Sermon - Jonah 4

We finished our sermon last week with the words: "God relented and did not bring on them the destruction he had threatened". It would have been great to finish the book there, but instead, this morning we read "to Jonah this seemed very wrong, and he became angry."

We know from chapter 1 that Jonah isn't quite what we expect from a prophet of God. In chapter 1, Jonah went the completely opposite direction to the one God told him to, and today he gets the grumps because God relents and doesn't destroy the Ninevites, even after they repented and changed their ways.

You may well be asking what sort of attitude is this for God's prophet? Not only does he get the grumps, but he wishes he was dead. But please don't make any sort of theology of suicide out of this. After all, Jonah is such a bad example in so many ways. If you, or anyone you know if feeling suicidal, make sure you get proper help.

it is however important to see what God is saying in this passage.

In his graciousness, God doesn't rebuke Jonah. He gives him a demonstration of what is going on that he can understand more easily. Jonah goes outside the city, and sits in the sun. God send a plant to provide shade, and then sent a worm to eat the plant. At this point Jonah feels compassion for the plant that he had put no effort into growing. It was a bit like my pumpkin plants that self seeded in my compost heap. The pumpkins are great, but I get cross if they go mouldy before I get to eat them, even though they are genuinely a gracious gift of God at no cost to myself.

In explaining this to Jonah, God says "You have been concerned about this plant, though you did not tend it or make it grow. It sprang up overnight and died overnight. ¹¹ And should I not have concern for the great city of Nineveh, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand people who cannot tell their right hand from their left—and also many animals?"

God is saying that he has nothing but love for the Ninevites. He made them and cares for them, no matter how much they have ignored him and disobeyed him. Sure he has to be just, but if the opportunity come to relent from judging them, God will take it, even if it offends Jonah's sensibilities.

So, what is the point for us in all this? In spite of all the sin and rebellion and immorality and cynicism in the city, God pities Nineveh; he has compassion on the city. He wants us to feel that compassion with him as we consider Cooma today.

I believe the Lord will use us to show compassion on his city of Cooma, and the towns in our region: Bredbo, Numeralla, Jerangle, Adaminaby and Nimmitabel. As God commissioned Jonah to preach his message to Nineveh, so he commissions us to preach his message in our region.

We probably aren't called to preach the wholesale destruction of Cooma in 40 days, but we must proclaim God's message of salvation through Jesus Christ. We must proclaim the gospel that I keep talking about.

I realize this isn't as simple as it sounds. It is very hard to bring the gospel into normal conversations, so it helps to plan ahead.

The first thing we should do is pray that God will show us the people he wants us to talk to. It often helps to pray for some specific people that you already know - members of your family, work colleagues, neighbours. Pray for them specifically, and pray for opportunities to chat with them about general stuff. Take the opportunity to develop your friendship with them by talking about the usual things you task to people about - your family, the weather, your work. Get to know them as friends, for them to trust you and be comfortable sharing more personal matters and this will make it easier to eventually move the conversation to your faith, but this will take time, so don't rush it.

As your friendship develops, think about the sort of things that excite you about your faith and you could share with them. If you really enjoy meeting with your church family during our church services, or when we have morning tea afterwards, then think about how you can share that with your friends. Perhaps you have read something really helpful in your Bible ir a Christian book, or have used something that really struck you in a sermon. Perhaps you really enjoyed a hymn during the service, or some fellowship activity with church members. Think about how you can talk about these with your friends, not necessarily to invite them along at this stage, but just to share what is important to you. While you are talking with your friends, make sure you listen carefully as they share what is important to them. How can you expect them to listen to you if you don't listen to them?

Once you have got to that point in your friendship, there are a number of different directions you might try. Some people might be receptive to an invitation to come to church, or perhaps another function that might be less threatening. Guys might invite friends to the men's breakfasts, and we can arrange other activities that could interest different groups. I have thought about running regular high teas for the women, but if you have ideas, let me know and we can see if they can be organised.

But you need to be careful in this stage. Many will decline your invitations, at least to start with, and we can't give the impression that that is the only reason we have developed the friendship. Friendships are valuable in their own right, and God can use faithful friendships, perhaps many years down the track.

Another direction God might lead you is to talk to your friend about what you believe as a Christian. My last sermon series about the gospel should give you some ideas.

Perhaps circumstances of life - a death in the family, crime, birth, baptisms, marriages, conflict and so on, are things that Christians may have a distinctive view of, or get of comfort from their faith. These may be the sorts of things that are worthwhile sharing with your friends, and that God can use to open their hearts to the gospel.

Do not be surprised if you don't get a response like Nineveh's king straight away. If you do, praise God, and keep praying for your friend that the word of God be firmly established in their heart. And if you don't get that response, keep praying that God will open their heart.

Also, don't be resentful like Jonah, not really wanting your friends to turn to Christ. Jonah didn't want the Ninevites to turn back to God, partially because they were foreigners, not God's chosen

people like Jonah, and partially because he thought that they hasn't earned their salvation. In Jonah's mind they were too evil, and to repent so easily seemed to cheapen Jonah's faith. In fact it really reflected that God is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, a God who relents from sending calamity, and loves ever member of humanity, hoping they will turn back to him, no matter how much they have stayed.

This is the message from Jonah this week. Jonah begrudgingly worked with God to save the Ninevites, and the evil, unlikely Ninevites repented and turned back to God. Will you joyfully work with God to save your family, your colleagues, your neighbors and ultimately, Cooma and the region, no matter how unlikely they seem?
