.

² Let Israel rejoice in him that made him: let the children of Zion be joyful in their king.

³ Let them praise him in the dance: let them sing his praise with timbrel and with harp.

Romans 13.1-10

¹ Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God. ² Consequently, whoever rebels against the authority is rebelling against what God has instituted, and those who do so will bring judgment on themselves. ³ For rulers hold no terror for those who do right, but for those who do wrong. Do you want to be free from fear of the one in authority? Then do what is right and you will be commended. ⁴ For the one in authority is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for rulers do not bear the sword for no reason. They are God's servants, agents of wrath to bring punishment on the wrongdoer. ⁵ Therefore, it is necessary to submit to the authorities, not only because of possible punishment but also as a matter of conscience. ⁶ This is also why you pay taxes, for the authorities are God's servants, who give their full time to governing. ⁷ Give to everyone what you owe them: if you owe taxes, pay taxes; if revenue, then revenue; if respect, then respect; if honour, then honour. ⁸ Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another, for whoever loves others has fulfilled the law. ⁹ The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery,' 'You shall not murder,' 'You shall not steal,' 'You shall not covet,' and whatever other command there may be, are summed up in this one command: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' ¹⁰ Love does no harm to a neighbour. Therefore love is the fulfilment of the law.

Matthew 18.10-20

¹⁰ 'See that you do not despise one of these little ones. For I tell you that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father in heaven. ¹² 'What do you think? If a man owns a hundred sheep, and one of them wanders away, will he not leave the ninety-nine on the hills and go to look for the one that wandered off? ¹³ And if he finds it, truly I tell you, he is happier about that one sheep than about the ninety-nine that did not wander off. ¹⁴ In the same way your Father in heaven is not willing that any of these little ones should perish. ¹⁵ 'If your brother or sister sins, go and point out their fault, just between the two of you. If they listen to you, you have won them over. ¹⁶ But if they will not listen, take one or two others along, so that "every matter may be established by the testimony of two or three witnesses." ¹⁷ If they still refuse to listen, tell it to the church; and if they refuse to listen even to the church, treat them as you would a pagan or a tax collector. ¹⁸ 'Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. ¹⁹ 'Again, truly I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about anything they ask for, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. ²⁰ For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them.'

Sermon

The Nicene Creed

Blessing

God is a God of relationships. Jesus came to earth and died so that

we can be in relationship with God and everything he does is because of that relationship. He loves us with amazing, unconditional love. Nothing in our lives is more important than that relationship. Because of that relationship God wants us to have loving, fulfilling relationships with each other.

Our Old Testament Reading is the instructions for the first Passover and in the midst of all those careful instructions about the lamb and the blood on the doorpost is the instruction that if a household is too small, they are to be included in their neighbours household. No widow, orphan, childless couple, or lonely person of any description was to be left out at the original passover or any time in the future. As the Psalmist said: For the Lord takes delight in his people: he adorns the meek with his salvation.



The reading from Romans is all about our relationships: our relationship to those in authority is to acknowledge their God given authority and be subject to them. We might or not admire our

politicians national, state, and local but we obey the laws and pay our taxes. We do what is right and then we don't need to be afraid of them or the police.

Paul reminds us that those in authority are God's servants just as we are and whether or not they acknowledge his authority, we acknowledge it and obey the authorities just as if we are obeying God. Notice that Paul says: 'For the one in authority is God's servant for your good.' If there were no authorities governing our land and all the nations of the world, everything would be chaos, we would spend all our time protecting ourselves and our loved ones and all the modern advantages we enjoy would not have been possible.



Paul then goes on to talk about our relationship to those around us. Those in the wider community; 'give to everyone what you owe them': yes, taxes but also revenue, respect, and honour! We fairly naturally

think of the need to pay debts and pay what is necessary for whatever we buy, or to pay people who work for us, but have you ever thought of the need to pay respect and honour? That is relationship.

Everyone you meet is made in the image of God and therefore deserves respect and honour. Jesus did not have white skin, he trained as a carpenter and as an adult he was homeless, some of his closest friends were prostitutes, simple fishermen and tax collectors. There is no one that we can ever justify looking down on, failing to give respect and honour if we are really following Jesus. This includes loving, respecting and humouring our first nation brethren and giving them a voice. Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another.



For whoever loves others has fulfilled the law. Every Sunday we read the two great commandments, Love God and love your neighbour. And here Paul reiterates what Jesus said: 'whatever other command there may

be, are summed up in this one command: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' That is the ultimate command about relationships, In every instance if you have a choice to make in a situation about whether to love someone or do what the law or tradition dictates, the right answer is always to be loving. 'Love is the fulfilment of the law'.

This is exactly the same as what Jesus is talking about in our gospel passage. Which is the continuation of a much longer passage of Jesus teaching about consideration for the 'little people'. There he starts talking about children but very soon widens the term to anyone who is humble, without pretensions: people without status.



Just as a shepherd would leave the ninety-nine sheep to go in search of a lost one so God himself will search for a lost disciple to bring him back to the fold. And just so, Jesus wants us to go to anyone we see

slipping away and talk to them. There is no suggestion here that we should be 'holier than thou' and telling others whenever they slip up. We need to read this in the context of the shepherd lovingly retrieving the lost sheep.

This is a blueprint for us on how to win that lamb back into the fellowship, and how to resolve any conflicts or disagreements among us. Sometimes we just pretend that there isn't a problem, we swallow our anger ands resentment, paper over the cracks and carry on as though everything is normal. We might avoid or ignore the other person or speak very carefully when we see them being careful to be 'nice'.



(Histing We have this concept that Christians are always 'nice' but there are no instructions anywhere in the bible to be nice. We are called to be

loving, yes, but also honest and sincere and sometimes 'nice' is a very long way from loving, honest, or sincere. That is why Jesus instructs us, when we see our brother or sister sinning, whether it is against us or something else, to go to that person privately and have a quiet loving word. None of us are perfect but we are all here to help each other.

The idea is that if you can have this guiet word and they can see the problem it is resolved and no one else needs to know, you have helped them without embarrassing them. It is when they cannot see the problem that you ask some spiritually mature brethren to join you. Not people who agree with you but someone that your friend will respect and listen to. If it's really serious and they refuse to mend their ways, then it can be escalated further.



This was Jesus' word to the church, and the church did not exist

yet, but Jesus probably envisaged little groups of his followers meeting together, praying the special prayer he gave them, reminding one another of his teachings and trying to live it out and acting as localised assemblies of God's renewed people. The word translated here as church is actually 'assembly'.

If someone refused to mend their ways after this group had warned them, they were to be treated as a pagan or a tax collector. In other places Jesus gave instructions about how to treat outsiders: 'Love your neighbour'. So that person might no longer be part of the fellowship but if at any stage they came back to the Lord, changed their ways, and wanted to follow Him again they would be welcomed back, and in the meantime, the fellowship would continue to love and pray for them.



We aren't left on our own as we struggle to become the sort of communities, and families that Jesus is describing. God's presence is with us. And as we pray together in Christian Fellowship, we are assured of being heard and answered. God does not want us to superficial relationships with each other, he is calling us to be family, to share the real essence of our lives, our struggles as well as our joys.

In a promise that remains central to everything that Christians do together 'where two or three (or twenty or thirty or two hundred or three hundred) gather in Jesus's name, he is there in the midst of them'. That's not just a promise that we will sense his presence. It's a promise and a warning that he will see and know the innermost truth of everybody's heart. Therefore, we can meet each other in real hope, with joy and love.



Meeting together in church and afterwards when we have morning tea is great but the call on our lives is to meet together in smaller groups, in bible studies, but also to meet together maybe just in twos and

threes, meeting for a coffee, meeting for a chat, meeting for a walk, meeting to truly share what God is doing in our lives and our struggles: enriching each other's lives with love, accountability and encouragement.

When we live our lives following Jesus, we live in relationships, relationship with God, and relationship with our families, our friends and all the people we meet, and with God we live all those relationships in unconditional love bringing God's love and blessing to this community.
