Sermon - Acts 7 - A History Lesson

Who are you? Are you the product of your history? Your family? Your experiences? Your education and even your ancestry? Or are you your future: what you will become? The things you will do? The improvements you make in society? The inheritance you will leave to your children? Are you your future?

Please ponder that thought as we look at the 7th chapter of Acts.

Last week in Acts 6, we heard that Stephen, who was appointed the equivalent of a parish councillor in the early church, had been dragged before the Sanhedrin, the Jewish ruling council. False witnesses tried to get him condemned. They said, "This man never ceases to speak words against this holy place and the law, 14 for we have heard him say that this Jesus of Nazareth will destroy this place and will change the customs that Moses delivered to us." 15 And gazing at him, all who sat in the council saw that his face was like the face of an angel.

How would you have responded if you were in Stephen's place?

Maybe you wouldn't have, but Stephen gave them a history lesson. He briefly summarised Old Testament history from the time of Abraham to King Solomon. In doing so, he really annoyed his Jewish listeners, because the Jewish people, like many other peoples, is a product of its history. Good Jews would trace their ancestry back to Abraham, and they saw their identity in that ancestry. Any attack on their history, or any implication that they were unworthy products of their ancestry would really hit a raw nerve, and boy, did Stephen hit a raw nerve.

I won't go into detail about the history lesson Stephen gave the Sanhedrin, but I hope you remember the third sermon I gave in my series on the gospel. It was about God's plan for restoration, and I said that the Old Testament was part one of the plan, set up the framework for part two, which was sending Jesus into the world. For this reason, Stephen's Jewish history lesson is very important to Christians.

When I spoke about part one on God's salvation plan, I emphasised how the Old Testament law and the sacrificial system were fundamental for us to understand sin and forgiveness. The law convicts us of our sin, shows us that none of us live up to God's standard, and the sacrificial system shows how we can be forgiven by something else taking the punishment we deserve, specifically the animal's sacrifice substituting for the judgement we deserve for our sin.

Stephen's history lesson however emphasises God's promise of a Messiah, and the forerunners of that Messiah that he sent throughout Israel's history. Stephen started with Abraham, but I prefer to go all the way back to Adam and Eve. You will recall that back in Genesis 3 verse 15, God tells the snake through whom sin entered the world: I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will crush your head, and you will strike his heel."

As soon as sin entered the world, the Bible tells us to expect one of the woman's offspring to crush the head of the serpent and overcome sin. Throughout the Old Testament we are left waiting for this offspring, but no one successfully defeats sin. Stephen mentions Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph and his 11 brothers, Moses, Joshua, King David and King Solomon, all likely candidates to crush the serpent's head but all failed. Each of them were called by God, and try to lead God's people away from sin. Even Moses, who was no ordinary child, led the Israelites out of Egypt and performed wonders and signs in Egypt, at the Red Sea and for forty years in the wilderness; but he didn't make the cut. God chose him to give Israel God's law and the ark of the covenant, and to remind Israel that Eve's offspring was still to come, by

foretelling a prophet like him would come. Joshua brought Israel into the promised land, but even Joshua wasn't the one. David was called by God to be king of Israel, and his son Solomon built the temple, but they weren't the one.

Stephen goes on to say that prophets were also sent by God to foretell the coming of the righteous one, the offspring of Eve, but the Sanhedrin's ancestors would not even listen to them, and they persecuted and even killed them, showing how much they resisted God's holy spirit.

Stephen says now the Sanhedrin have even betrayed and murdered Jesus, the righteous one finally sent by God to save them from their sin.

This history really hurts the Sanhedrin. They see themselves in their ancestors who have received the law, but they don't like to be reminded that they have not obeyed that law.

In reality, the Jews in the Sanhedrin were just like their ancestors. They didn't like the message, but rather than learning it and changing to become the people they should be, they shoot the messenger, or at least they stone him. It wasn't enough for them to have Jesus crucified, they stoned to death his messenger Stephen, even as he reminded them of their history.

As he stood before the Sanhedrin, Stephen, full of the Holy Spirit, looked up to heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. ⁵⁶ "Look," he said, "I see heaven open and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God."

This might not sound particularly inflammatory to you and me, but the Sanhedrin knew their Bibles. They knew Stephen was quoting the prophet Daniel. They wanted to ignore him, but they knew he said: Daniel 7:13 (NIV) 13 "In my vision at night I looked, and there before me was one like a son of man, coming with the clouds of heaven. He approached the Ancient of Days and was led into his presence. 14 He was given authority, glory and sovereign power; all nations and peoples of every language worshipped him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that will not pass away, and his kingdom is one that will never be destroyed. Stephen was telling them that Jesus was standing at the right hand of God, who had given him authority, glory and sovereign power. Stephen was telling them that Jesus was being worshipped by all nations and peoples of every language. They would have known, if they had listened to the prophets, that His dominion is everlasting and will not pass away; his kingdom will never be destroyed. But they also know they hadn't listened to the prophets, and they will not listen to the prophets because they are too much like their ancestors. They would not recognise Jesus, the king of Kings, ruler of the kingdom of God, and they would miss out on the salvation he offered.

I don't know how many of us here grew up in believing families, or how many of us have ancestors who put their faith in Jesus as saviour and Lord. What I do know is that you are not your ancestors, no matter how much the Sanhedrin saw their identity in their ancestors.

Many of us have a great legacy from Christian forebears - knowledge of the gospel, their example of faith, and in Australia, a Christian heritage and a legal system based on Christians principles.

But you are not your forebears, you are not your ancestors, whether they were Christian or not. Your future, your eternal destination, does not depend on whether your parents, or your grandparents, or any of your ancestors trusted in Jesus's death and resurrection. Your eternal salvation depends on your faith in Jesus's death and resurrection on your behalf.

The Sanhedrin in Stephen's day had everything going for them - they had all the ancestors, the history, the law and the prophets pointing them to faith in Jesus, but they wasted it all by rejecting him - just as their ancestors had rejected the prophets. No matter what your ancestors were, you are not your history. Even if we can't remember it, we all have a history of rejecting God, but we are not even that history.

The history that really matters for you is that God's son, Jesus Christ, died on the cross for your salvation some 2000 years ago. Your response, your faith in this, or rejection of it today is your future. It is the future of salvation to an eternal life in the perfectly restored world that Jesus died to bring about, or eternal judgement. Is that your future?
