John 9:1-34 (NIV)

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ

^{9.1} As he went along, he saw a man blind from birth. ² His disciples asked him, “Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?”

³ “Neither this man nor his parents sinned,” said Jesus, “but this happened so that the works of God might be displayed in him. ⁴ As long as it is day, we must do the works of him who sent me. Night is coming, when no one can work. ⁵ While I am in the world, I am the light of the world.”

⁶ After saying this, he spit on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and put it on the man’s eyes. ⁷ “Go,” he told him, “wash in the Pool of Siloam” (this word means “Sent”). So the man went and washed, and came home seeing. ⁸ His neighbors and those who had formerly seen him begging asked, “Isn’t this the same man who used to sit and beg?” ⁹ Some claimed that he was. Others said, “No, he only looks like him.” But he himself insisted, “I am the man.”

¹⁰ “How then were your eyes opened?” they asked.

¹¹ He replied, “The man they call Jesus made some mud and put it on my eyes. He told me to go to Siloam and wash. So I went and washed, and then I could see.”

¹² “Where is this man?” they asked him.

“I don’t know,” he said.

¹³ They brought to the Pharisees the man who had been blind. ¹⁴ Now the day on which Jesus had made the mud and opened the man’s eyes was a Sabbath. ¹⁵ Therefore the Pharisees also asked him how he had received his sight. “He put mud on my eyes,” the man replied, “and I washed, and now I see.”

¹⁶ Some of the Pharisees said, “This man is not from God, for he does not keep the Sabbath.” But others asked, “How can a sinner perform such signs?” So they were divided. ¹⁷ Then they turned again to the blind man, “What have you to say about him? It was your eyes he opened.” The man replied, “He is a prophet.”

¹⁸ They still did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they sent for the man’s parents. ¹⁹ “Is this your son?” they asked. “Is this the one you say was born blind? How is it that now he can see?”

²⁰ “We know he is our son,” the parents answered, “and we know he was born blind. ²¹ But how he can see now, or who opened his eyes, we don’t know. Ask him. He is of age; he will speak for himself.” ²² His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jewish leaders, who already had decided that anyone who acknowledged that Jesus was the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. ²³ That was why his parents said, “He is of age; ask him.”

²⁴ A second time they summoned the man who had been blind. “Give glory to God by telling the truth,” they said. “We know this man is a sinner.”

²⁵ He replied, “Whether he is a sinner or not, I don’t know. One thing I do know. I was blind but now I see!”

²⁶ Then they asked him, “What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?”

²⁷ He answered, “I have told you already and you did not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you want to become his disciples too?”

²⁸ Then they hurled insults at him and said, “You are this fellow’s disciple! We are disciples of Moses! ²⁹ We know that God spoke to Moses, but as for this fellow, we don’t even know where he comes from.”

³⁰ The man answered, “Now that is remarkable! You don’t know where he comes from, yet he opened my eyes. ³¹ We know that God does not listen to sinners. He listens to the godly person who does his will. ³² Nobody has ever heard of opening the eyes of a man born blind. ³³ If this man were not from God, he could do nothing.”

Sermon - John 9:1-34 - Physical and Spiritual Blindness

Introduction

This morning, and for the next few weeks, we are continuing to work our way through the gospel of John that we started last year. We finished up late last year with John chapter 8, so we will look at chapters 9 through chapter 12 up until Lent when I will preach on Paul's letter to the Philippians, and then we will go back to John and look at his Easter accounts

But as I said, this week we will look at John chapter 9 - or at least the first 34 verses. As we looked through John 1 to 8 last year, we were constantly asked who Jesus is, and were given many different answers. The first 18 verses of John chapter 1 act as a sort of an executive summary of John's answers. It tells us that Jesus is the Word, the Word who was with God and is God, who made all things, and is the light of all mankind. John calls Jesus 'the true light, who gives everyone who receives him the right to be children of God, the giver of grace and truth'. This point is illustrated in today's reading which says that you cannot see the true light if you are spiritually blind.

In relating his account, John considers what it means for Jesus to be the light of the world with the help of a man who suddenly became able to see physical light and as a consequence spiritual light, and a group of people who had perfect eyesight, but were blind to spiritual light. With that introduction, let's get started with John 9.

Whose sin causes blindness?

John 9 starts with a debate between Jesus and his disciples. It wasn't an antagonistic debate like many that Jesus had had, the disciples were not seeking to trick Jesus, although like many of their conversations there may have been a little one upmanship, vying for Jesus's attention and seeing who could ask the best questions. They saw a man, who was obviously commonly known as being blind from birth. Blindness in that culture was a huge disability; not only did it prevent most forms of economic labour, as we read in the Old Testament reading, it was one of many barriers to temple worship, and was considered by many as a judgement of God. So it was not surprising that the disciples asked Jesus the question "who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" John 9:2 The premise of the question was reasonable. There is no doubt that the man was blind because of sin. There would be no blindness, or any other disability, sickness, or death in this world if there was no sin. These things were not in the garden of Eden before Adam and Eve ate of the fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, so the man's blindness was due to sin.

While this is true, it is not always possible to link specific illnesses, disabilities or even deaths to specific sins, or even to the sins of specific people. You can sometimes, for example in cases of murder or assault, but not in most cases of sickness, apparently natural causes, our genetic anomalies which is likely the case with this man born blind.

Jesus makes this clear, that neither the blind man, nor his parents sinned in a way that caused his blindness. Moreover, Jesus is not suggesting that any of them is completely without sin. No human being other than Jesus himself is completely without sin. Jesus is simply saying that the man's blindness was not caused by any of their sin.

God's work in Healing the Blind Man and in our afflictions

Jesus then goes on to say "this (that is, the man's blindness) happened so that the works of God might be displayed in him. 4 As long as it is day, we must do the works of him who sent me. Night is coming, when no one can work. 5 While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

The man was born blind so that the world of God may be shown in him. Jesus isn't explicit at this point how the works of God are shown through this man's blindness, but he is clear that it will happen. As we read on, we see God working in this man in two ways. First we see him cured of his blindness, and, although we have to wait until next week to see it, God heals his spiritual blindness, that he comes to believe in Jesus, and so gains eternal life. Similarly, God's works are shown in our afflictions, although not necessarily in this world, or this side of heaven.

Jesus said that "as long as it is the day, we must do the works of him who sent him." We then see Jesus applying mud to the man's eyes, so we know that he is doing God's work, and he knows he is working to a schedule. He knows night, the dark time when no one can see to work, in fact, his own death on the cross, is coming, and he must bring God's light to the world in the short time that he has.

Then, Jesus spat on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and put it on the man's eyes.⁷ "Go," he told him, "wash in the Pool of Siloam" (this word means "Sent"). So the man went and washed, and came home seeing.

This happened on the Sabbath (although we aren't told until later) and the detail regarding Jesus spitting in the mud is probably to support this. In the Deuteronomy account of the 10 commandments, we read: Deut 5:12-15 12 "Observe the Sabbath day by keeping it holy, as the LORD your God has commanded you. 13 Six days you shall labor and do all your work, 14 but the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work,

neither you, nor your son or daughter, nor your male or female servant, nor your ox, your donkey or any of your animals, nor any foreigner residing in your towns, so that your male and female servants may rest, as you do. 15 Remember that you were slaves in Egypt and that the LORD your God brought you out of there with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm. Therefore the LORD your God has commanded you to observe the Sabbath day.

The reason for keeping the Sabbath is associated with Israel's slavery in Egypt when they were making bricks without straw. This is the reason given for the Sabbath commandment, and Jesus is emphasising this by making and using mud to heal the blind man. It seems that by using this method of healing, Jesus is deliberately aggravating the Pharisees, showing their spiritual blindness, and demonstrating his Lordship over the Sabbath.

4 Conversations

After being healed, there are 5 conversations, although we only look at 4 of them this week. Firstly, his neighbours aren't sure whether he is the same blind man they have seen begging on the side of the road. He tells them he is, and tells them he doesn't know how he was healed, but the one they call Jesus did it. He won't say anything more about Jesus.

Next, the Pharisees weigh in. They are most excited that the apparent healing happened on the Sabbath, which is against their religious laws, and they asked him how it happened, looking for ammunition to use against him. The man is a little more forthcoming in his response, saying again "He put mud on my eyes, and I washed, and now I see." but this time also adding that he is a prophet.

This conversation is between the Pharisees and the man's parents, but they don't want to have anything to do with the Pharisees, and tell them to ask their sin rather than them. John tells us that they were afraid of the Pharisees because they knew they had already decided that anyone who acknowledged that Jesus was the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. This is another indictment of the Pharisees' spiritual blindness, not only refusing to see that Jesus is the son of God and promised Messiah, but willing to excommunicate from the temple anyone who could see this.

The fireworks really start when the Pharisees go back to the man. They really show their blindness by saying that lying about Jesus would give glory to God, but the man won't take the bait. He won't agree that Jesus is a sinner, just that he was blind and now he sees. He is obviously growing in confidence, baiting the Pharisees by suggesting that they are so interested because they want to become Jesus's disciples.

This starts the insults flying, and the Pharisees fall back on their genetic ancestry in Moses. Yet again, this just shows their spiritual blindness: they may have a physical link to Moses, but as Jesus said back in John 5:46 (NIV) 46 If they believed Moses, they would believe Jesus, for Moses wrote about Jesus.

The man who was blind now really shows his confidence. He responds, with the sarcasm almost dripping "Now that is remarkable! You don't know where he comes from, yet he opened my eyes.³¹ We know that God does not listen to sinners. He listens to the godly person who does his will.³² Nobody has ever heard of opening the eyes of a man born blind.³³ If this man were not from God, he could do nothing."

The man who was blind and barred from the temple now not only has physical sight, he has spiritual sight as well. He knows that Jesus is at the very least a godly man who does God's will. He knows Jesus is doing God's work, as Jesus told the disciples before he healed him.

The man who was blind can now see the light of the world, both physically and spiritually. He can physically see Jesus, God the son, incarnate as a man in the world, but he can also see that Jesus is the source of spiritual salvation with his spiritual eyesight. Irrespective of his sinfulness or otherwise at his birth, the Pharisees really did have much to learn from him. As he had sarcastically suggested, they really should have become Jesus's disciples, instead of throwing out him who had been born blind, and could now see better than they could, at least spiritually.

As we read about this man born blind who could now see, and the spiritually blind Pharisees, we need to consider our own spiritual eyesight. Are we blind to who Jesus is, and simply looking for excuses as to why we shouldn't believe him, why he shouldn't be who he says he is? Or are we like the once blind beggar, accepting the physical and spiritual healing that Jesus has given us. Do you see a mere human being who lived 2000 years ago, upset the religious authorities and then died an ignominious, agonising death at the hands of Roman soldiers on a cross? Or do you see the son of God, God the Son, who never sinned, who always lived as God wanted, who healed blindness, paralysis, and other diseases, raised people from the dead, and ultimately rose from his own death to heal us, not only physically but spiritually that by believing in him we might have eternal life in perfect harmony with God and creation.

Are you spiritually blind, or like the once blind man, can you see the ultimate, spiritual truth?
