The Ministry of the Word

Isaiah 53:7-12 (NIV)

⁷ He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. ⁸ By oppression and judgment he was taken away. Yet who of his generation protested? ²⁴ The Jews who were there gathered around him, saying, “How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly.”

The works I do in my Father’s name testify about me, ²⁶ but you do not believe because you are not my sheep. ²⁷ My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. ²⁸ I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one will snatch them out of my hand. ²⁹ My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all; no one can snatch them out of my Father’s hand. ³⁰ I and the Father are one.”

Sermon - Jesus the Messiah

The Apostles’ Creed

Sermon - John 10:22-42 - Jesus the Messiah

Introduction - Arguing with 4 year olds

I love my grandson dearly, but I get really frustrated when he simply will not accept my answers to his questions. Sometimes, no matter what I say, not matter how seriously I try to take his question, if the answer isn't the one that he wants, and the question comes straight back to me, or maybe I just get a continuous series of "but Why?", or, he asks Cath, who has been listening to the entire conversation, and gives him precisely the same answer. Sometimes I just give up and reply "It is that way so you can ask infuriating questions!"

I am sure you have experienced this, perhaps with 4 year olds, and almost certainly with people who claim to be adults! Jesus seemed to be just as frustrated with the Jews in today's reading. Their equivalent of "Why?" was "Tell as plainly."

The Messiah

The question the Jews were frustrating Jesus with was "Are you the Messiah?"

Way back at the start of Jesus's ministry, Andrew was convinced Jesus was the Messiah as he had told his brother Simon Peter that he had found the Messiah, and many of Jesus's contemporaries were convinced he was, while others were equally convinced he was not. In fact, by this stage, as far as I can see, the only person Jesus had specifically told that he was the Messiah was the Samaritan woman at the well.

A large part of the problem was that the title Messiah carried a lot of baggage. Many expected the Messiah to be a powerful political or military leader who would throw out the Romans and re establish the main of Israel to the glory they expected it to have.

You see, the Jewish Bible, our Old Testament, mentions the 'anointed one' who is to come a number of times, and it isn't clear if these references are to the same person or two or even more different people who are to come. In some cases, the anointed one could be a contemporary figure, the king of Israel or Judah, or even a priest. Sometimes he is a political, powerful ruler, but other passages talk of a powerless, suffering servant who doesn't sound like a mighty king at all. While the anointed one is

usually human, he often does have a special, very close relationship with God that hints at him being more than human. Consequently, it is not surprising that Jews expected these prophecies to be fulfilled by different people, even if they thought there would only be one true Messiah.

Jesus understood that he was the one, true Messiah, and more importantly, how he would personally fulfil all the disparate prophecies. In this instance, he tells the Jews that he is not only the good shepherd who cares for his flock, but he not only has a special relationship with God, but that he is actually one with God.

He does the Father's works

In showing that he is the Messiah, Jesus tells the Jews that the works he does in his Father's name testify who he is. Up to this point, he had turned water into wine, miraculously discerned the details of the life of the Samaritan woman at the well, healed an official's son, fed the 5000 and performed a few other miracles. In today's reading he said that these works testify to who he is, to him being the Messiah. Jesus's miracles point to messianic prophecies like when Isaiah; the blind will see, the deaf will hear and the lame will walk, but they are also things that only God can do. I can't think of any Old Testament prophecies that say the Messiah will turn water into wine, but the psalms say that God makes wine to make glad the heart of humankind, so God makes wine. Also, many of Jesus's miracles are similar to miracles that God did in Israel's history: walking on water reflects God's people passing the Red Sea so God's people could walk across dry land and be saved from slavery. These miracles show that Jesus is doing what God did in saving his people Israel, which happens to be what the Messiah was to do: to bring about the salvation of God's people, but not just the nation of Israel but all nations.

He is the Good Shepherd

Next, to show he is the Messiah, Jesus again emphasises that he is the good shepherd. He says the Pharisees do not believe because you are not his sheep. The Pharisees are not his sheep and therefore do not believe. An important aspect of this is that they are sheep first: they are chosen by God and then they believe. They are only able to believe because God has chosen them to be in his flock. Unlike the Pharisees, those who are in

the flock and believe listen to Jesus's voice; He knows them, and they follow him. He gives them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one will snatch them out of Jesus's hand.

This is part of what the Messiah is: the one anointed by God to do God's works in saving his people.

He is God the Son

However, Jesus says that He, the Messiah, more than does God's work. His relationship with God is deeper than this. Jesus actually makes an earth shattering claim to the Jews in this regard. He says that he is One with God. This is earthshaking because the fundamental statement of Faith of the Jews is the Shema . Hear, O Israel: YHWH our God, YHWH is one" (Deuteronomy 6:4).

Jesus isn't contradicting this statement. He certainly isn't denying that God is one, but he is saying that God's oneness is different to the way the Jews expected. He says that no one can snatch his sheep out of his own hand, and then, in almost the same breath, says that no one can snatch them out of God the fathers hand. Obviously this is picture language since God the father does not have physical hands like we do, but somehow God the Father and Jesus have the same hand that holds the flock. This was enough to make the Jews want to stone him, the punishment in the Old Testament for blasphemy. Still, Jesus goes even further. He says the **Father is in me, and I in the Father**. He is not talking about panentheism, the idea that God is in everything. The Bible is quite clear that God is quite separate from his creation: everything that is created is created from nothing. Nor is he talking pantheism, the idea that everything is part of God. No, Jesus is talking about the Trinity, there are three members of the godhead: God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit: three in one, one in three, three distinct personalities, completely united and completely inseparable. They are not parts of a single whole like leaves of a three leaf clover, nor are they different expressions (or modes) of a single God, because Jesus prayed to the father and he wasn't praying to himself. Similarly, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit, so he too is separate. Our New Testament reading from Philippians talks more about how Jesus is human and divine.

By expressing this tri-unity of God, Jesus was saying that the Messiah was not only human, as Jews had believed from every since Moses prophesied about the Messiah. Jesus was saying that the Messiah is also divine, and was divine without contradicting the fundamental fact of the unity of God. This was too much for the Jews and they tried to seize him again. However, it was not his time yet, and he retreated to the Jordan where John the Baptist had baptised him. This was at least partly in preparation for his upcoming arrest, trial and crucifixion.

Conclusion

The Jews would not accept that Jesus was the divine Messiah, even though it did not contradict their firm belief that there is but one God. However, the real question today is not whether the Jews of Jesus's day believed in him, after all, they did not have the evidence of his resurrection, nor did they have the Holy Spirit, whom Jesus only sent after he had ascended to heaven. No one here has either of those excuses. We know from God's authoritative word that Jesus died and rose for our salvation, and we have the Holy Spirit whom Jesus sent to open our hearts and minds to the truth: the truth that Jesus is the Messiah, the promised anointed one, perfectly human, perfectly divine, fully in God the father, and with God the father fully in him. This Jesus the Messiah (or in Greek, the Christ), God the son, died and rose again to save all who believe in him to eternal life.

Do you believe this truth, and have the eternal life that is only possible through believing it? Or are you like the Jews, unwilling to accept the true answer, even if you constantly re-ask the question like my grandson?

Let those of us who have this Faith, believe, and recite together our belief in the words of the apostle's creed.
