The Ministry of the Word

Genesis 6:9-22, 7:17-24 (NIV)

⁹ This is the account of Noah and his family.

Noah was a righteous man, blameless among the people of his time, and he walked faithfully with God. ¹⁰ Noah had three sons: Shem, Ham and Japheth.

- ¹¹ Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight and was full of violence. ¹² God saw how corrupt the earth had become, for all the people on earth had corrupted their ways. 13 So God said to Noah, "I am going to put an end to all people, for the earth is filled with violence because of them. I am surely going to destroy both them and the earth. ¹⁴ So make yourself an ark of cypress wood; make rooms in it and coat it with pitch inside and out. 15 This is how you are to build it: The ark is to be three hundred cubits long, fifty cubits wide and thirty cubits high. 16 Make a roof for it, leaving below the roof an opening one cubit high all around. Put a door in the side of the ark and make lower, middle and upper decks. ¹⁷ I am going to bring floodwaters on the earth to destroy all life under the heavens, every creature that has the breath of life in it. Everything on earth will perish. 18 But I will establish my covenant with you, and you will enter the ark —you and your sons and your wife and your sons' wives with you. 19 You are to bring into the ark two of all living creatures, male and female, to keep them alive with you. ²⁰ Two of every kind of bird, of every kind of animal and of every kind of creature that moves along the ground will come to you to be kept alive. ²¹ You are to take every kind of food that is to be eaten and store it away as food for you and for them."
- ²² Noah did everything just as God commanded him.
- ¹⁷ For forty days the flood kept coming on the earth, and as the waters increased they lifted the ark high above the earth. ¹⁸ The waters rose and increased greatly on the earth, and the ark floated on the surface of the water. ¹⁹ They rose greatly on the earth, and all the high mountains under the entire heavens were covered. ²⁰ The waters rose and covered the

mountains to a depth of more than fifteen cubits., ²¹ Every living thing that moved on land perished—birds, livestock, wild animals, all the creatures that swarm over the earth, and all mankind. ²² Everything on dry land that had the breath of life in its nostrils died. ²³ Every living thing on the face of the earth was wiped out; people and animals and the creatures that move along the ground and the birds were wiped from the earth. Only Noah was left, and those with him in the ark.

²⁴ The waters flooded the earth for a hundred and fifty days.

- ²⁹ When you hide your face, they are terrified; when you take away their breath, they die and return to the dust.
- ³⁰ When you send your Spirit, they are created, and you renew the face of the ground.
- 31 May the glory of the LORD endure forever; may the LORD rejoice in his works -
- ³² he who looks at the earth, and it trembles, who touches the mountains, and they smoke.
- ³³ I will sing to the LORD all my life; I will sing praise to my God as long as I live.
- ³⁴ May my meditation be pleasing to him, as I rejoice in the LORD.
- ³⁵ But may sinners vanish from the earth and the wicked be no more. Praise the LORD, my soul. Praise the LORD.

Hebrews 11:1-7 (NIV)

- ¹ Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see. ² This is what the ancients were commended for.
- ³ By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible.
- ⁴ By faith Abel brought God a better offering than Cain did. By faith he was commended as righteous, when God spoke well of his offerings. And by faith Abel still speaks, even though he is dead.
- ⁵ By faith Enoch was taken from this life, so that he did not experience death: "He could not be found, because God had taken him away." For before he was taken, he was commended as one who pleased God. ⁶ And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him.

Sermon Genesis 6-7 - Noah's Salvation

Introduction

We're resuming looking at Genesis, we previously looked at creation, the fall, and the story of Cain and Abel. Today is the first of two sermons on Noah and the flood. It's a well known story, so I won't be looking at the details of the flood or the ark so much as some of the bigger picture issues, and in particular "why did God judge the earth this way", and "why was Noah spared?"

Why did God judge the earth this way? How was the world evil?

Verse 5 says The LORD saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become on the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of the human heart was only evil all the time. God regretted he had created mankind

Genesis says the earth was corrupt in God's sight and was full of violence. 12 God saw how corrupt the earth had become, for all the people on earth had corrupted their ways.

What did it mean that every inclination of the thoughts of mankind was only evil all the time? Looking back at what has displeased God in the first 5 chapters of Genesis, we see:

- It was not good for man to be alone (so God created woman)
- Eve and Adam disobeyed God when they ate from the tree of the knowledge of good and Evil
- · The serpent deceived Adam and Eve
- Cain brought an offering that God did not favour
- · Cain killed his brother Abel
- Lamech kill a young man for wounding him
- The sons of God married human wives

I haven't learnt a lot from the etymology of the words Evil and Wickedness - they both basically mean 'badness' in all its senses, natural and moral.

Looking at the list, there does appear to be a common theme of respecting God and his plan.

- It was not God's plan for men to be alone, so he created Eve, but sons of God having relationships with human women was bad.
- It was not God's plan that humankind have the knowledge of good and evil, so any corruption, including the serpent deceiving Adam and Eve, and them eating the fruit, was bad.
- It was God's plan that humankind worship him wholeheartedly, so Cain's half hearted offering was bad.
- Violence and Death was not part of God's original plan, so Cain murdering
 his brother is bad, just like Lamech killing the young man. Violence of any
 kind is just a way of usurping power for yourself that should only be God's.

Ultimately, God's plan is to be Lord over his creation, in the forefront of all creation's minds and inclinations. Anything that works against his perfect and good plan, anything that sidelines God or his plan, either directly or by deceiving others to do so, is bad.

At the time of Noah, except for Noah himself, every inclination of the thoughts of the human heart was only evil all the time. Not only were they neglecting to worship God as they should, they were constantly thinking of ways to sideline God and his plan. In other words, they were seeking to set themselves up as God, but without the perfect knowledge of good and evil that he had, and this is disastrous for God's perfect plan.

How was Noah good?

The writer of Genesis said that leading up to the flood, Noah was the only exception to this.

Noah was a righteous man, blameless among the people of his time, and he walked faithfully with God, who found him righteous in his generation. Twice the phrase "Noah did everything just as God commanded him." is repeated. 2 Peter describes Noah as a "herald of righteousness."

By walking faithfully with God, Noah's focus was always on God and his plan. Despite the misgivings he must have had, and the ridicule of his neighbors, Noah was not deceived and did everything just as God commanded. He was nearly 600 years old when we made an ark of cypress wood; with rooms in it and coated with pitch inside and out. The ark was three hundred cubits long, fifty cubits wide and thirty cubits high. That's about the length of our Navy's Hobart class destroyer, but 2.5 times the beam). He made a roof for it, leaving below the roof an opening one cubit high (or 45cm) all around. He put a door in the side of the ark and made lower, middle and upper decks. Noah a bit longer than the Australian shipbuilding industry which took 10 years to build the first Hobart destroyer, and it appears Noah took about 100 years - but he was probably had a team of 5 (including God), and it took thousands, with very sophisticated machinery to build HMAS HOBART.

Anyway, when it was finished, in just 7 days, he went into the ark, with his whole family, his wife, their three sons and their wives, taking with him seven pairs of every kind of clean animal, a male and its mate, and one pair of every kind of unclean animal, a male and its mate, 3 and also seven pairs of every kind of bird, male and female, to keep their various kinds alive throughout the earth. He took every sort of food that is eaten, to serve as food for all of them. God was obviously helping him as it takes me nearly that long to get my cats into a cat crate to take them to the vet.

Also, as we shall hear next week, as soon as Noah and the animals left the ark after the waters receded and God commanded, he built an altar to the LORD and took some of every clean animal and some of every clean bird and offered burnt offerings on the altar.

God's Mercy

God cut a covenant with Noah, rescuing him from the drowning that caught up every other living thing on earth. God rescued Noah because of righteousness, even though we shall find out in the next few weeks that Noah wasn't perfect, and nor was his family. In fact, as Romans 3 tells us, "None is righteous, no, not

one; 11 no one understands; no one seeks for God. 12 All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one." (Romans 3:10-12). Noah and his family sinned greatly after the flood, and yet God saved them in his mercy.

Our New Testament reading told us that "By faith Noah, being warned by God concerning events as yet unseen, in reverent fear constructed an ark for the saving of his household." In effect, Noah condemned the world, showing it to be completely unrighteous, and he became an heir of the righteousness that comes by faith. As unrighteous as Noah was was later shown to be, by faith he received righteousness by faith, the same righteousness, and eternal salvation we receive from God through Jesus's death and resurrection.

Noah did not live on earth long enough to see this perfect salvation that he was promised, to see God come to earth as the man Jesus Christ. Although God commended him for faith, he did not then receive what had been promised. He did not receive then what God has planned for all who have faith in Jesus, something better so that only together with us would he be made perfect. (Hebrews 11:39-40) He saved himself and his family, and ultimately, every subsequent living creature on earth through his obedience to God, but even greater salvation is to come.

Jesus doesn't just save us to live out our maximum of 120 or so allotted years in this earth in the loneliness that old age often brings. He died and rose again to save us for an eternal righteous life in perfect relationship with the rest of humanity and creation. He didn't just save us to live in this world of violence, corruption, disease and pain, but in a perfectly restored, incorruptible world where every tear will be washed away. And he died that we might spend eternity in perfect relationship with Him, worshipping Him as he planned from the beginning.

This is the salvation that Noah's family's salvation from the flood foreshadowed. Noah did not see his salvation until after he had built the ark in

faith, and we will not see our eternal salvation until we put our faith in Jesus's death and resurrection, and see him return as he has promised.

Are you looking forward to that day in faith, like Noah was looking forward to the waters receding?
