Sermon - Who is Jesus? John 6

Sermon - John 6:1-15 - Who is Jesus?

Who do you think Jesus is? Wise Teacher? Good Man? Miracle Worker? Healer? Teacher?

The Bible is constantly asking you who Jesus is. You may think you are reading the BIble to find out who Jesus is, but the Bible examines you to find out who you say Jesus is. This really is the most important question you can ever answer, because your answer defines your relationship with him, and that, as CS Lewis said, is either of no importance or of infinite importance. The only thing it cannot be is moderately important.

In our reading today we see at least 8 different ways that people saw Jesus.

Miracle Worker

The crowds saw Jesus as a miraculous healer Verse 2 says they followed him because they saw the signs he had performed by healing the sick. If they saw him as a healer, they wanted him to heal them or heal their family members, or they wanted to be entertained.

Today people see Jesus as a miraculous healer. The only time they think of him, call to him or pray to him is when they want to be healed of some illness or misfortune. It is absolutely true that Jesus did and does heal. As you read your Bibles, the one thing you will never read is anyone questioning that Jesus genuinely healed people. While the situation is different today, with many people questioning the reality of contemporary miracle healings, there is also no doubt that many are real. Yes - Jesus is a miraculous healer.

Teacher

In verse 3 we see a different response to Jesus. The disciples saw him as their teacher, they went up a mountainside to sit with him and be taught by him. We don't know specifically what Jesus taught them, although it may have had to do with keeping the Passover, but he did teach them. Similarly today, many people see Jesus as a wise teacher - reading through the scriptures to find wisdom for living. Many even say that his teachings are authoritative - they should be believed, but in many cases, they want other people to follow his teachings, not themselves. In any case, they usually limit which of Jesus's teaching they actually want to believe and live by - that only some of Jesus's teachings are authoritative. So Yes, Jesus is an authoritative teacher.

Social Worker

Philip saw Jesus as a social worker, organising other people to feed those in need. In verse 5, Jesus asked Philip, "Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?" By his response, "It would take more than half a year's wages to

buy enough bread for each one to have a bite!" You can see that he wasn't expecting Jesus, or even anyone to actually do anything about the crowd's hunger unless the crowd did it for themselves, trudging the great distance to the closest place they could buy food and buy it for themselves.

I'm not disparaging the value of social workers, but their role is usually to help people help themselves, or find others to provide the support that people need, and Jesus certainly did that. People today also see Jesus as a social worker in this way - about 82% in one survey thought "God helps those who help themselves" was a verse in the Bible, although it is more true that God helps the helpless. Nevertheless, as the National Association of Social Workers explained that one of the main purposes of a social worker is to restore and enhance the functioning of individuals, families and groups, and communities, and Jesus certainly does this, Jesus is a social worker.

Prophet

After the crowds had been fed and the remains cleared away, the crowd said "Surely this is the Prophet who is to come into the world." They were expecting a prophet because of our Old Testament reading from Deuteronomy, in which God said to Moses: I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their fellow Israelites, and I will put my words in his mouth. He will tell them everything I command him. 19 I myself will call to account anyone who does not listen to my words that the prophet speaks in my name. Ever since Moses, Israel had been expecting this prophet who was to be like Moses, and they thought that Jesus may have been the one. Similarly, some people today see Jesus as a prophet: someone who brings messages from God, and Jesus certainly did this. He called himself a prophet, a prophet without honour in his home town, who could not die outside Jerusalem, and he did the things expected of a prophet, so Yes, Jesus was a prophet.

A Token

In verses 8 and 9 when offering the boy's lunch, Peter may have thought Jesus's efforts would merely be a symbol, a token. He may have thought that Jesus would simply pass on the 5 loaves and two fishes from the boy to the crowd, providing just token and ultimately ineffective sustenance. Today, people still see Jesus as tokenistic, helping people live better lives and get closer to God, which Jesus definitely does

Extravagant Caterer

When gathering up the basketfuls of leftovers, the crowds would have seen Jesus as extravagantly meeting their physical needs - not only had he provided for their needs by providing sufficient food to allow them to safely travel

home, he provided 12 basketfulls more that would have been wasted if had not been collected. Many people expect Jesus to act this way today - fulfilling all their desires, and in many cases taking their queue from Psalm 37:4 Take delight in the LORD, and he will give you the desires of your heart.

Jesus does give those who put their trust and faith in him the desires of their hearts, he does meet our spiritual needs extravagantly, so Yes, he is the extravagant caterer.

Revolutionary King

After the feeding people called Jesus their Prophet, and wanted to make him king by force. They were expecting the Messiah to come to re-establish the political state of Israel to free themfrom the hated Romans and bring the nation back to world prominence it deserved. Many people of his day, including Jesus himself, did call Jesus the king of the Jews, even though he said that his kingdom was not of this earth (John 18:36). So Yes, Jesus is a king.

Conclusion

Today we have seen how many people of Jesus's day, and today see Jesus. People see him as a miracle worker, teacher, social worker, prophet, token, extravagant caterer and revolutionary king. He did all those things as he walked this earth some two thousand years ago, and he continues to do them today for those who put their faith and trust in him today.

Yes, Jesus is all these things, but Jesus is also much more. Over the next few weeks as we continue to look through John's gospel, we will see that he didn't just perform miracles, He wasn't just a great teacher, a social worker, a prophet, a token, an extravagant caterer or a revolutionary king.

He didn't just feed a multitude with physical food that would leave them feeling hungry in a couple of hours, he didn't just help people find the solution to their problems by looking within themselves or getting someone else's help. He didn't just proclaim God's words, he was vastly more than a token, and a completely different king to what the crowds were expecting.

As we continue to read John's gospel we will see how Jesus is so much more than all these things, so much more than what the crowds or we think.

As we read John, we will see who God's word, the Bible, says Jesus is, and it is my prayer that you will come to answer the same way the Bible does, that Jesus is God the Son, living Bread who gives eternal life.

But you will have to come back next week to hear more about that.
