Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ

¹⁷ As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. "Good teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ¹⁸ "Why do you call me good?" Jesus answered. "No one is good—except God alone. ¹⁹ You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, you shall not defraud, honor your father and mother.'" ²⁰ "Teacher," he declared, "all these I have kept since I was a boy." ²¹ Jesus looked at him and loved him. Sermon - Do not harden your hearts - Mark 10

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Sermon - Mark 10 - Do not harden your hearts

This morning I'm preaching on Mark chapter 10. We only read verses 17 to 31, but I'll preach on the whole chapter. Please read the whole chapter in your bibles during the week to see what you missed, but also to make sure that I am preaching from what the Bible says and not making things up. In fact, you should be doing that with every sermon I, or any other preacher preaches. If you don't think what I am saying comes from the Bible, please talk to me about it. I may have made a mistake, like misreading the passage, or at least I can explain why I think the Bible is saying what I said. Will you do that for me?

When you do read Mark 10, you will notice that I don't spend much time this morning on the first 12 verses which are about divorce. This isn't because it isn't an important part of the Bible (every weird in the Bible is important), but because it is a sensitive subject for a lot of people, and because the Bible has more to say about divorce than it says in this chapter, so i wouldn't be able to do it justice today. If the question of divorce is important to you, please come and talk to me privately, and we can look at what the Bible says about it together.

With those introductory comments, let's get on with the sermon.

Mark chapter 10 seems to be a disparate group of episodes. It starts with divorce, moves to little children and then the difficulties of rich people entering the kingdom of God, Jesus predicting his death and resurrection, the first being last, and finishing with blind Bartimaeus being healed. Disparate as these may seem, we know that God inspired Mark to put these sections together for a reason, and so it is worthwhile to look for a common theme.

Let's take a quick look at each of the sections and see if we can see that theme. **Divorce** Firstly, Divorce: Jesus said that Moses allowed divorce because their hearts were hard. As I said, there is a lot more that can be said on this subject, but not this morning.

Little Children Next Jesus tells his disciples not to hinder little children from coming to him. In effect, Jesus is telling his disciples not to have hearts hardened against children. That is, they need to have compassion on them. This might be something that is difficult to do in the morning when neither you nor they have had any sleep, but I don't think it is a concept we find hard to grasp. On the other hand, his instruction that everyone needs to receive kingdom 'like children' needs a little more teasing out.

We need to understand what it is about children that we need to be like in order to enter the kingdom of God. I'm pretty sure it is not the ability to scream your lungs out until 3am and keep everyone awake, and nor is it being irresistibly cute. I'd never get to heaven if that was the criteria.

I think the most important aspect of children is their complete dependance. Babies and little children can't do anything for themselves, and I need someone to feed, wash and clothe them. They have to accept help from whoever provides it, and while they might be reluctant to try new foods, there is no point in them being hard-hearted with whoever helps them, even if the mess they leave might suggest otherwise. Similarly, we can not get into the kingdom of God in our own strength. We need God's help, and we can't be so hard-hearted that we reject God and his free entry into His kingdom.

Rich People Jesus then talks about how difficult it is for the rich to enter the kingdom. A man comes to Jesus, asking what he must do to be saved. He says he has kept all the commandments, and Jesus tells him the only extra thing he has to do is sell all his possessions and give the proceeds to the poor. Mark tells us *He went away sad, because he had great wealth.*

The difficulty for the rich is that they are the polar opposite of totally dependent children. Many rich people feel they have built up their wealth through their own efforts, their hard work and determination (and poor people around them haven't), so that they deserve to be rich, and other people don't. They are so often focused on themselves and their wealth, and while it is not always the way, many are hard hearted, unable to rely on anyone's help, even God's, to get into his kingdom.

The next little episode is Jesus predicting his death and resurrection again. This is the third time he has done this in Mark's gospel, but I want to skip this section just for the moment, and come back to it shortly.

The Last shall be First This brings us to perhaps one of Jesus's most famous sayings, that the First will be last, and the last will be first. The context here is that two of his closest mates, James and John, ask if they can sit next to him in heaven. That is, they rather arrogantly want the most honoured positions in heaven. This is a big ask, and Jesus says it is not for him to decide. While entry into God's kingdom is free, there are suggestions throughout the Bible that places of such high honour are effectively earnt by giving up a lot in this world for God. Jesus asks James and John if they can make the sacrifice he will have to make, and without realising that Jesus is talking about being crucified, they say they can. Of course, Jesus actually knows what will happen to these two, James will be martyred by king Herod in Acts 12, and while Jesus knows what happened to John, we are not so sure. Tradition has it that John willingly accepted martyrdom by being plunged into boiling hot oil, but he was miraculously preserved from harm, and went on to live a long life. We do know he eventually ended up on the island of Patmos where he wrote the book of Revelation. He was willing to suffer and die for Christ, even though Christ didn't require him to be martyred in boiling oil.

Getting back to Mark's gospel, Jesus tells James and John that whoever wants to become great must be a servant, 44 and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. He goes on to say that even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. So, the Christian idea of leadership is servant leadership - leading people by serving them. Last week we saw this demonstrated on Maundy Thursday at our foot washing service. Jesus set the example of personally performing the most menial activity required of a slave - washing the grime from his followers feet. If we are to follow Jesus's example, we can't be hard-hearted towards the people we are serving. We must demonstrate our compassion for their every need, and our priorities must be their needs, not our wants.

Blind Bartimaeus

The final episode in our reading this morning is the story of the healing of Blind Bartimaeus. He asked Jesus for mercy, to see, and Jesus wasn't hard hearted, but healed him.

I imagine that if I were in Bartimaeus's shoes, I would show a hardness of heart to Jesus even as he offered to heal me. I admit I am fiercely independent and find it extremely difficult to accept that I need help from anyone. Part of this is being a spendthrift who won't pay anyone to do something i can do myself - no matter how much a hash I make of the job, but more significantly it is my pride. I hate to admit when I need help, even if it is obvious to everyone else.

Jesus predicts his death and resurrection

This brings us back to the section I skipped a minute ago. You remember that I briefly skipped over Jesus predicting his death and resurrection. Well, this is the crux of the way he served everyone of his followers from the day he died until he returns - dying and rising again for them. He held no hardness of heart towards any of the people who rejected the rightful lordship of God the Father over their lives, he just quietly let himself be executed, be torn away from the perfect relationship he had had in the Trinity for all eternity, took the punishment for all people's sin and rejection in himself so that all might receive their salvation.

Conclusion

This morning I have talked a lot about hardness of heart from this chapter of Mark. We also read in our Old Testament reading how Pharaoh's heart was hardened so that he wouldn't let the Israelites go, despite the ten devastating plagues that God sent. But what have we learnt about hardened hearts?

On a human level, Jesus shows us that we must not harden our hearts against anyone that God brings before us - children, the poor, those who are seen as the least in this world, and even our marriage partners - our husbands or wives. We must not hinder any of these from entering the kingdom of God, and in fact there is much we can learn from them - children, the poor, the least, about the attitude we must have in order to enter God's kingdom.

And this is the second lesson we can learn from this passage - we ourselves must not harden our hearts against those who strive to help us - to aid and teach us what we must learn in order to enter the kingdom. There is no point in bull headedly and so fiercely independent that we don't accept help that is freely offered, and ultimately will bring us much gain. Ultimately, we need to be like Bartimaeus - humbly asking for mercy and accepting God's free gift of forgiveness.

The final lesson is to understand that despite our sin and rejection of him, Jesus is not hard-hearted against anyone, but died and rose again for us while we were still sinners. We cannot be like rich people who arrogantly consider that they don't need help to enter God's kingdom.

As the Book of Hebrews chapter 3 tells us: ¹² See to it, brothers and sisters, that none of you has a sinful, unbelieving heart that turns away from the living God. ¹³ But encourage one another daily, as long as it is called "Today," so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness. ¹⁴ We have come to share in Christ, if indeed we hold our original conviction firmly to the very end. ¹⁵ As has just been said:

"Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts as you did in the rebellion." Hebrews 3:12-15

So let each of us examine our hearts, and ensure they are not hardened to those around us, or to God, whose promise of entering his kingdom through Jesus's death and resurrection still stands.
