Mark 1:1-20

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ

1 The beginning of the good news about Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God, 2 as it is written in Isaiah the prophet: "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way" — 3 "a voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.' Sermon Mark 1:1-20 -The start of Jesus's ministry

Sermon

Introduction

I've had a few jobs in my time. I think my first real job was as a public servant engineer with the navy which I had for about 30 years. They started by paying me to study full time at uni, and after about 3 years of that, I really started working in the office in Canberra, and various navy bases around Australia.

Like most jobs, there were various things that normally happen when you start your new job, that kind of happened with greater or lesser degrees of success, when I started my job.

I mention this, because the stay of my job sort of parallels the stay of Jesus's ministry career that we read about in mark 1, our gospel reading this morning. Note that I'm not saying that Jesus's ministry is anything at all like navy engineering. If anything, they are quite the opposite in that if the naval engineer does their job properly then people, or at least ships crew won't need saving, yet Jesus's ministry was to save people. Also Jesus could walk on water, even seriously lumpy water, and therefore did not have a lot of need for naval engineers.

Nevertheless, my starting a job and Jesus starting his ministry does have their parallels, and our common experience of starting jobs helps us to understand the different aspects of the stay of Jesus's ministry in Mark 1. So let's take a look at mark 1, and see what we can learn from it.

Firstly, Mark tells us that Jesus's ministry job was announced just before he started by John the baptist. Not only that, but the fact that John would announce Jesus's ministry was itself announced well in advance by Isaiah the Old Testament prophet.

When I started working, you normally got formally told that you have a job before you started. Usually, it was with a letter and notification in the public servant gazette. This was supposed to happen some time before I started, but in my case, I was well into second year and I hadn't been told I was successful in my application. I just happened to know a couple of the other cadets, and wandered along to a meeting they had with their supervisor. The supervisor looked at his list, and promptly advised me that I was a cadet, and they eventually got around to starting to pay me. Since they were so late, I got quite a nice back payment to start.

When John the baptist announced Jesus ministry, he nor only told people that it was happening, he also prepared the way. As I mentioned, Jesus' job was to save people, and in announcing Jesus, John also warned people to be prepared for that salvation by turning from their sins and repenting. This is a bit like my new supervisor having tasks with all the required data and background information ready so I could immediately start on the required calculations, precisely the way they didn't in my case.

The next step in Jesus's ministry was a kind of induction ceremony. In Jesus's case John baptised him in the river Jordan, and there was kind of a welcome speech by God the Father who said from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

I don't recall any formal welcome when I started navy engineering, although I have had a few welcomes into jobs I have had since. When I became a chaplain in the navy reserves I had quite a formal commissioning ceremony with a nice morning tea, and I have also tried to organise similar welcomes when new starters start in the various workplaces where I have had leadership roles.

These welcomes are of course not as special as the one Jesus had. The best that I could organise was local management to speak, Jesus had the God of the entire universe at his, and he was very vocal about how pleased he was with Jesus, even though he had only just started his ministry.

Then, I guess like many jobs, Jesus had a bit of a trial to start his. No sooner had the welcome speech finished than the trials started. At once the Spirit sent him out into the wilderness, 13 and he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him.

I know a lot of jobs have a particular period of testing early on to ensure the new employee is able to do their job properly. Sometimes, as it was when I started naval engineering, it was simply a period where all my work was carefully checked by a more senior engineer to pick up any mistakes I made. In other jobs, like my navy officer training, it was more formal, and part of my initial training was that I was put in stressful situations to ensure I still performed the way I should. This is kind of like what happened to Jesus, the Spirit led him into the wilderness, a stressful environment where Satan tested him to see if he would respond the way he should, which of course he did.

Sometimes in our ministry we also find ourselves tested, as our 1 Peter reading tells us: for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. 7 These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire — may result in praise, glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed.

In Jesus's case there was of course no doubt that he would withstand the trials he would be subjected to, so the trials were not for his benefit, but for us, that we might see that Jesus was stronger than any trial sent his way, and demonstrate the praise, honour and glory due to him.

Jesus then got into his job properly, going into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. 15 "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!" Jesus's ministry had started, and he was getting on with the job, just as I did when I started.

As I worked through my career, it became more and more obvious to me that I needed a team around me to work efficiently, just as Moses needed a team around him in our Old Testament reading. Initially, when I was extremely junior it was mainly people who were checking my work, and I just thought they were just annoying and slowing me down. I quickly learnt that we were all part of a team and we all worked so much better when we worked together. We all had our roles: investigating, calculating, checking, planning, managing projects and so on. When I started, I didn't get to select my team members, but as I went along I gradually had a greater role in selecting the people I worked with, both informally as small teams were drawn from the wide workforce to do specific

tasks and projects, but later also in recruiting new staff once I got to management level. The teams were critical to getting the job done, and it was important that everyone's skills and approaches complemented other members of the teams. It was important that we had team members with good engineering skills, but also with planning, management and communication skills, as we could never find these all in the one person.

Jesus also started his ministry by selecting the team of people he would work with. As Mark tells us, He saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the lake, for they were fishermen. 17 "Come, follow me," Jesus said, "and I will send you out to fish for people." 18 At once they left their nets and followed him. 19 When he had gone a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John in a boat, preparing their nets. 20 Without delay he called them, and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men and followed him.

We don't know a lot about why Jesus chose these team members, or what he knew of their specific skills and personalities, but as we read through the gospels we particularly learn of how they grew in knowledge, skills and understanding as they worked with Jesus, both as he discipled (or mentored) them, and as he sent them out, empowered and helped by the holy spirit.

Now, you may have noticed that I haven't really spoken about what Jesus' job was. It was obviously quite a bit different from my engineering job, even though Jesus apparently came from a trade, a carpentry background.

Verses 14 and 15 describe Jesus's job when it says Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. 15 "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!" In modern terms, he was in a communications or advertising role, informing the public that God's kingdom was near, and what everyone should do to be ready for it. Since it was a team ministry, this is also the job that he called his apostles, his team to do, except for them he described it as fishing for people. He, and the apostles were casting out the message of the coming of God's kingdom, and drawing people into that kingdom.

At this point you might be asking what this means for us today. You may be saying it is great to compare the start of Jesus's ministry with the start of our careers, but what does this really teach us?

The reality is that every Christian is called into that same communications or advertising role that Jesus was in and that the apostles were called to: informing the public that God's kingdom was near, and what everyone should do to be ready for it; or as it was described to the apostles, to be fishers for people. This of course is what every Christian is called to do today, to proclaim God's kingdom and to help people into that kingdom.

Not only are we called into that same job, but we should expect that for us it should be like it was for Jesus and the apostles. Like Jesus and the apostles, we need to be qualified for it. We may not physically hear God's voice proclaiming that we are qualified like Jesus did, but we should expect

God the Holy Spirit to assure us that God had indeed called us to this ministry, and qualified, empowered and strengthened us to it.

Secondly, as Jesus endured trials and temptations in his ministry, and as the apostles endured them, so should we expect trials and temptations. As our reading from 1 Peter tells us: now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. 7 These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire — may result in praise, glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed.

Thirdly, our ministry is a team ministry, conducted in fellowship with the Holy Spirit and with the Christian brothers and sisters around us. Each of us should grow together as members of that team, and to help others grow through the method that Jesus modelled amongst the apostles, the model of discipleship, or elder Christians coming along younger Christians to teach, encourage, and even rebuke, and to build each other up to the maturity of the faith.

In all these things, the final goal is the same, to proclaim God's kingdom and to help people into that kingdom. As 1 Corinthians tells us 1 Corinthians 3:9 (NIV) 9 we are co-workers in God's service; you are God's field, God's building. Will you, as the apostles did, accept Jesus's invitation to fish for people for his kingdom in this mission, alongside him, with similar calling, trials and methods, in a team ministry, growing through discipleship?

Do you accept his invitation to be fishers of people with him in this way?

Let me pray.
