Sermon - Psalm 2 - Why do the nations Conspire?

As kids did you ever play that imagination game - "Would A beat B in a fight?" Usually it was super heroes: would Superman beat Batman, but sometimes it would be animals - would lions beat tigers, or when things got really competitive, my dad versus your dad.

Countries of course play this for real, and are playing it today. I really don't want to get into a game of If Australia got into a fight with Russia... for example. I don't think Ukraine likes that game, and to be honest, no one is winning.

They seem to be playing a different version of the game in our psalm this morning. They are playing if your country and my God got into a fight, who would win?

Our psalm today looks at the relationship between God and the nations. As we read this psalm, we must remember that the Jews in the Old Testament divided the world into two. Firstly, there was Israel, God's own people, then there were the nations, everyone else. We know that Israel were God's chosen people, but the other nations were supposed to be blessed by God through Israel, as we read in our Old Testament reading this morning. After Abraham had shown that he was willing to sacrifice his own son Isaac, God said "through your offspring all nations on earth will be blessed, because you have obeyed me." I think that Israel forgot this bit sometimes.

Nevertheless, since every nation had their own god or gods who they thought was the best, nations were constantly in conflict with each other. Since Israel was adamant that their God, Yahweh was the only true God, the nations were particularly in conflict with Israel and their God Yahweh.

This is why the psalmist starts his psalm with:

Why do the nations conspire and the peoples plot in vain? ²The kings of the earth rise up and the rulers band together against the LORD and against his anointed, saying,³ "Let us break their chains and throw off their shackles."

Not only did the other nations think their gods were better than Yahweh, they didn't want Yahweh as their God because they thought he was too much work, too restrictive of their enjoyment. They thought He was a wet blanket who didn't want them to have any fun.

Does that sound familiar to you today? How often do we see this attitude in the people around us today, the attitude that faith in the true God is a burden, a shackle or chain around their necks. Christians of course know this is not true. 1 John 5:3 tells us that God's commands are a matter of loving God, and not burdensome.

Nevertheless, the rest of the world conspires and plans in vain to reject God and his commands, even at the national level. The communists seek to destroy all religion, and many Islamic and other faith

based states specifically target Christianity. North Korea, Somalia and Libya top the lists of Christian persecutions.

Despite these nations rejecting God, persecuting his people, and even joining together to worsen their atrocities, the psalmist reminds us that all their efforts are in vain. God laughs and scoffs at them.

Recently, many good Christian friends have reminded me that humans make plans - and God laughs. While this is very true of the little plans that I make, how much more is it true of the plans of nations to reject God?

When you look at the countries with the greatest Christian growth, Yemen in particular stands out to me. It is seventh highest on this list for Christian growth, and yet it is 5th on this list of christian persecution. Many Yemenis are trying to get rid of God by persecuting his people, yet Christianty of growing stronger there than most other countries. Also more than half of the 20 counties with the largest Christian growth are avowedly Muslim. Certainly God laughs at their plans.

The psalmist says that God says to the kings of the earth, ⁶ "I have installed my king on Zion, my holy mountain. " He said "You are my son; today I have become your father.

It sounds like the psalmist is talking about Jesus? The apostles Peter and John certainly think so when they quoted this psalm in Acts 4 (our New Testament reading) and said that Herod and Pontius Pilate met together with the Gentiles and the people of Israel in this city to conspire against your holy servant Jesus, whom you anointed. 28 They did what your power and will had decided beforehand should happen."

The way that God defeated the rulers of the nations was to anoint Jesus as the king of kings in Jerusalem. God will give the nations of the kings of this earth to Jesus as his inheritance. He will give Jesus the whole earth as his possession. In doing so, He metaphorically breaks the rulers of this world with a rod of iron, dashing them to pieces like pottery.

This is why the psalmist warns the kings of this world to be wise. He tells them to take the only proper option, to serve God with fear, and celebrate Jesus's rule with trembling.

He warns them to Kiss, or give homage to his Son, or he will be angry and this will lead to their destruction.

So, the psalmist is clear that in a conflict between God and the kings of the earth, Yahweh will always come out on top. In fact, we know that the war has already been won, because God has installed Jesus as the king of kings on Mount Zion, in Jerusalem, although the rulers of this earth didn't recognise it when God did it. They didn't recognise it because the king of kings was crowned with a crown of thorns, and was not installed on a bejewelled, golden throne in Jerusalem but on a wooden Cross, anointed not with previous oil but with his own blood.

Yet, despite the ignomious coronation, Jesus has been raised up and now sits on the highest throne, at the right hand of God himself. He is waiting only until the right time to receive the inheritance of all the nations to the ends of the earth, even the nations of the kings who conspire and rise up against him. He will be angry against all the sin in the world, all, including the kings of the nations whose sin is to have rejected the one true God, and against whom His wrath will flare up in that moment.

So, let us not be like the rulers of the nations. Instead, let us be the people of whom the psalmist said: Blessed are all who take refuge in him.

Is your refuge in Jesus Christ, God's anointed?
