1 Thessalonians 1:1-10

1 Paul, Silas and Timothy, To the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace and peace to you.

2 We always thank God for all of you and continually mention you in our prayers. 3 We remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. 4 For we know, brothers and sisters loved by God, that he has chosen you, 5 because our gospel came to you not simply with words but also with power, with the Holy Spirit and deep conviction. You know how we lived among you for your sake. 6 You became imitators of us and of the Lord, for you welcomed the message in the midst of severe suffering with the joy given by the Holy Spirit. 7 And so you became a model to all the believers in Macedonia and Achaia. 8 The Lord's message rang out from you not only in Macedonia and Achaia—your faith in God has become known everywhere. Therefore, we do not need to say anything about it, 9 for they themselves report what kind of reception you gave us. They tell how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God, 10 and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead —Jesus, who rescues us from the coming wrath.

Matthew 22:15-33

15 Then the Pharisees went out and laid plans to trap him in his words. 16 They sent their disciples to him along with the Herodians. "Teacher," they said, "we know that you are a man of integrity and that you teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. You aren't swayed by others, because you pay no attention to who they are. 17 Tell us then, what is your opinion? Is it right to pay the imperial tax to Caesar or not?" 18 But Jesus, knowing their evil intent, said, "You hypocrites, why are you trying to trap me? 19 Show me the coin used for paying the tax." They brought him a denarius, 20 and he asked them, "Whose image is this? And whose inscription?" 21 "Caesar's," they replied. Then he said to them, "So give back to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's." 22 When they heard this, they were amazed. So they left him and went away.

23 That same day the Sadducees, who say there is no resurrection, came to him with a question. 24 "Teacher," they said, "Moses told us that if a man dies without having children, his brother must marry the widow and raise up offspring for him. 25 Now there were seven brothers among us. The first one married and died, and since he had no children, he left his wife to his brother. 26 The same thing happened to the second and third brother, right on down to the seventh. 27 Finally, the woman died. 28 Now then, at the resurrection, whose wife will she be of the seven, since all of them were married to her?" 29 Jesus replied, "You are in error because you do not know the Scriptures or the power of God. 30 At the resurrection people will neither marry nor be given in marriage; they will be like the angels in heaven. 31 But about the resurrection of the dead—have you not read what God said to you, 32 'I am the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob'? Sermon 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10

As you know, we usually have four readings every Sunday, one from the Old Testament, one from the Psalms, one from the New Testament, and one from the gospels. Often the sermon is based on the gospel reading, but it doesn't have to be, and today I thought I'd start a series of sermons based on the apostle Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians. The set New Testament readings for the next five weeks are from 1 Thessalonians, so this works well. There will be 5 sermons in total, and I will put copies of them on our website in case you want to catch up on one you miss, and the congregations that don't meet every Sunday.

Before I start looking at the passage, it is helpful to put this letter in its context. The apostle Paul wrote 1 Thessalonians to the church that God established in Thessalonica through Paul in Acts 17. Acts 17 says that when Paul and his companions came to Thessalonica, Paul went into the synagogue, and on three Sabbath days he reasoned with them from the Scriptures, 3 explaining and proving that the Messiah had to suffer and rise from the dead. "This Jesus I am proclaiming to you is the Messiah," he said. 4 Some of the Jews were persuaded and joined Paul and Silas, as did a large number of God-fearing Greeks and quite a few prominent women.

But it wasn't all smooth sailing. Some Jews were jealous, rounded up some bad characters, formed a mob and started a riot and Paul had to flee to Berea, but the Thessalonians chased him there. Sometime later, Paul wrote the letter to them to encourage the new believers in the faith, and to encourage us, some 1950 or so years later.

Today's reading from 1 Thes 1 gives us a bit of a life cycle of one of the early generations of Christians, the first Christians at the first century Greek village of Thessalonica, which is now modern day Thessaloniki.

In our passage, Paul talks about 5 different stages in the life cycle of this first generation of Thessalonian Christians.

Your Christian story will be slightly different, but I believe 1 Thessalonians 1 gives us a model for every Christian generation, so let's look at the stages as Paul says happened to the Thessalonians

The first stage, Paul says in verse 4, is that **God chose them**. This is the first stage and we know it didn't just happen when Paul visited Thessalonika. In Ephesians 1:4 Paul says ⁴ For he chose us in him <u>before the creation of the world</u> to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love ⁵ he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will.

This is of course the first step for every Christian, as it was for the Thessalonians, as it was for us. God chose every Christian long before they were born. This shows that our salvation is entirely reliant on God's grace, and nothing that we do for ourselves. It is a great privilege and blessing to be chosen by God, as we totally deserve his rejection, and so we should respond the way the Thessalonians did, welcoming the message and seeking to imitate our Lord Jesus Christ, and Paul, our model of Christian living, as we will come to in a moment.

For **the next stage**, we skip the next few years from when God chooses them to when **the Gospel comes to the soon-to-be-Christian**. Paul says it came, not simply with words but also with power, with the Holy Spirit and deep conviction. For the Thessalonians, it happened in the brief period when Paul lived among them, and later when Timothy ministered to them. Acts 17 talks about this stage, and I encourage you to read Acts 17 during the week to get a better background to this letter. Nowadays evangelists do not usually move into a soon-to-be Christian's home like Paul did, but there is usually a period where the new Christian sees how other Christians, or particularly whoever shared the gospel with them, lives. It is really helpful for a new Christian to get to experience something of the Christian life, and particularly to have it modelled for them as Paul and Timothy did for the fledgling church in Thessalonica. In many cases, the power of the Holy Spirit really works in the heart and mind of new Christian, or even the-soon-to-be believer primarily through that other Christians modelling their lives. The next step represents a huge step in the life of a new Christian. In verse 6 it says the Thessalonians welcomed the message with joy given by the Holy Spirit. Nowadays, we would probably call this the point of conversion, where they accept the gospel of Jesus in their hearts and turn to Christ, or as we would say, they become Christians. If you like, welcoming the gospel was a status change in their lives, when they changed their citizenship from this earth to that of heaven, when they turned from being God's enemies, from rejecting him to become Christians. This should make us think back to when we became Christians, when we accepted the message of the gospel. While there are certain common elements always present when anyone becomes a Christian: hearing the gospel, being convicted of sin, repenting and accepting Jesus as Lord of your life, there may be other elements that are different in each situation. Many Christians, like me, were taught the gospel as children in Christian families, and don't remember a specific conversion experience. Others were probably more like the Thessalonians who heard the gospel and became Christians in the short time that Paul was with them.

Another difference between my experience and that of the Thessalonians' was that theirs, or at least some of theirs, came in the midst of severe suffering. Thankfully for us in 21st century Cooma this is more the exception than the rule. However, even today, in many countries, suffering and persecution is common for Christians, whether early in their Christian lives, or later as they mature in the faith. Even in the West, it seems that the Devil pays particular attention to new Christians. He often uses suffering and persecution, or perhaps simple inconvenience and social awkwardness to discourage people from turning to Christ, or drag them away once they have received the message. Despite this, Paul says that although the Thessalonians accepted the message during great affliction, they accepted it with the joy given by the Holy Spirit.

After welcoming the message, and the change in citizenship before God that that brought, Paul says **the fourth stage** came when **the Thessalonians turned from idols to serve true and living God, and to wait for Jesus return**. In effect, the change of citizenship and status now brought about a change in behaviour. Paul refers to this as serving the true and living God, and in effect what has happened is that the Thessalonians were now living for God, not themselves or their own base passions.

This is really the true value of the experience the Thessalonians had of Paul's life, that they were able to learn from him and directly experience how Christians live, their values, their priorities and their lifestyle. This change in behaviour obviously had to reflect their change in citizenship and status, and so for the Thessalonians this meant turning away from the idols that had held their allegiances in the past. As the Thessalonians no longer lived for idols but turned to serve the true and living God, so every Christian must turn from their idols to God. For the Thessalonians, these idols would have been religious statues that they physically worshipped and made offerings to, but for us, our idols are probably different, but they still claiming our allegiance and our time and effort. Our idols might be money, our jobs, our status, or even political or social influence or power. Christians put all these aside for the one status that counts, that of being saved by the precious blood of Jesus.

This brings the Thessalonians, and us, to t**he last stage.** It is surprisingly similar to Stage 2, but the tables are turned. You will remember that in stage 2, the Thessalonians imitated Jesus and Paul, but now they are the model, and now Macedonians, Archaians, and, according to Paul, people from everywhere are imitating them. In verse 7 it says they became a model to all believers in Macedonia and Achaia, and their faith is known everywhere. Even more so, he says their faith has reported back to him, the reception they gave Paul and, as I've mentioned earlier, how they turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God, ¹⁰ and to wait for his Son from heaven.

This is the truly amazing bit, and the way the Christians generations develop. The chances are that someone in a church, perhaps Thessalonica, or perhaps another of the churches that Paul started, heard and accepted the gospel from Paul, and imitated the model of Christian living that he demonstrated, which was in turn heard, and accepted, modeled and imitated down the track by someone who heard, accepted, modelled and imitated, and so on through

the generations, until someone shared the gospel with you and you accepted it, and you imitated the life they modelled, and consequently you now are rescued from the coming wrath.

The challenge therefore is whether you will break the chain of which you are ultimately a link. Self-evidently, the chain has not been broken prior to you. Do you share that gospel as you have heard the gospel? Do you demonstrate Christian living to others so they can imitate you, and turn to God from idols to serve the living and true God and as you imitate the Christian life that demonstrated to you? ¹⁰ Do you wait for Jesus, God's son from heaven, who rescues us from the coming wrath, as the Thessalonians did some 2000 years ago, and every generation since, and consequently every subsequent Christian generation until Jesus does return and calls us home?

Will you maintain this chain?
