¹ Meanwhile, Saul was still breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples. He went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues in Damascus, so that if he found any there who belonged to the Way, whether men or women, he might take them as prisoners to Jerusalem. ³ As he neared Damascus on his journey, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴ He fell to the ground and heard a voice say to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" ⁵ "Who are you, Lord?" Saul asked. "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting," he replied. ⁶ "Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do." ⁷ The men travelling with Saul stood there speechless; they heard the sound but did not see anyone. ⁸ Saul got up from the ground, but when he opened his eyes he could see nothing. So they led him by the hand into Damascus. ⁹ For three days he was blind, and did not eat or drink anything. ¹⁰ In Damascus there was a disciple named Ananias. The Lord called to him in a vision, "Ananias!" "Yes, Lord," he answered. ¹¹ The Lord told him, "Go to the house of Judas on Straight Street and ask for a man from Tarsus named Saul, for he is praying. ¹² In a vision he has seen a man named Ananias come and place his hands on him to restore his sight." ¹³ "Lord," Ananias answered, "I have heard many reports about this man and all the harm he has done to your holy people in Jerusalem. ¹⁴ And he has come here with authority from the chief priests to arrest all who call on your name." ¹⁵ But the Lord said to Ananias, "Go! He got up and was baptised, ¹⁹ and after taking some food, he regained his strength. Saul in Damascus and Jerusalem Saul spent several days with the disciples in Damascus. ²⁰ At once he began to preach in the synagogues that Jesus is the Son of God. ²¹ All those who heard him were astonished and asked, "Isn't he the man who raised havoc in Jerusalem among those who call on this name? And hasn't he come here to take them as prisoners to the chief priests?" ²² Yet Saul grew more and more powerful and baffled the Jews living in Damascus by proving that Jesus is the Messiah.²³ After many days had gone by, there was a conspiracy among the Jews to kill him,

Sermon - Acts 9 - The Christian Life

If you were an apostle, which one would you be? If you consider your Christian life, do you consider yourself a Peter, a very headstrong person answering every question with the first thing that came into your head, even if in hindsight it obviously wasn't very bright? Or perhaps Jude the lesser (Thaddeus), the author of the smallest contribution to the new testament, and often confused with Judas Iscariot, who betrayed Jesus. Perhaps Bartholomew, whom we particularly remembered in the church calendar yesterday, and is the patron Saint of our Bredbo church. I hope you don't see yourself as Judas Iscariot!

Or perhaps you see yourself as a Paul of Tarsus, who was originally called Saul (and I'll use both names in this sermon), and we first heard about last week, approving of Stephen being martyred.

If you were to see yourself as a Paul, I wonder what you would see in yourself as similar to him. We know that Paul wrote roughly 30% of the New Testament, and was the great apostle to the gentiles, making several missionary journeys across the Roman empire, preaching the gospel, bringing hundreds to Christ and starting numerous churches. Perhaps you see yourself like that?

Well, you might think that there is nothing in this that is similar to you, but today I want to say that there is a lot in Paul's Christian journey that is common with yours, and pretty well all Christian lives. The details, and the magnitude are obviously different, but the structure, the framework should strike a chord. So let's look at what we learn about Saul in Acts 9, and see how it is similar to us.

Rebellion

Firstly, as I mentioned, the first thing we hear about Saul was that he approved of Stephen being executed. Things only got worse in today's reading, Saul was breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples, and he went to the high priest 2 and asked him for letters to the synagogues in Damascus, so that if he found any there who belonged to the Way, whether men or women, he might take them as prisoners to Jerusalem.

I'm sure no one here today persecuted the church to this extent, none of you actively sought to have all Christians arrested, but nevertheless, before you became Christians, you all rebelled against Christ and his church. Our gospel reading tells us that no one is perfect in God's eyes because we all rebel against God. We may not approve someone being executed just because they are Christian, or go from house to house trying to arrest Christians, but we all rebel against God.

The rich young ruler in our gospel tried to claim that he kept all the commandments. Perhaps he had never murdered, committed adultery, stolen, or even given false testimony, dishonoured his father and mother, or not loved his neighbour as himself; although i sincerely doubt he kept these last three as much as he claimed, but i know he fell short at the first of the 10 commandments, which Jesus didn't even ask him about. He obviously didn't love God with all his heart and with all his soul and with all his mind because he loved his wealth more. He, like everyone, including us, rebelled against God.

So the first part of Saul's Christian journey, the pre Christian bit, was similar to every other Christian, he rebelled against God.

Conversion

The second part of Paul's Christian journey was that Jesus convicted him off his sin, he repented and put his faith in Christ. In other words, Saul was converted.

The details of Saul's conversion are probably different to yours - none of you have told me that Jesus spoke to you out of a bright light that left you blind for three days, but if you are a Christian, Christ had spoken to you in some way - perhaps through the Bible, perhaps through friends or Christian ministers. You have repented your sins and have given your life to Christ. If you don't think this has happened to you, talk to me or trusted Christian friends about it, and ask Christ into your life that you may gain eternal life, just as Saul did.

Ministry/evangelism

Next, when you are converted to Christianity, the Holy Spirit nearly always convicts us of the importance of ministry to our fellow believers. Saul started by preaching in the synagogues in Damascus that Jesus is the Son of God, and tried to join the disciples in Jerusalem to minister to them. We know from his letters about how he travelled throughout the entire Roman empire, preaching the gospel, ministering to people and starting new churches. Not many of us minister to this extent, but some are called to be missionaries, some to be church planters, some to be deacons, priests or bishops in the Anglican scheme, and all Christians are called to share the gospel with their friends and colleagues, and all are called to minister to their Christian brothers and sisters by showing Christian love and charity.

During the reformation in the 1500s, through Christians like Luther and Cranmer, the church rediscovered the priesthood of all believers, that is, that we all can serve God directly in the way only the priests could in the old testament, The ministryhood of all believers is equally important - God has called us all to minister to each other, and when we receive the Holy Spirit, that is what we do.

Persecution

The next stage in Saul's Christian journey was his persecution. It wasn't long after he was converted before his persecution started. It was hardly surprising, since he himself had persecuted the church before he was converted, so it was hardly surprising that some in the church were aggrieved at him. Also, later on, Paul was led by God to understand that not only Jews but gentiles could become Christians, and neither Jews not gentiles had to keep the Jewish ceremonial or food laws, or even be circumcised to be Christian, and this upset a lot of Jews who thought otherwise, and consequently were determined to persecute anyone who taught otherwise, and particularly Saul.

Most usually don't have to be Christians for long before they experience persecution. Fortunately today in Australia the persecution we experience is usually mild sometimes being rejected from the right social circles, sometimes discrimination at work, in job finding or promotions. Today Christians most often get discriminated against for holding moral views that are at odds with the rest of society. Unfortunately the world has a different view on what is good for society as a whole than Christians, and will often give Christians a hard time when they are just trying to maintain God's standards in their own lives and for the good of society. It also doesn't help that some Christians try to impose their standards on the rest of society which society doesn't like, and this tends to tarnish all Christians.

In any case, Jesus had warned us that all Christians can expect to be persecuted and to suffer. In John 15, Jesus tells us that since he was persecuted, we should expect to be persecuted. Many Christians in other countries know this much more than we do. In some Islamic countries, Christians are often forcibly made to recant their faith or even imprisoned or murdered for their faith. We don't know for sure, but it is likely that Paul eventually died for his faith in a prison in Rome.

Growth

The final element of Saul's Christian journey we are looking at this morning is Christian growth.Verse 22 says Saul grew more and more powerful and baffled the Jews living in Damascus by proving that Jesus is the Messiah. Despite his direct experience of the risen Christ on the road to Damascus, Saul still needed much growth as a Christian. He needed to learn more about what Christians believe, and he needed to grow in confidence to proclaim the gospel to those who need to hear.

We are no different. As Christians we need to study our Bibles, we need to share in fellowship with older Christians to learn more about our faith, how to share it, and apologetics - or how to defend the gospel against falsehoods and other attacks. Fellowship also helps us learn to share our Christian love with our Christian brothers and sisters, and we even learn patterns of worship that both honour God and build up the church.

Conclusion

Obviously there is much more to the Christian life than I have discussed this morning. Some things in your Christian life will be similar to Saul's, and many things will be different. Nevertheless, every Christian will have rebelled against God before they are converted. They are all called to some form of Christian Ministry and Leadership - in the church, in their families and amongst their friends and work colleagues. Every Christian can expect some degree of persecution and suffering, and every Christian needs to grow in their Christian life.

You may not have imagined yourself as the apostle Paul, or even any of the other apostles - but you do have these similarities with all the apostles. Also, empowered by the holy spirit, all the apostles did great things for the church -bringing it from a handful of believers hiding in a room in Jerusalem to the Jerusalem church of thousands in the first week, to a worldwide church of billions within 2000 or so years. And you have exactly the same holy spirit empowering you, and so God can, and will do great things through you, as he did through Saul, who was initially persecutor, and then worldwide evangelist and, with the holy spirit, builder of the church throughout the world.

Will you strive, with God's help, to be similar to Saul in this way too?
