Sermon - The Call to Follow Jesus - John 1:35-51

What makes people follow Jesus? What made you follow Jesus at the start of your Christian life?

Our gospel reading this morning talks about how four different disciples came to follow Jesus: Andrew, Philip, Nathanael and another disciple whom John doesn't name, but was possibly John, the author of the gospel himself. All of these disciples end up following Jesus, and play a major part in the early Church, but today I want to look at the start of the process - or more specifically, what started the process. That is why I want you to think about why you started following Jesus.

The two disciples - Andrew and the Other One

The first two people that get called to follow Jesus are obviously looking for something already - they were disciples/followers of John the Baptist, and they actually left following John to follow Jesus instead. However, I doubt if John was at all upset about losing the disciples. It was not that they were high maintenance disciples, or at least that we know of, but we do know that John pointed them in Jesus' direction.

As we heard last week, John the Baptist was a religious teacher who was preaching that people should turn away from their sins in order to be prepared for the coming Kingdom of God. As he was preaching this, and was baptising, or washing the people who listened in the local river to symbolise that they were washed from sin. As he was doing this he told two of his own followers: pointing them towards Jesus as he was passing by, and said, "Look, the Lamb of God!" As I mentioned last week, in the Old Testament, lambs were sacrificed in the temple, so by calling Jesus the Lamb of God, he was basically saying that Jesus would take away our sins in the same way that lambs took away sins in the Old Testament, by taking the punishment that sinners deserve - effectively dying in our place.

As soon as John the Baptist had pointed Jesus out, Andrew and the other disciple moved on from being disciples of John to being disciples of Jesus. They chased down the road, and asked him "Rabbi" (which means "Teacher"), "where are you staying?" - This might seem a little personal, a little (or perhaps a lot, intrusive, but that was how discipleship worked in those days) and Jesus said "Come, and you will see." So Jesus's two new disciples went and saw where he was staying, and they spent that day with him.

Simon

This brings us to the next disciple who was called. After Andrew left John the Baptist, and stayed with Jesus all day, he went to call his brother Simon, calling him to come and join in the adventure. Unlike John the baptist who called Jesus the Lamb of God, Andrew told Simon he had found the Messiah - the figure prophesied in the Old Testament as one who would save Israel. There was a lot of debate about the details of these prophecies and what the Messiah would be like and do, but John and Simon were convinced that Jesus was the Messiah - that Jesus was the one.

Andrew and Simon were obviously close brothers, and Andrew did not have to tell his brother twice. Off Simon goes, and when he meets Jesus, Jesus tells him he will be called Peter, which means a Rock. Being called a rock can mean a lot of things, but at the very least was a change for Simon - we know him as a headstrong man, jumping straight in to following Jesus, yet by calling him Rock, Jesus was at least implying he would gain a certain degree of stability, that he didn't have before Jesus.

Philip

Next we get to Philip. After he had spent time with Simon (now called Peter) Jesus goes to find Philip, and directly asks him to follow him. It seems he just bowled up to him and said "Follow me." I suspect Jesus and Philip knew each other from childhood, so following Jesus probably wasn't as big a deal as you might suppose.

Then Philip, like we have just heard about Andrew, goes and tells his friend - Nathanael. We don't know much about the relationship between Philip and Nathanael, but they probably had known each other, as well as Jesus, growing up in the same small town.

Nathanael

Nathanael is our final new disciple. Elsewhere in the gospels, Nathanael is called Bartholomew, and this is because Nathanael was likely his first name, and Bartholomew surname - Bar means 'Son of", to he is Nathanael, Son of Tolmai. Philip also takes a different approach to telling Nathanael who Jesus is - Philip told Nathanael: "We have found the one Moses wrote about in the Law, and about whom the prophets also wrote —Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." - a more detailed way of saying the Messiah.

It seems that Nathanael is a bit cynical about Jesus coming from Nazareth. His comments "Can anything good come out of Nazareth" was probably a bit like someone from Canberra asking if anything good can come from Queanbeyan (or even Cooma?) This doesn't phase Jesus, and he gives as good as he gets - he responds a bit sarcastically to Nathanael, and calls him an Israelite in whom there is no deceit. It's like he says "Look, an honest broker from the big smoke - you don't see that every day!'

Then there is an interesting exchange where Jesus tells Nathanael he saw Philip calling him under the fig tree, which prompts Nathanael to declare: "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; you are the king of Israel." This is of course another way of describing the Messiah - so it's the same message, but just with different words again.

After this sarcastic exchange, 50 Jesus said, "You believe because I told you I saw you under the fig tree. You will see greater things than that." "Very truly I tell you, you will see 'heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending on' the Son of Man." Here Jesus is telling Nathanael is being called to great things - what prompted him to believe may seem insignificant enough, and it would be nothing compared to the things he would see in the grand adventure of following Jesus - he would witness God himself, and angels travelling between heaven and Jesus himself. He certainly had a lot to look forward to.

What do we learn?

So, having heard about how these four people have come to follow Jesus, having heard the different ways people are called. How were you called?

We have seen that sometimes people are directly called by Jesus himself, as Nathanael was. In one sense, God does call all people who follow him directly, but in terms of our perceptions, our understandings, this probably is the exception rather than the rule.

More often, at least in our perceptions, God calls us through other people. We seem to find it easier to hear when we hear from people rather than by God. When God does this, some are called by professionals, which John the Baptist sort of was. In our context, these professionals often are church ministers (like me) and other professional evangelists and Church workers and Christian school teachers. Christian

Schools and other Christian teachers are vital in this, I am sure many of us here have come to follow Jesus because of the witness of Christian teachers - How many here today are in this category?

Finally, others are called to follow Jesus by friends and family, as Simon and Nathanael were. Since most of our friends, neighbours and colleagues are past the school stage, I believe your role in - our role in calling people to follow Jesus is even more vital than Christian teachers.

The disciples in today's reading responded positively straight away, but you and others in your experience may take a lot longer than that. Some internet pages suggest people often hear the gospel between seven and eighteen times before they accept Christ. I'm not sure about the statistics, but people often do need to hear many times, so perseverance is the key.

Like anything good, it takes time and effort. We all have friends and family that God can use us to call to follow Jesus, but the results are worth it.

Like all the disciples, many will eventually follow Jesus, many, like Nathanael will recognise Jesus as the Son of God. More excitingly, they will ultimately see greater things than what originally calls them to believe. They will see heavens opened and the angels of God ascending and descending on' the Son of Man when Jesus returns and we meet him in the life to come.

You can be part of calling these people to follow Jesus and eventually see these greater things. We may not see people turn to follow Jesus quickly, like the disciples did in our reading today, but God promises that he does work through us when he calls people in this way = he does plant seeds through our words, people will fol; low him, and they will see wondrous things.

Will you play your part in this great mission?
