Sermon - What kind of King do you want?

Luke's account of Jesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem asks an important question: what kind of king do we want reigning over us? I don't mean King Charles—but what kind of king are you ready to submit to? Specifically, is Jesus the sort of a king you want?

This passage starts by saying that Jesus was making his way to Jerusalem. Jerusalem was the centre of spiritual, religious and political power in Israel. It was from Jerusalem that the influential Jewish leaders had come (<u>Luke 5.17</u>) and where people expected the kingdom of God to be revealed (<u>Luke 19.11</u>). It is the City of the Great King, King David. This passage points to Jesus as the longed for successor to David, and so how Jesus will be received in Jerusalem, the city of the king, is really important.

But Jesus is not the kind of king that the crowds so desperately want. The crowds want a political king who will liberate the nation from Roman rule. Later, when Jesus enters Jerusalem a second time in secret, he points to the way that the kingdom of God will really come—not as a political and national idea, but by transforming people inwardly, changing their hearts in secret.

As Jesus approaches the city, Luke tells us that the disciples will find a colt that is tied up; they are to untie the colt. You will notice that the colt hasn't been ridden on before, because that is what is required for kings' mounts. This arrival on a colt did do not mark the crowning of the king, but the recognition of the king who has already won his victory. Luke makes this explicit in the words of the crowd: 'Blessed is the coming King!' (Luke 19.38), and then he quotes <u>Ps 118.26</u>.

Ps 118 is a psalm sung by pilgrims as they approached Jerusalem. It was originally associated with the coming of the king to Jerusalem, and the symbolic action of throwing cloaks on the road is associated with welcoming the conquering king, as Jehu is welcomed in 2 Kings 9.13.

The crowd is the whole multitude of Jesus's disciples, the pilgrim crowd that has been following him, and they are cheering Jesus. When the Pharisees call Jesus to silence the crowd, he tells the stones will cry, and this points to Jesus' kingship over nature., another element of his kingship.

So Luke tells us that Jesus is coming to the city of the king; he comes in the manner of a king; and he is acclaimed by the crowd of his disciples who hope the kingdom will now be announced as the king.

But what kind of king is Jesus? And what does his kingdom look like? Luke is also tells us this.

First, he said Jesus is a king who brings peace. The crowds acclaim: 'Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!' the same as we heard at Christmas from angels to shepherds in the field (Luke 2.14). Jesus is a king of Peace!

Secondly, Jesus is a king who merits praise and brings joy among people, but also the whole of the creation. If the people stop praising, then the very stones themselves will cry out (<u>Luke 19.40</u>)! Jesus is a king to celebrate!

Thirdly, Jesus is a king who brings power. The disciples welcoming Jesus celebrate the 'works of power' they have seen him doing (<u>Luke 19.37</u>). He didn't use this power to control, manipulate or restrict. Instead, he brings down the proud 'in the thoughts of their hearts' (<u>Luke 1.51</u>) and to give '<u>freedom for the prisoners</u>, recovery of sight for the blind, and to set the oppressed free' (<u>Luke 4.18</u>).

This is a different kind of king to any you've met before. This is because the journey up to Jerusalem is not a journey to power and glory, but it is a journey down in obedience to death. Jesus does not come to conquer the city; he comes to die, and in this great reversal to win an even more profound victory. This is why he brings peace: he has turned us <u>from being enemies of God to friends through</u> his death. This is why he brings praise and joy: because his death and resurrection have dealt with the things which separate us from God and from one another. This is the power he offers: power to know forgiveness and peace of mind.

Jesus's reign is not nationalistic but universal. His mission is not only to proclaim release to the captives but also recovery of sight to the blind and good news to the poor...His crown is crown of thorns; his throne, a splintery cross. His exaltation does not come in riding a horse-drawn chariot amid the cheers of family and friends; rather, he finds his glory in being raised up on a cross amid the jeers of the masses. Through his death and resurrection this one who refuses to be an earthly king makes his royal entry by way of a cross and empty tomb.

This presents each of us with a challenge. Will we stand with the disciples and welcome this king of peace, praise and power? Or will we stand with the Pharisees who are like the resentful tenants who 'will not have this man to reign over us' (<u>Luke 19.14</u>)?

What kind of king do you want?
