Sermon - Psalm 3

War is a terrible scourge on our society, and it seems inevitable, and never ending. There has been no time in history in which major powers have not been in conflict, and even when nations are quiet, terrorist warfare gnawing away at society. Throughout history, states have tried to avoid conflicts by developing family ties between royal families through marriage. This happened all over the world. The Habsburgs of Austria developed it into a high art of territorial acquisition-via-inheritance. So much so that a motto came to be associated with their dynasty: "Let others wage war. You, happy Austria, marry!" I suspect any effort I might try to make to choose marriage partners for my daughters for my own benefit would not be so successful!

In any case, the idea that family relationships prevent conflicts escapes me. I am sure that parents know that conflicts between siblings, and even with other relatives within the family can often be even more fierce than other conflicts.

King David, who either wrote our psalm this morning, or about whom our psalm was written, certainly understood this.

You may have noticed the introduction to the Psalm: a psalm of David when he hid from Absalom. Since David was hiding and in fear for his life, we know going well for him. His son Absalom was trying to kill him to settle an old dispute, and to become king in his place.

Apparently what had happened was that another of David's sons, Amnon (a half brother to Absalom), had raped Absalom's sister. David was angry, but he didn't do anything because Amnon was his heir apparent. Absalom was Infuriated by the rape and David's inaction, and assassinated Amnon and fled. Three years later he returned to Israel and rallied popular support against his father David's reign, forcing David to flee Jerusalem. As he was fleeing, 2 Samuel 15:30 tells us David was going up the Mount of Olives, weeping as he went; his head was covered and he was barefoot. All the people with him covered their heads too and were weeping as they went up. Also, during this, Absalom humiliates David by publicly raping ten of his concubines. A war ensues but their revolt ends in failure when Absalom is killed.

Do you ever have one of those days when the whole world seems to be against you? David probably felt it more than most, even from before he became king, the giant Goliath wanted him dead, and even Saul, the first king of Israel was out to kill him. And when he became king, he was constantly at war. If it wasn't the

nations around him, it was members of his own family, like Absalom, wanting to become king in his place through civil war.

In fact, David was so caught up in bloodshed and warfare that God would not allow him to build the temple. 1 Chronicles 22 says that had to wait for David's son Solomon, who was a man of peace.

This has all been an introduction to Psalm 3. As you read it, did you hear the distress in David's voice because of the conflict?

¹LORD, how many are my foes! How many rise up against me!

For David, it wasn't just the people who he was at war with that distressed him. Others were questioning God's commitment to him: ² Many are saying of me, "God will not deliver him."

David, of course, knew better. Despite the mocking of his, and God's enemies, he was able to say: ³ But you, LORD, are a shield around me, my glory, the One who lifts my head high.

It probably didn't seem like God was shielding him, let alone David glory. David was hiding in fear of his life, and I'm sure he severely doubted that God would raise his head high. I suspect he felt it was much more likely that Absalon would raise his head, but that it wouldn't still be connected to his neck.

Nevertheless, David says:

David maintained his faith in his lord and God. He had faith that God would answer him. David knew that the only reason that he was able to go to bed and get up again in the morning was because his lord sustained him. I suspect we also feel that way as we get older, but David felt it every day of his life as his enemies sought to attack him from every side. He never was quite sure what each day would bring. He certainly didn't know if he would have a bed to sleep in, and whether he would wake in the morning, or be assassinated in his sleep. Yet he was able to say that he would not fear.

The psalmist then comes to a tricky verse, put at least one that jars with us today: ⁷ Arise, LORD! Deliver me, my God! Strike all my enemies on the jaw; break the teeth of the wicked.

I hope this isn't a prayer any of us pray regularly, or even at all. How could David pray that God breaks his enemies' teeth? I know that God criticised David because of his violence, but really?

There are a couple of things I want to say about this verse. Firstly, note what David doesn't say. He doesn't ask God to help him to break his enemies teeth. He is leaving the judgement in God's hands.

Secondly, while broken teeth may sound harsh to us, David could have prayed for much harsher judgement. God had often destroyed entire peoples completely, and at least seen individuals meet untimely ends.

Also note that David's enemies' sin against God was their words, the words that were disparaging God's power and righteousness. By calling on good to break their jaws and their teeth, he was asking God to silence their blasphemous talk. While what he was asking was fairly graphic, it would have gone a long way towards silencing this evil talk.

This also highlights one of the things I like about the psalms- they are brutally, emotionally honest. The psalmist doesn't hold back on saying exactly what he thinks. He wants the evil talk silenced, and he doesn't stop at saying so, albeit very graphically.

However, if you think this verse is harsh - And what about Psalm 137? You have probably heard it, as it starts:

- ¹ By the rivers of Babylon we sat and wept when we remembered Zion.
- ² There on the poplars we hung our harps,
- ³ for there our captors asked us for songs, our tormentors demanded songs of joy;
- they said, "Sing us one of the songs of Zion!"
- ⁴ How can we sing the songs of the LORD while in a foreign land?
- ⁵ If I forget you, Jerusalem, may my right hand forget its skill. Psalms 137:1-5

If you are as old as I am, you may remember a disco hit by a band called Boney M back in about 1978. The song was based on Psalm 137, and was even on Boney M's Christmas album. But the song didn't include the last two verses:

8 Daughter Babylon, doomed to destruction, happy is the one who repays you according to what you have done to us. ⁹ Happy is the one who seizes your infants and dashes them against the rocks. Psalms 137:8-9

The question is, how should we take these verses today. Should we pray for God to smash our enemies teeth, dash their infants against rock, or perhaps to destroy them completely. There are many of what are called 'deprecatory psalms' that are like this, calling on God to destroy his enemies.

In 1 John, we are called to pray for those who rebel against God - not for their destruction, but for life: ¹⁶ It says if we see any brother or sister commit a sin that does not lead to death, you should pray and God will give them life. And Romans 12:20 "If your enemy is hungry, feed him;

if he is thirsty, give him something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head."

And our gospel reading today, Jesus himself tells us to love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, 28 bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. 29 If someone slaps you on one cheek, turn to them the other also.

Turning the other cheek, and even metaphorically heaping burning coals on their heads is certainly different to breaking their teeth!

It is not that we don't worry about sin any more. Sin offends God and both Jews and Christians are called to reject sin which leads to God's judgement. However, it is important to remember, as Romans tells us, to leave room for God's wrath - He will avenge sin, but it is our role to seek to overcome evil with good, that in doing so we may win them over through God's love. We are to pray for our enemies, feed them when they are hungry, give them something to drink when they are thirsty, turn the other cheek when they slap us, give them our coat also when they demand our shirt, encourage our enemies into God's deliverance and eternal blessing. As the final line of psalm 3 says:

Let us seek to bring this blessing, not be God's curse!
