**Sermon - The One who was promised Isaiah 7:10-16,  
Ps80:1-7,17-19, Rom1:1-7, Mat1:18-25**

Have you ever thought about how much of what we do involves predicting the future? My wife Cath is a meteorologist who predicts what the weather will be like in the future. Economists try to predict how rich or poor we will be in the future, particularly if governments follow different policies, and even engineers, my profession for many years, try to predict how machinery will work if it is designed in particular ways.

In most cases there is no shortage of people that will tell us what they think will happen, usually with quite different amounts of expertise and accuracy.

The Bible often makes predictions of what will happen in the future, and as I mentioned some weeks ago, prophecy - proclaiming God's word, often had an element of foretelling the future. Afterall, God is all knowing and all powerful, so is the only one capable of foretelling the future with complete accuracy.. The Old Testament, the first half of our Bible, which was written before Jesus, has a particular focus of foretelling that Jesus would come and who he was.

Paul makes this point in our New Testament reading this morning: Paul, who wrote the letter under God's inspiration, wrote that the gospel of God that was promised beforehand through God's prophets in the Holy Scriptures regarding his Son, Jesus Christ the Lord.

The early Christians recognised these prophecies and their fulfillment in Jesus, but what is sad is that even since Jesus came, those other faiths who believe the Old Testament, the Jews and Muslims, do not recognise that these prophecies refer to Jesus.

This is why it is so important that we understand these prophecies, and why we are looking at some of them this morning, and in particular, the ones that are referred to in the readings set down for today.

In our gospel reading from Matthew which I just read, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph and said that Mary's pregnancy to the Holy Spirit was to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet. "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").

Luke was at pains to make it clear that Mary was a virgin, that she had not had special relations with any man prior to Jesus being born. This was as the prophet Isaiah said to king Ahaz. The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel. Isaiah also said 'He will be eating curds and honey when he knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right, 16 for before the boy knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right, the land of the two kings you dread will be laid waste.' Isaiah 7:10-16

Similar to reading last week, Ahaz was worried about two kinds matching on Jerusalem to overtake it, and God told Isaiah to give home the sign of the virgin conceiving Immanuel to give confidence that God would not allow this. While it was some 800 years before Jesus, the prophecy was about God's protection of Judah, and about the coming of Jesus. Many Old Testament prophecies follow this pattern: they were an immediate fulfillment of a local issue involving God's chosen people Israel, but they also had a greater reality and in their fulfillment showed God salvation, not just of his own people, but the whole world, which is why Jesus came.

The angel went on to tell Mary that she would have a son, which you might say had a 50-50 chance of being true, but was actually vastly more significant in that he would be conceived of God the Holy Spirit, making him God the Son. So Jesus wasn't just any son, but as God's Son is seen by Christians as divine. Again, many people dispute whether this necessarily follows from the Old Testament prophecies, but when Isaiah, and the angel, go on to say that they will call him Immanuel, which like helpfully explains means God with us, Jesus divinity is not just a logical and reasonable progression, it is a belief entirely consistent with the prophecies and the circumstances, but

also helps us to understand how Jesus could grow up to take the punishment the world deserved for everyone's sin when he died on the cross and rose from the dead.

Another pattern when the New Testament refers to Old Testament prophecies is that they may only directly quote a small section, a verse of so, but the readers are assumed to know the context of the prophecy, the whole passage if you like. So this morning, our Old Testament reading didn't just include: 'The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel.' We went on read: He will be eating curds and honey when he knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right,<sup>16</sup> for before the boy knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right, the land of the two kings you dread will be laid waste

The first century Jewish traders would have known that this was part and parcel of the prophecy, but I suspect many modern readers aren't quite so biblically literate. The angel was also saying that while he is still very young - basically just moving to solid food, he will know enough to reject wrong and know what is right. This is probably an allusion to creation when humankind was made in the image of God, and the concern that reading from the tree in the middle of the garden would improperly give humankind knowledge of good and evil. When Jesus was still a babe, he would properly discern God and evil, again suggesting his divinity.

Isaiah says that even before then, the land of the two kings that Ahaz dreaded would be laid waste. This was obviously the case as Samaria and steam were laid waste before Jesus was onto solid food, but also the nation's opposing God would surely be defeated as soon as Jesus entered our world as a man. Ultimately, the details God planned had to proceed, Jesus had to live his sinless life, preach and heal, did and rose again, but the kingdom of Satan was absolutely doomed as soon as Jesus was incarnate, even if they wouldn't fully see their defeat until the plan was fully complete. Nevertheless, the outcome was absolutely certain as soon as Jesus was born.

So, today as we contemplate what Isaiah said to Ahaz, what the angel said to mark and Joseph, and ultimately what God says to us today in his word, including the words of Isaiah and of Gabriel, we hear the predictions, the prophecies, the word of God who cannot lie, and who perfectly knows the future, who knows his plans, and what their outcome will be.

God knew, and told us some 800? Years in advance that his Son, God the Son, Jesus the Messiah, the promised one would be born of the virgin Mary, would reject the wrong and choose the right, and ultimately defeat the devil that had corrupted the world since sin entered the world in Eden.

We couldn't know the details of how good would fulfil his plan just from the Old Testament prophecies, just some hints and the certainty that they would be fulfilled, but this is what makes following Jesus so exciting, we get to see and understand the fulfillment of God planned as they unfold. We can look back on Jesus' birth to the virgin Mary, understand that he is Immanuel, God with us, and through him, evil is being defeated, and for all intents and purposes has been defeated, even if we don't see it fully yet.

As we issue this, let us say with the psalmist:

God almighty,

Let your hand rest on the man Jesus at your right hand,  
the son of man you have raised up for yourself.

18 Then we will not turn away from you;  
revive us, and we will call on your name.

19 Restore us, LORD God Almighty;  
make your face shine on us,  
that we may be saved.

Amen
