The Ministry of the Word

Joshua 24:1-3a, 14-25

¹ Then Joshua assembled all the tribes of Israel at Shechem. He summoned the elders, leaders, judges and officials of Israel, and they presented themselves before God.

² Joshua said to all the people, "This is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: 'Long ago your ancestors, including Terah the father of Abraham and Nahor, lived beyond the Euphrates River and worshiped other gods. ³ But I took your father Abraham from the land beyond the Euphrates and led him throughout Canaan and gave him many descendants.¹⁴ "Now fear the Lord and serve him with all faithfulness. Sermon 1 Thessalonians 4

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

1 Thessalonians 4 Sermon

When I was 18 I moved away from my parents in Canberra to study at university in Sydney. I lived in various flats, but my parents would come and visit every now and then. I remember that whenever Mum would come to visit there would be nearly a week of frenetic activity to get ready. I needed to do all the washing that inevitably had been piling up, disposing the empty cans, pizza boxes, and unidentifiable mouldy detritus that were leftovers in the fridge. I'm sure my Mum wouldn't really have minded if my flat wasn't completely tidy (and it never was), but let's face it, when your mum is coming, you have to at least make an effort.

1 thes talks about 4 visits, although not by anyone's mum. It talks about Paul's original visit (which we can read about in Acts 17) when the church in Thessalonica was established, the recent visit from Timothy, Paul's planned visit, and Jesus' return. Obviously at the time of writing, two of these visits were in the past, and two were in the future (and of course, we are still waiting Jesus' return).

Last week Paul prayed: 11 Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus clear the way for us to come to you. 12 May the Lord make your love increase and overflow for each other and for everyone else, just as ours does for you. 13 May he strengthen your hearts so that you will be blameless and holy in the presence of our God and Father when our Lord Jesus comes with all his holy ones.

Just like I tried to be ready when my Mum visited, so does Paul want the Thessalonians to be ready, both for Paul's visit, but more importantly for Jesus' return. It might surprise you that Paul isn't talking about washing or pushing out the rubbish. Nevertheless, the principal is the same, I wanted my flat to be tidy because I wanted my Mum to be pleased. I know my Mum loves me, and the way I kept my flat won't make a jot of difference to that, but I nevertheless wanted her to be pleased.

In the same way, Paul wanted the Thessalonians, and us to be ready for Jesus' return, not because we want God to love us, but because he does love us, and we want to please him. We don't try to please God in order for for him to love you, but because he does love you, you already have a relationship with him. It is pretty obvious - if you didn't have a relationship with God you wouldn't worry about pleasing him.

So, assuming that I am talking to at least some people who want to live lives pleasing to God, how do we do that? I very much doubt whether God particularly cares about the details of your personal hygiene, how much your washing is piling up, or the mouldering or otherwise contents of your fridge. But what is God concerned about? If you heard my sermon a few weeks ago on the Trinity, you would have heard me saying how God - God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, has always, eternally existed as Trinity. I explained that God is love, because God has always loved within the relationship of the Trinity, even from before he created the entire universe. As I understand it, God is always concerned about relationships, his relationship with people, and people's relationship with each other.

Since this is so, it is not surprising that the way we please God is through our relationships. Paul gives us some guidance about what our relationships should like in the light of Jesus's return. Looking at verses 3 Paul's first direction is that it is God's will that you should be **sanctified**. Being sanctified is probably not a word we use very often, particularly about ourselves. I know it kind of sounds like being saintly, or sanctimonious, but it is really a relationship word. It really means being set apart for. I wasn't really a table cloth kind of guy, but the 1970s Laminex dining table in my flat was kind of manky, so I had this tablecloth that only got used when my mum visited. You could say the tablecloth was set apart, or sanctified to my mum, so even if one of my friends wanted to borrow my table cloth (perhaps because their mum was coming around or they were trying to impress a girlfriend), my first thought was whether my mum was planning to visit, because she had priority over my tablecloth, it was set apart or sanctified to her. Paul says we should be set apart for God, that he should take our highest priority. Our first question should always be "what would Jesus want me to be doing if he returned right at this moment?" rather than just doing what I want, because our goal is to please him. This sanctification applies to every aspect of our lives, but Paul applies it particularly to our relationships. I suspect the matter of sexual purity was a big issue for the Thessalonians, because Paul specifically raises it. We know there were several cults in the first century that involved a form of ritual prostitution and other forms of sexual immorality. So in verse 3 Paul tells the Thessalonians they should **avoid sexual immorality**; 4 that each of you should learn to **control your own body** in a way that is holy and honorable, 5 not in passionate lust like the pagans, who do not know God.

The idea here is about acting honourably, as if Jesus could return at any time. Sexual immorality brings no honour to God, and certainly brings no honour <u>to</u> anyone involved, or certainly no honour <u>from</u> your current or future wife or husband. Sexual immorality has no place in the life of a Christian.

Paul also encourages Christians to keep control of their bodies. In this passage he discourages inappropriate passionate lust, but elsewhere he warns against losing control by getting drunk with wine with the same principle. God gives us the ability, and responsibility, to remain in control of our bodies, and deliberately losing that control is never honouring to God, our ourselves. I've certainly never seen a fall-down drunk who didn't make me cringe, who wasn't completely dishonorable.

Paul says that neither should a Christian **wrong or take advantage of a brother or sister**. This is another way of saying that we should never abuse the relationships that God gives us. In the same way that relationship is central to God in Trinity, so relationship is central to the life of every Christian, and so it is critical we avoid doing anything that harms, or abuses our relationships,

These things are so serious that Paul says that the Lord will punish all those who commit such sins.

Now, We don't like to think about God judging, and even less that God judges specific sins. But the sad reality of scripture is that specific sins are specifically judged. The sinner who dies without repenting suffers eternal judgment, and even the sins of Christians are judged, although Jesus has taken that punishment for us in his death on the cross. Sometimes as well, judgment follows as a direct consequence from the sin, for example sexual immorality may lead to another relationship breaking down. So please be in no doubt that individual sins are judged.

Finally, after Paul has told us what not to do in waiting for Jesus return, Paul returns to some 'do-s' of relationships. He says we are to have **love for one another**, the love that we have been taught by God.

This reminds of Jesus's new commandment in John chapter 13, to love one another. He his disciples tells this commandment just after he had shown his model of love to his disciples by washing their feet. When Paul says we are to have the love that has been taught by God, this is what he means, the self giving, sacrificial love that Jesus showed his disciples.

It's also not surprising that Paul encouraged the Thessalonians to live a quiet life as he had experienced precisely the opposite from other Thessalonians. Remember back when Paul first visited Thessalonica, not only were some Jews jealous and rounded up some bad characters from the marketplace, they formed a mob and started a riot in the city. They rushed to Jason's house in search of Paul and Silas in order to bring them out to the crowd. They followed him all the way to Berea, agitating the crowds and stirring them up. Instead, as we wait for Jesus's return, Christians are **to lead a quiet life**, minding our own business and working with our hands to gain the respect of outsiders.

This is always important, but perhaps even more critical now in this time of COVID-19, when we are careful about socially distancing from friends, family or colleagues, or sometimes confined to closer proximity than we are used to if we work from home or can't get out and around our like we used to. In either case it is much easier to inadvertently stir up strong feelings, and we need to be extra careful about what we do and say, to lead the quiet life.

In summary, as we await Jesus's certain return, we are to look to our relationships, avoiding everything, like sexual immorality or stirring up dissent that damages relationships, and working positively to love one another, as Jesus has taught us.

This is what Paul prayed for the Thessalonians in chapter 3 as they awaited his return, and let me pray for us in a slightly paraphrased version now as we await Jesus's return: Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus prepare us as we await Jesus's return when Jesus will come to us 12 May the Lord make your love increase and overflow for each other and for everyone else, just as ours does for you. 13 May he strengthen your hearts so that you will be blameless and holy in the presence of our God and Father when our Lord Jesus comes with all his holy ones. Amen.
