²⁷ Jesus and his disciples went on to the villages around Caesarea Philippi. On the way he asked them, "Who do people say I am?" ²⁸ They replied, "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets."

²⁹ "But what about you?" he asked. "Who do you say I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Messiah." ³⁰ Jesus warned them not to tell anyone about him.

³¹ He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. ³² He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³ But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. "Get behind me, Satan!" he said. ² After six days Jesus took Peter, James and John with him and led them up a high mountain, where they were all alone. There he was transfigured before them. ³ His clothes became dazzling white, whiter than anyone in the world could bleach them. ⁴ And there appeared before them Elijah and Moses, who were talking with Jesus. ⁵ Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." ⁶ (He did not know what to say, they were so frightened.)

Sermon - Knowing Jesus - Mark 8:27-9:50

Is anyone here a fan of the reality TV show Married at First Sight? I have to ask because I once preached a sermon in another church where I made some disparaging comments about another Japanese dating show, only to find out that my rector was a fan of the show. Anyway the premise of Married at First Sight is apparently that couples who have never met previously, and don't know each other in any way, get married on the show, and their roller coaster relationships are dissected by so-called experts and are presented as entertainment. Apparently 2.5 million Australians tune into this so-called entertainment every week. I must disclose that I am not one of them, and I have never watched more than a few seconds of the show while flicking through channels.

The reality is that marriages are hard work, even when you have been together a long time. Even then, many couples don't really know each other, no matter how long they have been together, or think they know each other. You may have heard about Brian Earl Johnson? He has just been sentenced for murdering his estranged wife Kelly Wilkinsom in front of their 3 children in 2021. They had met online in 2011, before Kelly moved to the US so they could be together and were married a month later. At the time of her death they had known each other for 10 years, and were married for much of that time. Yet she obviously did not know what her husband could do, and the results were tragic.

The reason I mention this is that at the time of this morning's gospel reading, Jesus's disciples have been with him for probably two and a half years, but they don't really know him.

Sure, they know his name, they know he is a great teacher and a miracle worker, but I don't think they really knew him - who he is, what makes him tick, what he came to do. They had been given lots of hints in the first 8 chapters of Mark, but they haven't really got it. Now however, it is time to lay it on the line. It is time for them to understand fully who Jesus is.

Who do people say Jesus is?

At the beginning of our reading, Jesus starts with the question, Who do people say I am? This is a bit less threatening, less of an HSC exam question, than 'Who do you say I am?' and a good segue into this important conversation. Their answer is telling: "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." These were all commonly expected people in the Jewish culture of that day.

As we heard last week, John the baptist had been murdered by Herod, but Herod was convinced he'd risen.

Elijah was an Old Testament prophet who had been taken directly to heaven without actually dying, and Malachi had prophesied he would return before the final days.

Deut 10 also prophesies that God would raise up a prophet like Moses.

However, Jesus is far more interested in who his disciples think he is. 29 "But what about you?" he asked. "Who do you say I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Messiah."

Jesus is the Messiah

Despite all the previous hints, all the suggestions, it is only now that Peter finally gets it. Jesus is the Messiah, the anointed one, the holy one of God. In Jesus's day there was a wide expectation in a transcendent saviour figure. The expectation was not universal, and there was huge variation in the details and nature of the Messiah and what he would do. Some thought he would be purely human, others that he would be super-human in some way, even divine. We have hundreds of messianic references in the Old Testament and Jewish religious, political and historical texts that point to a Messiah, so it was a very common expectation. Even amongst Jesus's disciples there was a variation in the expectations, but at least it was a starting point.

Jesus is the suffering Messiah who will die and rise again

Jesus then goes on to fill in some details, and in particular explain some aspects of his role that weren't expected . He said the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. A few of our references did suggest that the Messiah would be killed - probably in battle, but I can't see any that suggest he would be raised again. That is not to say that they thought it couldn't happen, it is just not part of their coreexpectations. Nevertheless, Jesus made it clear that he would suffer, die and be raised again, and as we saw from Peter's reaction, he found this extremely difficult to accept. Jesus had to rebuke Peter, and even compare his response with Satan, reflecting human ways, not God's ways.

As we know, his disciples had trouble understanding this, and Jesus has to repeat the lesson in verse 31, telling them"The Son of Man is going to be delivered into the hands of men. They will kill him, and after three days he will rise." Even then, and after the Transfiguration, 32 But they did not understand what he meant and were afraid to ask him about it.

Jesus is the new Moses and Elijah

This brings us to the strange narrative of the transfiguration. About a week later, Jesus took Peter, James and John with him and led them up a high mountain, where they were all alone. There he was transfigured before them. 3 His clothes became dazzling white, whiter

than anyone in the world could bleach them. 4 And there appeared before them Elijah and Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then a cloud appeared and covered them, and a voice came from the cloud: "This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!" 8 Suddenly, when they looked around, they no longer saw anyone with them except Jesus.

The cloud and Jesus' radiance would have immediately made the disciples think of Moses during the exodus, but the appearance, and then disappearance of Elijah and Moses are a bit more complicated. I mentioned earlier that Elijah and a prophet like Moses were expected before the last days, and this explains why they appeared. I think the reason they disappeared, and left Jesus behind was to show that Jesus was taking over their role, and they were no longer required. Jesus was the new Moses, saving his people from slavery to death, but dying in their place, and he was also the new prophet Elijah, speaking God's word, performing God's miracles, and ascending to heaven to show that death was conquered.

Jesus is the Servant King Messiah

The final lesson that I want to mention today that Jesus gives about his identity is that his Messiah-ship not only involved his suffering and death, he is also a servant Messiah. Many of the Messianic expectations were of a powerful, political king, who restored Israel by defeating her political, human enemies in war, but Jesus was clear "Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all."

To summarise what Jesus said in this passage about his identity:

He is the Messiah, but due to the variation in understandings of the Messiah, we wouldn't meet everyone's expectation of the Messiah. Some aspects, including his resurrection, wouldn't have been expected by anyone.

Secondly, he had come to suffer and die for us. Many did not expect this, although some did.

Thirdly, He is the new Moses and Elijah, speaking God's word in prophecy, and performing miracles with the power of God,

And fourthly, he is the servant king, not the powerful political ruler Messiah that many expected.

The reason that Jesus taught his disciples these things about himself is that they also said a lot about what his disciples should be like. They have to understand that he was the Messiah, but that he didn't meet everyone's expectation of the Messiah. As Jesus was rejected and persecuted, so would his disciples would be persecuted and rejected by those who expected, or at least wanted a different saviour.

He was the new Moses and Elijah. Like Moses and Elijah, his disciples would need to speak God's word, and do God's work in God's power. As the Messiah who would die and rise again, Jesus's followers would expect, in this life to die, and rise to eternal life in the next. Because he was the suffering Messiah, they also would suffer. He told them "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me.

As disciples of the suffering Messiah, his followers could also expect to suffer, and perhaps even lose their lives: He told them: 35 For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it.

As disciples of the servant King, the disciples also had to be servants of all, like a young child. "Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all."

Of course, it was not only Jesus's original followers that needed to know these things. They apply just as much to his followers today. They are important to me, they are important to you, and they are important to anyone hearing about Jesus, anyone considering being a follower of his.

We, like Jesus, Moses and Elijah, need to speak God's word, and do God's works, and say and do them in the power of Jesus's Holy Spirit.

We, like Jesus whom we follow, can expect difficulties, persecution and rejection, the same way Jesus and his followers ever since have been persecuted and rejected.

We, like Jesus and his disciples, minister as servants. Even if we are in leadership roles in our families, our neighbourhoods, our workplaces or even our churches, our leadership has to be modelled on Jesus servant leadership, putting others' needs before our own.

We need to know who Jesus really is, and not be swayed by the multitude of different ideas of who Jesus the Messiah is today. Most of all, like Jesus's original disciples, we need to know Jesus, not just know about him. We need to share our lives with him, live the life he lived, and live his life in front of others that they may also come to know and follow Jesus, and come to share the eternal life that he has freely given us, and is freely offering them.

Do you know Jesus in this way? Can others see his life in you in this way without us causing them to stumble?
