Sermon - 2 Thessalonians 3:6-18 - The Sluggard Question Time

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Sermon - 2 Thessalonians 3:6-18 - The Sluggard

You may have noticed that our New Testament reading today talked a bit about idle, or lazy people. When I started preaching, I would always start my sermon with a joke that was relevant to the topic and as I was writing this sermon, it occurred to me that there are actually a lot of jokes about laziness. But do you know what, I just couldn't be bothered using the internet to find them. Perhaps I need to read this passage carefully!

There are also a lot in the book of proverbs that talk about laziness. You heard one in our Old Testament reading this morning: ⁵ Laziness brings on deep sleep, and the shiftless go hungry.

I particularly also like the proverbs about the sluggard. Isn't that a wonderful word that rolls off the tongue - sluggard. Some Bibles translate it 'the lazy one', or 'the slacker', and one obscure translation calls him the lazy bum', but I think I'll stick with 'sluggard'.

Proverbs says (NIV) 6 Go to the ant, you sluggard; consider its ways and be wise! 7 It has no commander, no overseer or ruler, 8 yet it stores its provisions in summer and gathers its food at harvest. 9 How long will you lie there, you sluggard? When will you get up from your sleep? 10 A little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to rest —11 and poverty will come on you like a thief and scarcity like an armed man.

I must admit, particularly with a three year old grandson, that 10 A little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to rest has a certain appeal!

Another proverb I really liked is 'The sluggard says, "There's a lion outside! I'll be killed in the public square!" That sounds like the sort of excuse my grandson would make.

We may well laugh about idleness, but it was a real concern for Paul with some Thessalonians. He commands the church In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from every believer who is idle and disruptive and does not live according to the teaching you received from us. Paul is completely serious - it is not just a warning or a suggestion, but a commandment in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. Perhaps I should rethink my desire for little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to rest!

But why was Paul so serious about idleness in the church? He calls these sluggards 'brothers and sisters' so they are in the church.

Firstly, we should note that these people are not just idle, Paul also called them disruptive and do not live according to the teaching they received from Paul. He also says that they are not busy (which is not surprising if they are idle), but he calls them busybodies: They bustle about uselessly, they busy themselves about trifling, needless, useless matters, they are officiously inquisitive about other's affairs.

It is easy to see how these people are disrupting the Christian community, and this is what I think Paul is most concerned about.

They are also not living according to the teaching they received from Paul. If you read back through I Thessalonians you will remember that in it Paul exhorted them to godly living - to live lives pleasing to God and free from sexual immorality. Paul also gave assurance about the eternal state of believers who had died - eternal life. We'll come back to this assurance, but I'm sure we have all heard of churches that have been not only disrupted, but completely destroyed by sexual immorality. Of course Paul wants the Thessalonian church, and our church, to be completely free of it.

As I mentioned, Paul's teaching included teaching about the day that Jesus will return. We have already heard in this second letter that some were distorting this teaching by saying that Jesus had already returned and it seems from both letters that there were other distortions as well, suggesting it would not happen. It appears this false teaching was in some way contributing to the idleness that Paul was warning against. If they believed that they had missed Jesus's return, then there was no point in them working for a living in their normal jobs, and they might as well sponge off other believer's godly generosity. By not bothering with even working to provide for themselves, they certainly could not develop the means that they could show generosity to others.

This taking advantage of generosity would also disrupt the church, perhaps even more insidiously than sexual immorality. At least sexual immorality was clearly against Christian teaching and Paul's message, with no excuse. But idleness was apparently being justified from what was claimed to be Paul's teaching, even if it was a perversion of it.

Paul's teaching when misinterpreted could have been said to encourage idleness, and it could also been misinterpreted to encourage sinfulness. The message of the gospel is that Jesus has done everything to save us from our sin to eternal life by doing on the cross in our place. Some reasoned that there is nothing more that we must do to gain salvation, and nothing we can do to lose that salvation. As Romans 6 tells us: that some were saying: Shall we go on sinning so that grace may increase? Shall we live in disobedience because then Jesus will forgive us all the more and show even more glory.

In Roman's, Paul responded 2 By no means! We are those who have died to sin; how can we live in it any longer? The same applies to the Thessalonians - how can they live in disobedience to Paul's message of the gospel response to the forgiveness Jesus had won? The fact that Jesus has done everything necessary for our salvation certainly means that there is nothing we have to do for our salvation, and no sin by which we can lose our salvation. Jesus death was sufficient for every sinner and sluggard - but nevertheless, our response to our salvation must be to avoid sin and idleness at all costs. To do otherwise simply either shows that we don't appreciate the salvation Jesus has won for us - or that perhaps we haven't accepted it.

Consequently, Paul commands the Thessalonians to not associate with the sluggards and those who haven't followed his teaching, in order that they may feel ashamed. 15 Even so, he says to not regard them as an enemy, but warn them as you would a fellow believer.

Last week, in contrast with the Thessalonians church, I mentioned that I was not aware of any evil or wicked people here in the church in Cooma, and I still believe that is the case, in case any of you are worried. Similarly, I am not concerned that any of you are so sinfully idle that the rest of the church should avoid associating with you. Of course, if any of you are worried there might be such idle people amongst us, please talk to them, or me before you do anything about it.

On the other hand, if you think you yourself are sinfully idle, then you can also talk to me, and I am sure I can help you find things that are within your gifts, capability and capacity that would prevent your idleness concerns. I am sure you can think of them yourself, but I am always happy to help in this way, not just to avoid your idleness, but also to help grow this church that God has given us, to share the ministry load, and to show our love and generosity to each other.

Finally, Paul concludes his letter, and I will conclude this sermon series with the words: 'Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times and in every way. The Lord be with all of you.'

Paul, wrote that greeting in his own hand, which is the distinguishing mark in all his letters. This is how he wrote.
